We, upon due proof, adjudge that her lawful settlement is in pa. Llanfair. Order to remove and to receive. Griffith Howel, John Lloyd. *At the foot*: Adjourned, Woodcock. **Order**. Hearing and determining adjourned to the next Q.S. [1830H/SO/5/27]

Examinations-theft. [1830H3]

22 December 1829. Examination of James Morgan of Llanrhystyd, co. Cardigan, taken before John D. Corrie and Edward Pugh, J.P.s. Says that he carried fish about for sale and that he frequently comes with fish to Welshpool. That he came to Welshpool yesterday morning with three salmon and some oysters for sale. That he left his cart stand upon the street near the Top Eagles with the fishes and oysters. That he sold one of the fish at the Oak and another to Hughes of the Lower Eagle. That the fish he left in his basket in the cart was a he fish and of the weight of 7 lbs or better. That about eleven o'clock last night Samuel Davies of Welshpool came to examinant and desired him to examine his cart to see if he had not lost anything. That he then searched the cart and missed the fish and a quantity of oysters. That the fish now produced is a he fish and is about the weight of the fish which he had in his basket. That examinant saw the prisoner about his cart about seven o'clock that evening. James Morgan*.

Examination of William Boston of Welshpool, hostler at the Marquis of Wellington in the town of Welshpool. Says that six or seven o'clock on Saturday evening the prisoner brought a salmon and asked him to weigh it. That examinant took the fish accordingly to Mr Lloyd Davies's and had it weighed. It weighed 7 ¼ lbs. Examinant took the fish back to the prisoner who tied up in his apron and examinant observed that he had a quantity of oysters. That prisoner left the fish and oysters at the Marquis of Wellington chair? and asked the servant girl to put it in the cellar for him, which she refused to do but put it outside of the back door. The mark of William Boston.

Examination of Samuel Davies one of the sergeants-at-mace for the borough of Welshpool. Says that observing the prosecutor's cart standing upon the street opposite the Top Eagles about half past nine o'clock last night he enquired whose cart it was, and being told that the person to whom it belonged was in the house he went into the house and saw the prosecutor and told him to remove his cart and that it must not stay there. That about eleven o'clock the same night he again went to the Upper Eagles, and seeing the prosecutor's cart still standing on the street where he had before seen it examinant took hold of the horse which was standing it and led it towards the Bull bridge intending to take charge of it and to bring forward the prosecutor to following day before the magistrates for having a cart on the street. That the prosecutor overtook examinant when he got to the Bull bridge and asked to have the cart back. That the prosecutor having examined his cart at the request of the examinant he discovered that he had lost a salmon which he had left in his cart. Upon hearing this and having some suspicion of the prisoner from having seen him near the cart the first time he went to the Eagles he went in pursuit of the prisoner and found him at his lodgings and upon telling him his suspicions he accompanied the examinant to the prosecutor and offered to pay for the fish and to pay for it as £3 and he then said if examinant would let him go he would go and see for the fish. Examