And whereas in pursuance of the statute in that case made and provided I have duly examined the proofs and allegations of both the said parties touching the matter of the said complaint and upon due consideration had thereof adjudged and determined that the said Eleanor Arthur has in her service as aforesaid been guilty and I do therefore convict her of the said offence. I order as a punishment that the said Eleanor Arthur shall abate from her wages to be paid to her by the said Evan Lewis the sum of £5 and do hereby discharge the said Evan Lewis from the payment of the said sum of £5 as part of the wages of the said Eleanor Arthur.

**Examinations-theft.** [1820H28]

11 January 1820. Examination of Roger Clarke of the town of Welshpool, butcher, Ann wife of John Pryce of the same, butcher, Margaret Davies of the Britannia Inn in Welshpool wife of John Davies, innkeeper., taken before Thomas Morgan and Thomas Davies, J.P.s for the said borough. Ann Pryce says that she had a piece of beef of the weight of about 21 lbs in her husband's shop in Berriew Street last night. That about eight o'clock she missed the beef having gone out of the shop to the back part of her house. And after finding the beef missing she made enquiries and not discovering it she suspected it was stolen. That her little daughter who is nine years of age informed deponent that two women (when deponent had left the shop and the little girl being in) came and enquired for beef steaks or mutton chops and being told by the girl there were none they went away. That one of them was a young woman with in a grey cloak and the other an old woman with a silk bonnet and shawl and a blue gown. That deponent suspecting (as the shop could be easily opened without any noise) were the persons who stole the beef went and enquired at different lodging house and other places in the town answering the description she had received from the little girl and were informed that there were some strange women at the Britannia Inn in Welshpool. That she went to the inn and saw three women, one an old woman and two young women, and two of them by their appearance corresponded with the description given by the little girl. The deponent then asked "which of you has been at a butcher's shop asking for beef steaks or mutton chops", the two young women then said neither of us. That there was a bundle by the door and Mrs Davies of the inn hinted to deponent to feel what was in it, which she accordingly did and thought she felt a long piece of flesh meat. That after hearing the answer from the young women deponent I said I will see what you have in your bundle. Upon this one of the young women got up and said deponent should see what was in the bundle and if there was any thing amiss she would give to

deponent satisfaction. That the bundle was a check apron and in it a check bag. That the young woman untied the apron and upon deponent opening it she discovered the piece of beef she had lost and which she identified by having taken some part of it in ... for it and by the piece having been gnawed by some dogs and the marks still remaining. That deponent then put the beef upon the table and opening the check bag she discovered a breast and hand of pork. That deponent left the inn and went to make enquiries at the butchers to ascertain who had left the pork. That Roger Clarke was the nearest shop being on the other side of the street. That having informed Mr Clarke who upon looking in his shop discovered that he had lost a breast and hand of pork. That Clarke accompanied deponent to the Britannia Inn and there identified the pork to be his. That the women there denied that the bundle were their's and that they did not know anything of the bundle or of the beef or pork. And this deponent further says that she took the beef home with her. That it has been in her possession there since, and she now produces and identifies it as being her husband's property. Ann Pryce\*.

Roger Clarke says that in consequence of the information given him by Mrs Pryce he examined his shop and discovered the loss of a breast and hand of pork missing about 10 lbs. That he accompanied Mrs Pryce to the Britannia Inn and there found the pork he had lost. And he now produces it being had it in his possession, and identifies it as his property. Roger Clarke\*.

Margaret Davies says that the three prisoners came with her husband on Sunday night to his house. That husband hires a car and when returning from a job from Shrewsbury and he informed her that about the Halfway House between Welshpool and Shrewsbury the women agreed with them to carry them to Welshpool. That the prisoners slept at deponent's house. And the following morning deponent asked them what business they were of and the youngest answered that they sold muslins and that they went to buy butter and eggs to take back with them which was their business. That they went out and were absent the whole day. That about half past nine the three came in together one of them carrying a bundle in a check bag. That the bundle was placed by the door and the three women sat down by the kitchen fire. That shortly afterwards Mrs Pryce came in and witness ... what then took place. That the three prisoners came together and went out together. The mark of Margaret Davies.

Prisoners being produced and examined as follows. Margaret the wife of Richard Robinson of Liverpool, by trade a huxter. This is one of the young women and brought the bundle to be opened by Mrs Pryce. Rose Cain, a single woman, of Liverpool, huxter. Elizabeth Roberts of Shrewsbury, wife of William Roberts, nailor. They all deny the charge and that they are innocent. Clarke - £20 to prosecute; Mrs Pryce £10; Margaret Davies £10.

12 July 1821. Report on the state of the new bridge now building at Llanerfyl.

The abutment on the south end of this bridge was brought above low water in the month of October and during spring of the present year the foundation of the pier was laid.

The later work was very considerably delayed in consequence of the wet season, but had the contractors proceeded with due diligence during the last autumn this work might have been easily accomplished previous to the winter which would have enabled them to have commenced turning one arch in February of March whereas the centres were not fixed till 2 July.

It will therefore be totally impossible that the work can be completed with the time stipulated by the contract and serious inconvenience may arise to the public from the advanced state of the season during which it will be necessary to ford the river, and this inconvenience totally arises from the want of exertion and expedition on the part of the contractors; however within the last three weeks great activity has taken place and should the same exertion be made as is now manifest the bridge may still ne made passable before winter.

It will be absolutely necessary to make a fence wing of stone to protect the land belonging to the Viscount Clive against the river, the course of which is directed upon it in consequence of alteration in the situation of the bridge.

18 October 1821. [Visiting] magistrates of the gaol and house of correction have reason to hope that their report short as it is will prove satisfactory. During the last year the number of crimes has certainly diminished and although one execution has unfortunately taken place, in the case of a man who was neither a native nor inhabitant of this county, yet only three convicts were sentenced to transportation at the March Assizes and not one individual at the August - Assizes. The offences tried at the Quarter Sessions have been very low in number and very trivial in importance.

It is the opinion of the Committee of the Society for the Improvement of Prison Discipline that offenders who have in a reasonable time been subjected to a well regulated system of discipline do abstain from a further violation of the law. To this truth the visiting magistrates of the gaol and house of correction at Montgomery have pleasure in adding their testimony. Since the adoption of the new rules and regulations only one instance of re-committal to the gaol has occurred and none to the house of correction. Since the operation of the New Act not one offender of this description has been committed in our house of correction. Owing to the unfavourable state of the weather the additional building to the house of correction has not proceeded so rapidly as the visiting magistrates could have wished but they hope that the roof will be completed in nine days and the interior will afterwards be soon finished. The conduct of the prisoners during the year has been in general orderly and correct. Devereux Mytton, Maurice Jones, Panton Corbett, John Davies, William Pugh.

That shortly after the prisoner left her service the deponent and his wife had suspicions from the weight and appearance of the box and different bundles left at his house that all was not right and that his wife having a key which, upon trial, opened the prisoner's box, they discovered many things which they knew were the property of Lt. Davies. That on Sunday 4 November he gave information to his master of what he had discovered. The mark of Richard Parry.

Examination of James Barrett servant to Lt. Col. Davies. Says that about a month since his fellow servant Ann Parry asked him to carry a trunk (now produced) to 'crip'? the blacksmith and if the Montgomery carrier was not pressed to give it to him, but if he the carrier was pressed he was then to take the trunk to Richard Parry the coachman house and leave it there till called for. That this deponent found that the carrier was gone and he took it down to the coachman's house where he left it for the trunk appeared very heavy and that the trunk now produced is the same as he carried down. The mark of James Barrett.

Examination of John Davies of Nantcriba, esq. Says that on Sunday 4 instant his coachman Richard Parry told him that he strongly suspected that the prisoner Ann Parry had robbed him. That he the coachman and his wife both suspected that she had a key which upon trial opened the box and that they found knives and forks and a great many things which were deponents' property. The cell in the female felons ward is out of repair become damp and unfit for the reception of prisoners.

There are no separate apartments set out for prisoner convicted of or committed for misdemeanour or for those detained as witnesses. I am therefore obliged to put them with the prisoners in the felons ward.

There is only one debtors court and therefore the debtors in general both males and females of necessity have the use of it in common.

There is no infirmary or sick ward.

There are hot and portable baths or tubs in the debtor's ward but there is no infirmary or hot or cold baths or tubs in either the males or females felons ward.

The doors and door cases of the cells, the window frames and iron bars of the gaol in the debtors and criminals apartments want painting.

The contents of the Act of Parliament of 14 George III is not painted upon a board and hung up in the gaol as required by law.

There is no printed copy of rules and orders for the government of the gaol hung up in it. *In the margin:* The gaoler has a printed copy in a book, the visiting magistrates have ordered some copies to be printed to hang up in court.

There are eleven bed ticks wanting in the male and female felons side for the present ticks are worn out by the iron bedsteads not being painted and they lose the cut straw out very much and are past repainting.

There are also thirteen pairs of blankets wanting and thirteen rugs on the same side the old ones being past any further repair.

There are also wanting three hearth brushes and three dusting shovels to clean and dust the stairs window etc in the male and female debtors and criminal apartments and a new spade to clean out the courts.

William Roberts, one of the sergeants at mace for the borough of Welshpool says that he was informed on 19 August that a man was in Welshpool passing bad silver. That he went in search of the person and took up James Bratton. He searched him and found in his coat pocket a half a crown piece and 1s 6d which he believes to be bad silver. That he also found £5 in gold and silver in a purse in his breeches pocket which he believes to be good money. Produces the 1s 6d he received from Margaret Pugh. There was no half a crown in the purse with the good money. William Roberts\*. Dear Sir, Mr Morgan had the indictment and the brief but I cannot tell whether he has forwarded them to you. I forgot to serve the enclosed recognizance. Herewith you have all the letters I have received in your absence, W.Yearsley, Welshpool.

Return and report of John Davies, keeper of the gaol in evidence to the statutes of 31 George III, chap. 46 and 24 George III, chap. 54

There are seven cells in this gaol. Two of them in the male felons ward are each 8 feet long, 6 ½ feet wide and 7 feet high. They are complete for the reception of prisoners ordered to be imprisoned with hard labour. Two more of the cells in the male felons ward for the same purpose are 8 feet long, 6 ½ feet wide and 8 feet high. The late defective parts of the floors have been replanked.

Two more of the cells in the male felons ward for the same purpose are 8 feet long, 7 feet wide and 10 feet high. The late defective parts of the floors have been replanked.

The other cell is in the female felons ward. It is 13 feet long, 5 feet wide and 8 feet high. But it is at present unfit for the reception of prisoners from dampness.

There are no separate apartments set out for prisoners convicted or committed for misdemeanours of for those detained as witnesses. I am therefore obliged to put them with the prisoners in the felons ward.

There is only one debtors court, and therefore the debtors in general both males and females of necessity have the use of it in common.

There is no infirmary or sick ward but the old chapel room in the attic storey on the male debtors side will be appropriated for that use.

There are hot and cold portable baths or tubs in the debtors ward. There is no infirmary or hot or cold baths or tubs in either the male or female felons wards but the portable ones are removable thereto when required. The contents of the act of parliament of 14 George III, chap. 59 are not painted upon a board and hung up in the gaol

Two more of the cells in the male felons ward for the same purpose are 8 feet long, 7 feet wide and 10 feet high. They are complete for the reception of prisoners ordered to be imprisoned with hard labour.

The other cell is in the female felons ward. It is 13 feet long, 5 feet wide and 8 feet high. But it is at present unfit for the reception of prisoners from dampness.

There are no separate apartments set out for prisoners convicted or committed for misdemeanours or for those detained as witnesses. I am therefore obliged to put them with the prisoners in the felons ward.

There is only one debtors court, and therefore the debtors in general both males and females of necessity have the use of it in common.

There is no infirmary or sick ward but the old chapel room in the attic storey on the male debtors side will be appropriated for that use.

There are hot and cold portable baths or tubs in the debtors ward. There is no infirmary or hot or cold baths or tubs in either the male or female felons wards.

The contents of the act of parliament of 14 George III, chap. 59 are not painted upon a board and hung up in the gaol

That she purchased the above at the fair and made it up in a brown paper. That she also purchased a piece of about 28 yards of brown c.... That these several articles with others carefully made up by witness in a larger sack, and left by her at Wrexham to be forwarded into Montgomeryshire by Samuel Sides (a carrier) at .... That the pack was directed to be left at Mr Owen's Eagles Inn at Welshpool and that night witness in consequence of being sent for came to the Eagles Inn at Welshpool and upon examining the pack found it had been opened at one end. That she then took every thing out of the pack and compared the contents with the bill of sales and then found the above ... in the brown paper and the piece of cillins? missing. These articles are now produced to witness and she swears them to be the property of her husband. Elizabeth Ashton\*.

Richard Pugh, waggoner, says that on Saturday evening he received a large pack from Samuel Sides of Oswestry. Witness was directed to take it to the Eagles Inn in Welshpool. The pack was well corded and carefully made up and directed to Valentine Ashton, ..., to be left at Mr Owen Eagles Inn, Welshpool. That witness deposited the pack in the passage near the door. That it was 8 o'clock when he left the pack in the passage it being the normal place of putting these things. That some time afterwards he came again to the Eagles Inn and in going through the passage to the kitchen he passed the pack and saw it in the same place where he had left it. That upon his leaving the house (about 10 o'clock that night) he was going home through the passage he was aware of the prisoner who says her name is (Mary Hough) sitting on the pack and witness desired her to go into the house as she would be more comfortable. That the passage was sufficiently light for witness to know the prisoner ... from the light of the kitchen. That prisoner said she was awaiting for someone and that she was sufficiently comfortable where she was. That about half an hour after, witness was sent for by Mrs Owen of the Eagles who informed him that the pack had been opened and who desired witness to look and examine the pack whether it was in the same state. That witness upon looking found that the pack had been cut open at the end and from the appearance of it witness had no doubt that some of the articles contained in the bag had been taken away. The prisoner (witness understood) was then in the parlour in custody. Witness ... can swear that the pack was well corded and seemed when he first left it in the passage, and that it was cut at the end in the manner before stated when he examined it afterwards. Richard Pugh\*.

Elinor Owen says that the prisoner came to the back of their house after half past 10 o'clock on Saturday night. That the prisoner asked if one George Key was there. Witness said he was not. The prisoner was very hoarse (and so she is now) and witness could not understand her. That she said to witness that he was a Yorkshire man. Witness said none of the Yorkshire men put up at her house but were at the Lion near the Way?. The prisoner said she was sure George Key ... that he was upstairs and she ... to go upstairs to see. Witness ... it and said there were no persons upstairs. The prisoner then said she was sure George Key was in the house as there was a parcel for him in the lobby meaning (as witness supposes the passage). That witness immediately suspected the prisoner and went to look at the parcel or pack and found it had been cut at the end. Upon this witness desired the prisoner to be taken into custody. The mark of Elinor Owen.

Richard Roberts says he was desired by Mrs Owen to take the prisoner into custody, and conveyed her into the parlour. That witness asked her whether she had any of the goods about her. She replied she had not. Witness then said how came you then to cut the pack open. The prisoner replied 'I thought it belonged to my brother-in-law'. Witness asked what was his name. She said George Key and after some other comments said that he came from Leeds in Yoorshire, and had been on the ... for a fortnight. That upon witness questioning her further she said that Key was her brother. The mark of Richard Roberts.

Evan Thomas says that he was sent for to the Eagles. Had the prisoner secured but found nothing upon her. Took her into custody and lodged in the cut. The following (yesterday) morning the prisoner said she was very sorry for what she had done at the Cock ... and that she was intoxicated. Evan Thomas\*.

That about 9 o'clock in the morning of 6 May she saw Richards' wife go to the barn with the basket of provisions upon which she (examinant) got into a tallant adjoining the bay which adjoins the barn floor and after seeing Richards and his wife looking at the door and other places she saw him take the basket up and go to the couch? of wheat on the side of the barn floor and saw him begin to fill it with the wheat with his hands and to press it down in the barn when she got down from the tallant with the intention to catch Richards' wife carrying the basket and wheat away. That the wife remained in and about the barn about half an hour and then went away and examinant met her by the lump on the footway and looked into the basket but there was no wheat in it. The mark of Jane Jones.

What repairs has been done to the present carriage bridge this deponent believes has been at the expense of the trustees of the turnpike road. Samuel Breeze\*.

That the things claimed by Farmer were then tied up together and kept by her till she delivered them to Farmer on Thursday morning last and the prisoner's shirt and stockings she put back into the prisoner's room, and she saw him take them away with him as his own of Thursday morning when he was about to be taken to Forden before a justice. **Petition-gaol and house of correction.** [1824M6]

1 December 1824. My Lords and Gentlemen. The inhabitants of the shire town of Montgomery having had an intimation that there exists an intention to urge your worships to remove the county gaol and house of correction hither to the town of Welshpool, take the liberty most respectfully to submit the following statement to your consideration.

They find by the statute of the 3 and 25 Henry VIII ch. 21, section 71 the county gaol was required to be in some convenient place of the castle of the shire town or such other convenient place as should be appointed by the Lord President and Council of the Marches of Wales and the justice of the Great Sessions or any three of them the Lord President being one.

That a gaol for the county has accordingly ever since been in the town of Montgomery and in the year 1738 was with the house of correction also rebuilt where they now are in consequence of the exertions and munificence of the father of the late present venerable Countess of Powis, who not only gave the county the lands on which they stand, but also the bricks and timber of which they are built except as to some enlargement which they had received since his death.

That the Court of Quarter Sessions for the county has also invariably or at least during the recollection of the oldest living person been held in this town which has been and its continuance will be very beneficial and advantageous to the inhabitants.

That if your worships should deem it necessary to rebuild the gaol and the house of correction or either of them we submit that there are several very salubrious and eligible sites for their building in Montgomery. We may with confidence assert from our own knowledge and the best information that a more healthful situation than Montgomery cannot be found in the county. That no gaol fever has ever occurred nor is the town subject to typhus which almost annually occurs in Welshpool.

The town of Montgomery is at least equally convenient for the attendance of the magistrates at the Quarter Sessions. We are not aware of any inconveniency or extra expense occasioned to the county by the edifices being at this place in preference to another, except the trivial charges of taking to Welshpool the few prisoner that are to be brought before the Court of Great Sessions twice in the year, a thing in our humble opinion of no consequence in a concern of this magnitude.

On the other hand we with great respect take the liberty to observe that as we fear the removal of the gaol and house of correction to another town will be followed by that of your respectable Court of Quarter Sessions also, we cannot but be alarmed as such event will be very prejudicial to the inhabitants of this place. We therefore flatter ourselves that this our application will not be felt by your worships as either disrespectful, impertinent, or intrusive and we rest assured that whenever the matter shall be taken into your consideration this our representation will have all due attention. We have the honour to be with the utmost respect. My Lords and Gentlemen, your worships most obedient and most humble servants. That deponent then lived with old Mr Humphreys of Pennant. That part of the stone for the foundations came from the Glyn lane in tp. Llandinier,. **Report-gaol, house of correction.** [1824M19]

In obedience to the order of the committee I have considered the probable expense to be incurred by each of the proposed arrangements and have to state as follows.

1. That to obtain the additional wards at the gaol in the most economical manner would in my opinion cost at the lowest calculation £2200. In this arrangement it is proposed to remove the present felons kitchen which is in a dangerous state, to divide the space now occupied by the two courts in a more convenient manner, and to increase the number of cells to eight, there being at present six. To convert the gaoler's scullery into a day room for female debtors and to enclose a court adjoining it; also to convert a portion of the gaoler's back kitchen into a day room for female prisoners and to enclose a court adjoining it; but the gaoler's apartments are to remain in every other respect as they are now situate.
2. To obtain the same degree of classification upon the best construction keeping inspection in view. I am of the opinion that the expense of obtaining five court and wards so as to afford proper inspections would amount at the lowest possible calculation to £3400.
3. To complete the additional building at the house of correction. The expense of completing these additions would in my opinion amount to the sum of £1200 exclusive of a tread mill; which would cost £350 if erected with two wheels and pump machinery.
4. To convert the present gaol into the house of correction and the latter into the gaol. I am of the opinion that the building at the gaol may be so altered so as to afford a sufficient arrangement for a house of correction for £700 or £800 exclusive of the expense of a tread mill and that the present house of correction might be convertible into the gaol with the addition of three courts for £2800. The arrangement would also be better than can be in any way be obtained in the present gaol.
5. The expense of erecting an entire new gaol and house of correction so as to afford the classification required by 5 George IV cap. 85 would not exceed at the utmost £10,000. Thomas Penson, 2 November 1824.

They are complete for the reception of prisoners ordered to be imprisoned with hard labour. Two more of the cells in the male felons ward for the same purpose are 8 feet long, 6 ½ feet wide and 8 feet high. They are complete for the reception of prisoners ordered to be imprisoned with hard labour.

Two more of the cells in the male felons ward for the same purpose are 8 feet long, 7 feet wide and 10 feet high. They are complete for the reception of prisoners ordered to be imprisoned with hard labour.

The other cell is in the female felons ward. It is 13 feet long, 5 feet wide and 8 feet high. But it is at present unfit for the reception of prisoners from dampness.

There are no separate apartments set out for prisoners convicted or committed for misdemeanours or for those detained as witnesses. I am therefore obliged to put them with the prisoners in the felons ward.

There is only one debtors court, and therefore the debtors in general both males and females of necessity have the use of it in common.

There is no infirmary or sick ward but the old chapel room in the attic storey on the male debtors side will be appropriated for that use.

There are hot and cold portable baths or tubs in the debtors ward. There is no infirmary or hot or cold baths or tubs in either the male or female felons wards.

The contents of the act of parliament of 14 George III, chap. 59 are not painted upon a board and hung up in the gaol

He and the other prisoner came from there and left the prisoner called Isaac there, and he came and overtook them with a pair of shoes. The mark of Dawson Abrefetalmond.

**Examinations-theft.** [1825H24]

21 October 1824. Complaint and examination of Samuel Griffiths on behalf of his father John Griffiths of Glanmeheli in pa. Kerry, farmer, taken before John Jenkins, J.P. Says that some months back having strong suspicions that the lock of his granary door was picked and wheat from time to time stolen therefrom he at first set some of his servants to watch but did not discover the offender. Edward Edwards, son of Edward Edwards, says that he brought no wheat to his father during the last week nor did he buy any. The mark of Edward Edwards.

Edward Edwards the elder of the village of Kerry then asked where he had the wheat which he sent that day his two children to Llwynmawr mill said that his son Edward had bought it at Newtown ... on the preceding Tuesday ... his house on the following day.

Isaac stopped behind him and the other prisoner at Penarth and came after them with a pair of shoes, which he said some man had given to him. His father is dead and his mother living. Mary Evans is wife of prosecutor lives at Tynllwyn in pa. Llanbryn-mair. Went to chapel last Sunday morning about nine o'clock. That a little before eleven found the cupboard door open. She lost everything which was in it – 2 shirts, 1 pair stockings, two handkerchiefs, a sheet of bacon. Called her neighbour, went down to a person who had served the office of constable, made enquiry, found the door locked and the key under the stone where I left it. The cupboard shut when she went away but open when she came back.

Richard Morris. Lives near Tynllwyn, a farmer. Was at chapel Sunday last but left it a little before eleven, in coming back saw prisoners at the bar going across my field. I asked them why they broke hedges on a Sunday. They said they had missed their way. One of them had a bundle in his hand, the other a bundle under his apron. Sure that these were them, another with them believes it to be witness Jenkins. I know Ashton had a bundle but I am not certain whether ... or Jenkins had the other. I cannot be certain but I think they were in handkerchief.

Evan Thomas. A servant near Tynllwyn heard of the robbers when going to evening chapel. Went down in the evening to Pen-y-bont, saw three in custody, prisoner and Jenkins. In consequence of information from Jenkins went with him to search for articles, again between five and six next morning. The found a bag in a bush, in it two shirts, two pair shoes, one pair stockings, two handkerchiefs. Gave those clothes to the constable, John Jones.

Jon Jones, constable of Dolgadfan produces articles delivered to him by last witness shirts in bundle tied up as now in a handkerchief, shoes.

Evan Thomas. When I found them all the things were in a bag, shoes and all.

David Jenkins. Knows prisoners since the Thursday after Newtwn fair, about a fortnight ago. Came with them from Machynlleth at five Sunday morning, reached Llanbryn-mair about ten. ... went across the fields. We went to a house which we believed to be a shop. They said it was a shop...

**[document 8]** ... a little while ago ... met prisoner at Llanidloes, went with them then to Rhaiadr and Aberystwyth and Machynlleth. They tried to get in, then they found the key under the stone. The smallest found it and unlocked the door. They both went in. I went on the top of the hedge against the garden. They stayed from 10 minutes to a quarter of an hour. They came out through the door. He thinks each had a shirt and a pair of stockings, two pairs of shoes, two handkerchiefs and a piece of bacon. The keyed the door and put the key back in the same place they found it. Carried the things loose for a couple of field, tied them up in two parcels, went down through the woods and across the brook and across the fields for the road. Took the bundle with them, saw witness Morris. Had then a bundle and one of the prisoners had the other bundle. Then went over the hedge into the road, up the hill and hid them in a furze bush. We went down by a lane ... about an hour and a half afterwards men then came up and took us, we were then sitting down. They asked if we took the clothes out of the house, prisoner denied it, witness also told Evan Thomas a little before dark where the things were – could not find them that night. Went with him again next morning, things then found. The bundle was hid because we thought the men were coming after us – these the same clothes, the last prisoner brought this bacon from the house, the handkerchief not then about it. This is my handkerchief, the biggest tied the bacon up in it. Did not leave it with the others but carried it with us. The lesser had it and when they pursued us one of them threw it down the hill. The bag belonged to the least prisoner, he gave it to the big one. Put the things into the bag same time he tied them up.

Mary Evans identifies property and proves them. Morgan Lewis kept a shop at Tynllwyn last May.

He gave a shilling to Mrs Wolley went towards the door when Mrs Wolley said hold ... of him told him he was her prisoner and seized a cloth which he thought was his wallet from him. Isaac Jones.

Examination of Jane wife of George Wolley, innkeeper, taken before G.A. Evors. Says she was sitting in her kitchen this evening about 7 o'clock when she observed a man whom she has since been told it Isaac Jones with something under his arm. That suspecting he had stolen something she followed him to the door and took the table cloth now produced (which from certain scratches she believes and swears to be the property of her husband, George Wolley) from under his arm. That she asked him where he had it and the prisoner said he did not know he had a cloth at all. Jane Wolley\*.

Examination of Thomas Whitefoot. Says that he was this evening sitting in the kitchen of the Lion Inn when he observed Mrs Jane Wolley rushing towards the door. That she asked the prisoner Isaac Jones what he had under his coat. That she caught at the end of the table cloth which was hanging from under the prisoner's coat, pushed the prisoner back into the house and said this is the way I ... things. Thomas Whitefoot\*.

21 September 1825. Deposition of Benjamin Brown of Efelfach, innkeeper, taken before J.B. Williams, J.P. Says that on Sunday morning 4<sup>th</sup> instant he heard something about his premises. He immediately got out of bed, went to the window of the room wherein he slept and saw Richard Andrew of Efelfach, tailor, coming out of deponent's coal yard and going into Richard Andrew's house, heard him put something down which he thought sounded much like coals. Richard Andrew went again into the coal yard and was there a short time, came out again and shut the gate of the yard quietly behind him. He took the coals off and deponent saw him no more

then. Deponent went and fastened the gate of the yard, went into his house, lighted a candle and looked at the clock, it was then about half past three. Benjamin Brown\*.

He was up last at night and went to bed about eleven o'clock at which all the outer doors of his house were secured. That examinant rose between five and six o'clock the next morning (Tuesday) and about seven o'clock found that two pair of women's shoes and one pair of child's shoes had been stolen from out of his shop. That he had heard of a Martha Hughes being about the neighbourhood, and his wife informed examinant that she met with her on the new road to Shrewsbury, and found on her feet one pair of shoes (those now produced) which his wife brought with her home which he identified as being one of the pair stolen out of his house. That on the same Tuesday examinant went to Shrewsbury where he saw Martha Hughes standing in the street, who had then on her feet a pair of shoes which he identified as his property and a pair of the shoes lost on the day before mentioned. That he took her aside and demanded her to deliver the shoes to him and charged her with having stolen the same. That she begged of the examinant to let her go, not to take them from her and she would come to his house the next day and would tell him where the remainder of the articles were that he had lost and said that the pair of child's shoes were at the house of Elizabeth Williams. That on Tuesday the day he missed the shoes he examined the outer door of his house opening into the brewhouse and found that his home had been entered by some person getting under the sill. Thomas Clough\*.

Examination of Martha, wife of Thomas Clough. Says that on Tuesday 31 May last, in consequence of her husband having lost several pair of shoes out of his house, as stated in his examination, and hearing that the prisoner Martha Hughes was in the neighbourhood, and having some suspicion that she was the person who had so stolen the shoes, she went in search of her and overtook her on the new road leading to Shrewsbury, on the top of the bank opposite to Moelygolfa, in company with another young woman whom examinant has not seen before. That as soon as she came up to her she saw one of the pair of shoes lost by her husband on the said Martha Hughes's feet, and she knew them from having bound them herself. The committee of magistrates appointed at the last Q.S. to confer with the magistrates of cos. Salop and Denbigh upon the measures most expedient to be adopted for carrying into effect a plan for building a new bridge over the river Efyrynwy at Llanymynech and for completing the new roads at each end thereof and to make arrangements with them as to the proportions to be paid by each county having delivered in their report to this Q.S. of which the following is a copy your committee in pursuance of your appointment at the last Q.S. attended at Llanymynech of 15 instant and were met by Mr William Wynn, Mr Bonner and Mr Allen Jones (three of the committee on the part of co. Denbigh) and a large and very respectable assembly of landed proprietors and others interested in the proposed measure.

You committee have in the first place to observe: That it was the unanimous opinion of every person present that a bridge over the Efyrynwy at or near Llanymynech would be highly advantageous and desirable and on this subject they are confident there can be no other opinion. Two plans were submitted by Mr Penson, one over the present fords which would place the bridge wholly in co. Montgomery and another lower down which would avoid the village of Llanymynech and be situated on the boundary of the cos. Montgomery and Salop.

The latter plan is in the opinion of Mr Penson decidedly preferable as far as regards a more level communication with the turnpike road on the Oswestry side of Llanymynech but is objected to by persons in and about Llanymynech ins as much as it would divert the road from Llanymynech which at present crosses through it and is further objectionable from the increase of expense to be incurred in forming a longer new line of the new road.

Your committee however withhold any opinion as to the most eligible site till they have ascertained the means which are likely to be at your disposal for the completion of the measure. Your committee have great satisfaction in stating that the magistrates of co. Denbigh have most handsomely offered to contribute £100 towards the desirable measure but as the least expensive measure will amount to the sum of £7500 there is yet a very large sum requisite to make up the amount

Your committee recommend that co. Montgomery should give £2000. They indulge the hope that co. Salop will furnish an equal sum and that the commissioners of the district of roads which must by the improved communication be greatly benefited will aid the fund for the purpose of effecting it.

The Shropshire Q.S. have appointed a committee to meet the Montgomeryshire and Denbighshire committees on 5 November. If unfortunately these funds should not be sufficient to complete the undertaking your committee recommends an application to Parliament for an act to collect a toll on the new and the present bridges and that the deficiency should be raised by mortgage of these tolls, but they cannot conclude without expressing an earnest hope that s desirable a measure will be duly appreciated by the counties and other bodies and individuals interested in it success that so great an improvement will be laid open to the enjoyment of the public free of toll.

Ordered that the report be approved of and adopted and that Viscount Clive, Panton Corbett, William Owen, Richard Mytton or any two or more of them be appointed a committee with liberty to add to their number to confer with the magistrates of cos. Denbigh and Salop and the several other persons and parties interested as to the best method of carrying the objects detailed in the above report into effect and that they have full power to enter into such arrangements and direct such measures as to them seem fit and proper.

And it is unanimously resolved by this court that the thanks of the magistrates and of the county in general are justly due to Viscount Clive for the liberal manner in which he has met the wishes of the gaol committee in freely granting to them any quantity of land deemed necessary for the erection of a new gaol and house of correction in the situation they considered most desirable.

**Examinations-theft.** [1826H13]

23 November 1825. Examination of William Bullock of Newtown, brickmaker, taken before G.A.Evors, J.P. Says that between the months of May and October last he had several quantities of coal stolen from his brickyards at Bryndu in pa. Llanidloes. William Bullock\*.

Examination of John Pryce. Says that he has been working for William Bullock as brickmoulder all the last summer at Bryndu, that he has several times seen John Williams the prisoner steal several lumps of coal belonging to his master. That the prisoner was at that time a servant to Bullock. That he cannot recollect any particular day on which he saw him stealing the coal but he saw him do so at several different times between the months of May and October last. The mark of John Pryce.

Examination of David Chapman who says he was a servant to Mr Bullock last summer at the brickyard. That he has frequently seen the prisoner John Williams steal lumps of coal belonging to his master but he cannot recollect any particular day which he saw him do so. Might have seen him steal coal four or five different times. The mark of David Chapman.

Fourth. Your committee further take leave to submit to your consideration that as the necessity of a lock-up house in the town of Welshpool has been suggested and admitted a very trifling additional expense would furnish a small room or closet for the deposit of the standards and that to the person appointed in charge of the house might advantageously be committed the custody of the weights and measurers.

Fifth. Your committee cannot conclude their report without pressing upon your serious consideration the urgency of inducing as far as lies in your power the adoption of the imperial dry measure. They have little doubt that the very few enactments which would affect the liquid measure will shortly operate to the exclusion of the old. But with regard to the imperial dry measure they have no such anticipation and when the various measures are in use with the county and which create no inconsiderable confusion is superadded another differing both in its multiple and in the gross from all others now in use here or elsewhere, your committee cannot forbear urging upon your attention the necessity of doing all in your power as magistrates

and as persons of influence in your respective neighbourhoods to encourage the adoption of this imperial measure.

Resolved that his court approve of a sum not exceeding £5000 being advanced from the county rate provided the necessary powers be obtained from parliament, which sum together with the sum of £2000 from co. Salop and £1000 from co. Denbigh and the £2700 from districts as above will complete the sum of £10700 which is calculated will cover the expense of this important measure. It appearing that circumstances require a new county rate that the clerk of the peace prepare by next Q.S. forms of precepts conformably to the acts and that such further orders be then made as may be necessary in this matter.

That after the prisoner had entered the yard the second time and gone towards the cooking house as deposed to by the last witness, examinant heard a rattling noise like opening a lock, upon which he and his companion went towards the cooking house where they found the door open and the prisoner in the shaft coming towards the door. They seized him as before stated and asked him what he wanted there. He said he wanted to lay down there to sleep. Examinant in all other respects deposes to the same effect as the last witness. He also says that upon their return to the shed with Mr Dax, after having been with the prisoner to Mr Dax's and not having been absent above a quarter of an hour they found on the outside of the shed, close to the door jamb, a round box with a lid which seemed to have been used as a butter box, and a small part of a loaf of bread, just on the inside of the door on the ground, with a small quantity of butter on the bread and also a towel on the end of a narrow table used by the man to eat his



dinner. The lock after it had been undone was hung up a few inches on one side of the staple when examinant found it a few minutes after they had had hold of the prisoner. Examinant took it with him to Mr Dax's. Thomas Lewis\*.

Examination of Thomas Davies of the White House, Welshpool, carpenter. Says he is also employed about the works now going on near Coedydinas, and that yesterday evening about 8 p.m. he went to give some meat to the dog which has been lately brought there and in going there examinant passed at the distance of about twelve or thirteen yards from the 'cooking house', the door of which was then shut and the lock appeared to be secure and in its usual place. That examinant went to the yard nearly at the same time with Mr Dax and the prisoner and the other two witnesses, Humphreys and Lewis. That whilst Mr Dax was talking with the other witnesses and the prisoner examinant observed the prisoner handling his pocket and suspecting his intention to drop something, presently he heard something drop, apparently upon some iron tools behind a tool chest and upon examining the place, witness discovered the pick lock now produced and which was near the spot where the prisoner was standing. Thomas Davies\*.

Examination of Simon Evans of Welshpool, mason. Says that he is employed as a mason about a saw mill now erecting near Coedydinas. That on Saturday evening last on examinant's leaving off work he left the remains of some bread and butter which he had been eating tied up in a cloth and placed on a bench at the upper end of the cooking house. There was also on the cloth tied up a wooden box used for carrying butter and a small quantity of butter in it, also a small quantity of cheese and a tin canister with coffee and sugar in it, and he had intended to have taken it home with him but forgot it. When deponent went to his work this morning he found the cloth untied and the articles in a different situation to what he had left them in the cooking house. The mark of Simon Evans.

Examination of William Waring of Welshpool, mason. Says that he is also employed as a mason at the new saw-mill. That on Saturday night last on leaving off work, examinant locked the door of the cooking house, about a quarter past five. That hearing that the shed had been broken open examinant went there yesterday morning to learn if that was the case but he found everything as he had left it the evening before, the lock perfectly safe and as usual. That he and Robert Morris, who was with him, unlocked the door and went into the shed. Everything in the shed appeared the same as he had left it the evening before. And examinant observed the last witness Simon Evans's cloth tied up and lying on the bench at the upper end of the shed. Examinant took it up intending at one time to take it home to Simon Evans but he afterwards left it as it was. Examinant knew the cloth to belong to Simon Evans but did not know what it contained. Examinant afterwards saw the door again locked and the key put in the same place. The mark of William Waring.

Says he is employed about Powis Castle in superintending the erecting of buildings and overlooking the woods upon the estate. That in this capacity he has been employed for some time in overlooking the building now erecting near Coedydinas, being intended for a saw mill. That in consequence of the workmen employed at the works having reported to examinant that they had of late lost many of their working tools witness determined to set persons to watch the premises and accordingly he directed some workmen to sleep upon the premises in turn. That a few minutes before five o'clock this morning two of the men whom he had so employed to keep watch came to examinant bringing with them Owen Roberts, the prisoner whom they stated to witness they had discovered on the premises about three o'clock that morning and whom they had secured. He further says that on going with the witnesses and the prisoner to the yard to see whether any depredation had been committed examinant found a wooden box apparently used as a butter box on the outside the door of the cooking house close to the door and also a part of a loaf of bread in the inside of the shed but close to the door, and some butter on it, and also a cloth lying on a table had something on it, but examinant does not know what was in it, but which things he left there. Richard Dax\*.

Examination of Thomas Evans of the town of Welshpool, carpenter. Says that he has been and is now employed about the new works and buildings now erected near Coedydinas as a carpenter. That on Monday night last after leaving off work examinant collected his working tools together and placing them in a basket, put them on a bench in a shed upon the yard, called the cooking house being the place where examinant has always left his tools and which all the other workmen did the same. Examinant left them as before stated in the cooking house about seven o'clock that evening and on deponent going to his work on the following morning about half past five o'clock in the morning he could not find his basket of tools, it was gone from the place which he had left it the night before, and examinant never seen it since nor any one of the tools contained in it. There were in the basket when examinant left it the night before, a hand saw, a smoothing plane, an axe, an inch augur. There were others of the workmen who also lost their tools the same time. The mark of Thomas Evans.

Examination of John Humphreys of Welshpool, sawyer. Says that he is employed as a sawyer about the new buildings erecting at Coedydinas. That in consequence of many of the workmen employed about the buildings having of late lost their working tools, examinant with Thomas Lewis his fellow workman was set to sleep on the premises in turns. That examinant and Thomas Lewis accordingly kept watch last night and between two and three o'clock this morning examinant and Thomas Lewis who was keeping watch with him and both being hid behind some boards which were reclined against one of the sheds, saw the prisoner come into the yard through the gateway from the turnpike road, and came to within a short distance from where the examinant and his companion were hid. After staying for a minute and seemingly to witness and his companion looking at dog kennel which had lately been removed to the end of one of the buildings, witness and his companion saw the prisoner go out of the gateway and watching him he then went along the outside of the wall and along the towing path adjoining the canal, and after going completely round the yard he entered it again from the turnpike road through to the gateway where he had first entered and witness then saw him go direct up towards the shed called the cooking house. This shed was about 16 or 18 yards from where the examinant and Thomas Lewis were hid. The prisoner then twice returned from towards the cooking house and seemed to examinant to be looking towards the dog kennel. At last he went again towards the door of the cooking house and within a few minutes his companion observed to examinant that he heard the sound of the lock and that they had better go on. Accordingly they both went that way and found the door open and the prisoner inside the cooking house and coming back towards the door. Examinant's companion and himself immediately laid hold of him and prisoner wanted to know what they meant to do with him. They told him that he must come with them to Mr Dax which prisoner agree to do, and on proceeding that way examinant and his companion having each hold of him, they had not gone above 10 yards from the door of the cooking house when prisoner pushed Thomas Lewis down and having got loose from him he attempted also to get loose from examinant by striking him. He struck examinant two of three times but

Lewis having recovered himself they both of them struggled with him and threw him on the ground and secured him. Whilst witness and his companion was securing the prisoner he begged them very hard to let him go and to say nothing about it, which they refused to do. The cooking house was always locked of a night with a padlock and staple. Examinant did not examine whether anything was missing when they laid hold of the prisoner nor whether he had anything in his possession. The mark of John Humphreys.

**Presentment-theft.** [1827T1]

The jurors present that Thomas Gabriel of pa. Meifod, labourer, on 25 April 1827 with force and arms at the said parish one shawl of the value of 7s, and one handkerchief of the value of 7s, property of John Lloyd, did feloniously steal, take and carry away. *At the foot:* Prosecutor and witness: John Lloyd. Witness: William Jones. Sworn in court. *On the reverse:* A true bill.

**Order.** Larceny. Guilty. Prisoner to be confined in the house of correction for fourteen days and afterwards discharged. Pay prosecutor's costs. [1827T/SO/4/572]

**Presentment-assault.** [1827T2]

The jurors present that John Williams of pa. Llanerfyl, labourer, on 17 June 1827 with force and arms at the said parish in the night time at twelve o'clock 20 yards of woollen cloth called flannel of the value of 20s, and further presented that on 17 June 20 yards of other woollen cloth called flannel of the value of 20s property of the said John Lloyd, did feloniously steal, take and carry away. *On the reverse:* Prosecutor and witness: Jane Williams. Witnesses: David Evans, John Lloyd, Elias Rowland, William Jones, Robert Francis. Sworn in court. A true bill.

**Order.** Larceny. Jury say not guilty. Pay prosecutor's costs. [1827T/SO/4/571-2]

Witnesses: Jane Roberts, William Roberts, Susan Evans, Littleton Brown, Mary ..., Thomas Evans, Hannah Smout. Sworn in court. *On the reverse:* A true bill.

**Order.** Larceny. Guilty. That all three prisoners be transported for seven years. Pay prosecutor's costs. [1827T/SO/4/571]

**Presentment-theft.** [1827T5]

The jurors present that Daniel Jones and John Edwards, both of Newtown, labourers, on 9 May 1827 with force and arms at the said parish one crabfish of the value of 6d, and one other fish of the value of 6d, property of Thomas Rees, did feloniously steal, take and carry away. *At the foot:* Prosecutor and witness: Thomas Rees. Witnesses: Thomas Hall, Rowland Jones, Thomas Rees. Sworn in court. *On the reverse:* A true bill.

**Order.** Larceny. Guilty. Prisoners to be confined separately and apart from each other in the house of correction for fourteen days and at the end of the first seven days thereof they be stripped from the waist upwards and privately whipped by the keeper and at the expiration of the imprisonment they be again stripped from the waist upwards and privately whipped by the said keeper. Pay prosecutor's costs. [1827T/SO/4/572-3]

**Examinations-theft.** [1827T6]

Examinations taken before Edward Pugh and Thomas Davies.

Examination of Susannah Evans of the Canal Public House, Says that about three o'clock on Monday afternoon last the two women who are now present Hannah Fox and Esther Ogden with another woman came to her house and had a pint of beer together. They then went out together, returned between six and seven o'clock as she believes and had tea together. When examinant took in the tea she saw the prisoner James Smith there who was asked by the woman who is about to take some tea with them but that he declined it. He had a pint of beer. After tea the woman who is absent came and asked where her bundle was out of the parlour. It was the bundle containing the pieces of cotton. Examinant informed her she had locked it up. The woman then said don't go into the parlour to wake my husband he is asleep. I am going up street, I will be back in a few minutes. Believes she said she was going in search of Mrs Ogden to get supper. She never returned. Susan Evans.

Examination of Littleton Brown of Welshpool, labourer. Says that about nine o'clock last night William Roberts desired him to go and search the privy at the top of his yard to see if he could find any of the fag ends. He went there, took a candle and putting it in the hole of the seat perceived something which he at first thought was paper. He took it out which being all over dirt he washed and is the same now produced. The privy he found the cotton was adjoining the one William Roberts makes use of – it is marked '648'. Littleton Brown\*.

Examination of Mary Fox of Welshpool, widow. Says that about eight or nine o'clock last night going to the privy which adjoins the one Mr Roberts makes use of she found inside the hole in the dirt two pieces of

printed cotton which she took and washed and are the same now produced marked '758'. The mark of Mary Fox.

Examination of Thomas Evans, apprentice to Morris Jones of Welshpool, mercer. Says that the piece of printed calico produced marked '648' is the fag end of a piece which was lost out of his master's shop and appears to have been torn off the piece now produced. That the piece of printed calico buff ground now produced is also the property of his master Morris Jones and that the fag end found by Mary Fox is part of this piece. That the piece of printed calico drab ground is also the property of Morris Jones. That the two pieces of calico green ground are also the property of Morris Jones, and that the piece of calico aforesaid marked '648', the piece with a buff ground and the pieces with a green ground have been stolen from his master's shop. Thomas Evans\*.

**Examinations-theft. [1827T7]**

Examinations taken before Edward Pugh and Thomas Davies.

Examination of Jane wife of William Roberts, one of the sergeants at mace of the borough of Welshpool. Says that yesterday evening about six o'clock being in the privy in the yard adjoining to her husband's house in Welshpool close adjoining to which was another privy with a thin partition wall. That as examinant went in her own privy a female came out of the other and in a couple of minutes or so, some females came into the adjoining one and unlapped something as appeared to examinant and one of them said tear off the fag and immediately it was torn as she supposed from the noise. One of them said this is a nice shawl another then said hush there is someone near, and afterwards they whispered. Examinant heard no more, she remained there till they went away. That in less than an hour afterwards she told her husband and just then the woman she saw come out of the privy passed by. When examinant informed him what she had heard the persons in the privy say he then went out as she supposes after her. Esther Ogden is the person she saw come out of the privy. Jane Roberts\*.

Examination of the said William Roberts. Says that in consequence of what his wife had informed him he followed the woman she had pointed out to several places and at last took her up and suspicious of having stolen something he took her to Mr Morris Jones, the mercer's and out of the reticule pulled out a piece of Irish cloth. Now he then left her in custody there and went in search of the other women, (his wife having informed him there were three) and found two strange women one of whom observed to the other "damn her she is drinking somewhere" which induced examinant to believe they were accomplices with the one he left in custody at Morris Jones's as above. Examinant having sent for his workman watched the two women to near the Queen's Head, the outskirts of the town, one of whom Hannah Fox returned back into the town, the other he lost, afterwards he went to the Canal House being informed by his man the woman he followed (Hannah Fox) went there, and enquiring from Frances the daughter of Evan Evans of that house whether there were any women in the house who after looking returned and said there was and also that there was a man there selling prints and cotton, he then took her, Hannah Fox, and the man into custody. A bundle was then delivered to him by Mrs Evans which contained four pack of four pieces of prints for gowns and a shawl lapped up in a piece of cloth. Examinant found under a table in the room in which Hannah Fox and the man were two reticules one containing a gown, a shawl, a piece of print, about a yard of Irish cloth, and some butter; the other containing a new shawl, an old one, two aprons, and some other trifles. Looking into the reticules to see what was in them the man said let them alone they belong to me, put them back again. William Roberts\*.

**Examinations-theft. [1827T8]**

9 May 1827. Examination of Thomas Rees, sawyer, of pa. Penbryn, co. Cardigan, taken before G.A. Evors and William Pugh. Says that the crab fish produced by the constable Rowland Jones is his property to the best of his knowledge. That he knows it by the broken claw that the last time he saw it was in his hamper on his horse in pa. Newtown. That he is quite sure he never sold the crab now produced. Thomas Rees\*.

Recognizance. Thomas Rees of Penbryn, co. Cardigan, fisherman, to appear and prosecute; John Edwards and Daniel Jones, for felony, under £20.

Thomas Hall of Newtown, manufacturer, Rowland Jones of the same, constable; to appear at next Q.S. to give evidence, under £10 each.

Examination of Thomas Hall of Newtown. Says that he this day saw the prisoner Daniel Jones take something out of the hamper of Thomas Rees in pa. Newtown and put it under his coat and went off. That Edwards was with him and they went away together. Thomas Hall\*.

Examination of Rowland Jones, constable. Says that he this day apprehended Daniel Jones when he found concealed under his coat the crab fish which he now produces. When he first saw him John Edwards was

with him on a bench eating the crab fish and had one of the claws in his mouth and when they saw deponent coming Daniel Jones put the crab fish under his coat. Rowland Jones\*.

**Order-removal.** [1827T9]

26 May 1827. To the churchwardens and overseers of pa. Trefeglwys. Upon the complaint made unto us, two J.P.s, and one of us of the quorum that Evan Evans, Hannah his wife, Evan, Hannah, their children, have come to inhabit and are actually chargeable to your parish, not having gained a legal settlement. We, upon due proof, adjudge that her lawful settlement is in pa. Llanidloes. Order to remove and to receive. Charles Thomas Jones, M.E. Lloyd. *At the foot:* Order of adjournment delivered, T.E.M.

**Examinations-theft.** [1827T10]

Examination of John Lloyd of Rhos-y-gall in pa. Llanerfyl, fuller. Says that on Friday night or early on Saturday morning last he lost from off the tenter hooks a quantity of flannel property of Jane Williams left with him for the purpose of dressing. That he went into the house and spoke to his family. That they enquired how much was missing and that he thought there were about twenty yards or rather more. That on Saturday evening upon his return from Llanfair market he was accosted by a neighbour, called John Bebb, and asked if he had lost any flannel to which he replied that he had. That John Bebb said that some flannel supposed to be stolen was found at Llanfair. That yesterday morning he sent his wife to the prosecutrix to inform her of her loss and what information he had from John Bebb. That on Monday morning he came to Llanfair with a piece of the flannel so as to compare it with the supposed stolen part which exactly corresponds with the one in the possession of Elias Rowland. John Lloyd\*.

Examination of Thomas Thomas, bailiff to Jane Roberts of Caestwbwrn, Llanerfyl. Says that he knew his mistress had sent a piece of flannel to John Lloyd the fuller to be dressed. That John Lloyd told his mistress's eldest daughter that someone had stolen about twenty yards of her flannel. That John Lloyd's wife came to his mistress's house and told her that she had heard that some part of the flannel lost was found in Llanfair and requested the prosecutrix to accompany John Lloyd to Llanfair to ascertain the identity of the lost flannel. That as the mistress was too ill to attend he did so at her request. That he accordingly came to Llanfair with said John Lloyd who brought a piece of his mistress's flannel and went to Elias Rowland to compare it which exactly corresponds. The mark of Thomas Thomas.

Examination of Elias Rowland of Llanfair, shopkeeper. Says that John Jones the prisoner came into his shop on Saturday evening about seven o'clock and called examinant one side and asked him if he would buy a small piece of flannel from him as he was quite out of bread. That examinant asked him where he had had that piece of flannel. That prisoner told him that he bought ten yards of it at Llanfyllin Fair. That examinant measured the flannel produced and found it was three yards. That examinant asked prisoner where the remainder of the flannel was and prisoner said that his wife had used it. That prisoner said if he would let him have 2s or 2s 6d until the Tuesday or Wednesday following he would return the money and take the flannel back. That examinant told the prisoner that he thought the flannel was not worth so much money. That prisoner asked examinant what he thought it was worth as he had given 11d a yard for it at Llanfyllin. That examinant made no reply as to its value but told him that he was sorry to say that he thought it was stolen as the flannel appeared wet as if lately taken from the tenters. That prisoner told examinant he had been about the county endeavouring to sell the flannel and that he had dropped it into some water. Examinant asked him where he had offered it and prisoner answered at Mr Lloyd of Rhiwhiriaeth. That examinant told the prisoner that he could neither buy the flannel nor release it to him as he thought it was stolen. Prisoner said "Let me have the flannel as the market is nearly over and I want to buy some bread". Call in half an hour said examinant to the prisoner who then went out. That in the meantime examinant made enquiries. When he met with one Rowland Hughes who informed him that he thought that was part of the twenty yards that had been stolen from Rhos-y-gall fulling mill. That prisoner in a short time returned and wanted the flannel back but examinant said that he could not let him have the flannel nor let him go and then placed him under the care of a constable. Elias Rowland\*.

**Examinations-theft. [1827T18]**

30 April 1827. Examination of Jane Lloyd of Meifod, spinster, taken before Thomas Williams, J.P. That on Wednesday evening last 25 instant she was attending in her father's shop at Meifod saw Thomas Gabriel of Dyffryn, labourer, near the said shop on the outside. That he was then in the act of taking off his hat, then taking a shawl out of it and putting it in again. Examinant went immediately to examine the shawls which had been left on her father's counter a few months before and then found that one of them was missing. Thomas Gabriel having afterwards gone into the public house opposite to her father's house, kept by William Phillips and known by the name of the Lion, she spoke to William Jones who in consequence of what she said to him brought to her in the parlour from the kitchen where Thomas Gabriel there was a hat with a shawl in it which shawl she recognised to be her father's property and which had been left on the counter a few minutes before said Thomas Gabriel passed the shop. Soon after examinant sent for the prisoner Thomas Gabriel and desired him to come to her into the parlour she asked him for the shawl which she had seen in his hat, he replied that he had no shawl there, she desired him to look into his hat which he did and it was not there. She said that he had it somewhere. He then put his hand into one pocket and found it not, and then into another pocket from where he took it out. She took it from him and said that it was their (meaning her parents) shawl and asked how could he take it. He said that he thought it was his pocket handkerchief. Examinant is sure that it was her father's shawl. Jane Lloyd\*.

Examination of William Jones of Meifod. That he is the nephew of Mrs Phillips whose husband keeps the Lion Inn at Meifod. That on Wednesday last 25 instant in consequence of something said to him by Miss Jane Lloyd the preceding examinant he went into the kitchen of the said inn and took Thomas Gabriel's hat off his head and found a shawl in the hat. That he then brought the said hat and shawl into the parlour upon which Jane Lloyd said that the shawl was theirs. Said Thomas Gabriel followed examinant into her parlour and asked him for his hat, which he gave him without any remark. When deponent returned the hat the hollow part of the crown was uppermost so that it was easy to see the shawl in the inside. Deponent went out immediately afterwards and the prisoner returned into the kitchen. Deponent soon afterwards re-entered the house and desired Thomas Gabriel going into the parlour, deponent stood by the door and heard distinctly all that was said in the parlour. Heard Jane Lloyd ask the prisoner where was the shawl. He denied it and said that he had no shawl. Jane Lloyd replied that he must have it about him. Examinant was not in a situation to see what was done, but when Jane Lloyd and Thomas Gabriel came to the door deponent heard Thomas Gabriel say that he thought it was his pocket handkerchief and pulled out his pocket handkerchief which kerchief being now shown by the prisoner he believes to be that which he then showed to him, the said Jane Lloyd then held the shawl by thee handkerchief and observed that there was a deal of difference between them. **Report-bridge.** [1828M18]

Having this day along with Mr Stanton (the river being low) examined the new bridge over the river Efyrynwy near Llanymynech I found the whole bridge and approaches executed in a very workmanlike manner, more especially the masonry which is perfect in its kind. The foundations of the piers and abutments (as I am informed by Mr Stanton) have been secured by piling agreeable to what was recommended in my report of 20 December 1826. I have only now to add that I recommend that the whole space between the piers and also the abutments be further filled with rubble stone up to the level of the river bed and that this rubble filling be

continued for at least ten yards above and below the points of the piers and abutments. Upon the roads of approach to and over the bridge the surface requires to be requested, all the stones should be completely broken so that every stone should in its largest dimensions pass through a ring of 2 ½ inches diameter, and the surface should be made smooth by a coat of binding gravel 1 ½ inch in thickness. Thomas Telford\*, Llanymynech, 25 September 1828. On the reverse: Letter from Joseph Laxdale\* of the Clerk of the peace's office, Shrewsbury, to lordships. On the other side I have the honour to transmit to your lordships a copy of Mr Telford's report relative to the Efyrynwy bridge.

That one of them asked witness if they should come into the boat to sleep, to which witness consented, and George Thomas



came into the boat in which witness and Richard Lewis were, and Richard Davies went into Robert Morgan's boat close adjoining. That witness went to sleep and when he and Richard Lewis woke in the morning George Thomas and Richard Davies were gone and Richard Lewis immediately discovered he had lost some copper, his watch, his shoes and his hat. That witness told Lewis he supposed that George Thomas and Richard Davies had stolen them. That they searched for them about the lock and places adjacent but could not find them. That witness also lost a handkerchief the same night out of the boat. That a few days ago he saw George Thomas at Welshpool and asked him where his handkerchief was, who said "he never had it but Richard Davies had it". That it was about the latter end of May when the articles were stolen out of the boat. Robert Morgans\*.

Says that yesterday morning about five o'clock John Davies, the last witness, informed him that he had seen the prisoner John Edwards conceal something in Mr Salisbury's garden. That witness went into the garden and searched the place pointed out to him by Davies and there found the leather and tea now produced concealed under some grass. Edward Woolley\*.

The voluntary examination of John Edwards the prisoner. Says I was passing Mr Salisbury's potato field yesterday morning. That I saw the two parcels now produced in the field and I went into the field and picked them up and hid them in another part of the same field under some grass. John Edwards\*.

Says that about twelve o'clock at night I went into Richard Lewis's cabin to Robert Morgan and Richard Lewis and slept there until I was awoke by Richard Davies who had come with me to the boat the preceding night. But your committee have to remark that out of this balance and in conformity to the directions of the court at the last Q.S. the sum of £67 19s 10d to be paid to the treasurers of the Efyrynwy bridge by Llanymynech towards reducing he interest due on 1 May November last; and the sum of £150 in liquidation of the principal; and your committee having directed our county treasurer to pay the same, the balance therefore which shall be in his hands after deducting the said two sums last attended to will be £1015 4s 3½d instead of the said sum of £1233 4s 1½d. Examination of Owen Thomas of Llanrhaeadr, constable. Says that having heard that a watch had been left at John Jones's he went there and enquired for it. That John Jones's daughter gave him the watch which is the same as he now produces.

Examination of William Jones, the prisoner. On being cautioned by me not to say anything to criminate himself says that on the night before Llanrhaeadr November fair 1827 he slept at the 3 Tuns Public house in Llanrhaeadr in the same bed as Roger Jones. And that on 31 June the servant Williams permitted Oliver to go into the garden alone to work as he had before been permitted when he ran way but was brought back to the gaol on 5 July by his father

As to Edward Edwards aged 33, it appears that he was convicted at the last Spring Great Sessions of stealing a pair of steel snuffers and sentenced to two years imprisonment in gaol. That on Tuesday last at ten o'clock in the forenoon the gaoler sent Edwards and also Edward Oliver who had before escaped, to assist his turnkey and his servant Williams to stack his hay in a field half a mile from the gaol. That the prisoners were in plain clothing and not ironed, and that Edwards escaped from the field about twelve o'clock and has not been retaken.

Examination of Robert James of Dyffryn, farmer. Says that on Thursday night last about nine o'clock he was returning from Welshpool on foot along the turnpike road towards Berriew. That between the turnpike and Mr Davies's house called the Moat two women passed by him and he overtook them immediately after and enquired if they were going far that way and one of them answered no they expected some company when he left them and the two women stopped and he went on about 150 yards and suspecting that the women were upon no good

stopped and got into a field and went back and when at the place where he left the women got into the road and as he got over the gap into the road he heard geese making a noise on the other side of the road. That he still heard a noise of fluttering and came along the road to the gate opening into Mr Davies's barley stubble and along the side of the hedge to a watering place with bushes, when there was a fluttering noise and he went round the bushes and as he went round it he met the prisoner Margaret Hibbot and caught hold of her by the arm and the other woman, the prisoner Mary Davies, was close by her. That he said to Hibbott now I have caught thee, when she begged him to say nothing and he saw something in the ditch close by them and went to it and put his hand upon it and found it to be a thin sort of cloth with a goose in it, and said they had been at few tricks and they both begged him to say nothing and Davies said she had never done such thing before and that Hibbott had enticed her. That they both begged him to say nothing and Hibbott asked him what they were to do with the goose and Hibbott said they wanted to catch another but that they made a noise. That the bag and goose were left in the ditch and the women came to the road with him when being sorry for Davies who said she was a married woman he suffered them to go. That the following morning he went and informed Mr Davies of the Moat of what he had seen and they went to the field and there found one of the geese nearly dead lying near the gate of the field. That when he caught the prisoner Hibbott he saw a flock of geese moving from the watering place a short distance from them. Robert James\*.

Examination of Richard Davies of the Moat. That on Tuesday evening last he was in his barley stubble adjoining the road to Berriew about six o'clock and saw and counted Mr Baggaley's 19 geese that had been put here to feed and left them safe in the field. That the following morning about nine or ten o'clock Mr James of Dyffryn informed him that he had detected the prisoners stealing the geese the night before when they went to the stubble and found one of the geese near the gate with her neck nearly broken and unable to move. That the other geese were then in the field and Mr James went to the watering place and found a large stake and feathers where the geese had been caught. Richard Davies\*.

20 October 1829. T.E. Marsh, junior, Llanidloes, to [clerk of the peace]

King on the prosecution of Hugh Jones against Richard Cleaton of Llanidloes, yeoman, but now a prisoner in Montgomery gaol for disturbing a congregation of Calvinistic Methodists. I sent this by a purpose messenger as instructions for indictment against the prisoner. In this town there is a Methodist chapel called the Bethel Chapel a place for religious worship for protestant dissenters called Calvinistic Methodists. Upon Sunday evening 13 September last one William Williams, a Methodist preacher, was preaching to a large congregation in the Bethel Chapel, and during that divine service the prisoner came unto the chapel and disturbed the congregation in the way you will see stated in the enclosed (copies of the depositions) taken by the magistrate who committed the prisoner to gaol for want of sureties. You will of course observe in making out the indictment that it is absolutely necessary to prove that the Bethel Chapel was certified and registered which I believe you will find in your Q.S. book was about 28 April 1808, and you will please to send me a copy of the entry by the bearer and not fail letting that book be brought down to Montgomery, as without it we cannot proceed against the prisoner.

15 September 1829. Examination of John Jones of the town of Llanidloes, carpenter, taken before George Meares, J.P. Says that he was present at the Bethel Chapel in Llanidloes on Sunday evening 13 instant. That he saw Richard Cleaton of Llanidloes, yeoman, come into the chapel. That he saw him go into the gallery and sit in Henry Hamer's pew and he appeared very much disguised in liquor. That he sat there nearly ten minutes when he began to wave his handkerchief and call out aloud several times, addressing himself to the preacher "A damned liar", "The man tells a lie", "He is a damned liar". Examinant was within a few

yards of him. Several persons then went to him and they forced him down the stairs and at this time there was great disturbance in the chapel by the noise then made. Saw several of the female part of the congregation fainting at the time. Examinant then went down stairs and when he saw Richard Cleaton was out he went and bolted the door after him. John Jones\*. The words "A damned liar" were spoken by the prisoner while he was in the pew. The other words, "The man tells a lie", "He is a damned liar" were spoken by the prisoner aloud when being taken down the gallery stairs.

Examination of Henry Mills of the town of Llanidloes, weaver. Says that he was present at the Bethel Chapel in Llanidloes on Sunday evening 13 instant. That he seemed to be very drunk and began to talk something to the persons in the pew. In about ten minutes he drew out his handkerchief and waved it about and called out several time addressing the preacher "That's a lie, a damned lie". He soon after went out of the pew and made for the stairs, and continued to repeat the same words and other improper expressions. That examinant with several others forced him down the stairs and took him out of the chapel. The congregation seemed very much disquieted and alarmed by his improper conduct. Henry Mills\*.

That persons appearing on recognizance at the Q.S. to present or give evidence against any person who is accused of felony and requesting payment of costs and expenses incurred in such prosecution by virtue of the statute 7George IV ... chap. 64 shall be allowed sums not exceeding the underwritten rates for such costs or expenses in case they duly attend and prosecute and give evidence pursuant to the subpoenas or the conditions of their recognizances respectively undeliceit?

Prosecutors and witnesses: Expenses incurred in attending before the examining magistrates if allowed by him. All charges paid to the officers of the court. To every gentleman of any of the three professions – divinity, law and physic, for every day's attendance to give evidence £1; to every other person so attending any sum not exceeding 6s for each attendance.

Travelling, not less than 3d no more than 6d per mile on the journey to attend the court and the like on the return home. But if he attends more than one day then also for each intermediate night, half a day's allowance. Then it shall be made to appear by satisfactory evidence that any prosecutor or witness under recognizance or subpoena is a person of great infirmity unable to travel on foot or horseback such allowance additionally to be made for travelling expenses as the court may deem reasonable.

Solicitors: examining of witnesses and taking instructions for brief 13s 4d; Drawing brief and fair copy £1; Instructions for indictment attending for it and to get witnesses sworn and attending the grand jury 6s 8d; advocate with brief £1; Bill of indictment swearing witnesses and other charges to the clerk of the peace ...; Bailiff with bill to the grand jury 1s; Attending to conduct the prosecution for each day after first £1. Travelling expenses 6d per mile going and returning, but to be allowed only on one prosecution conducted by him at the same sessions. If more than one the allowance be apportioned between the different prosecutions by the clerk of the peace but if he returns more than ... then also for each intermediate ... allowance.
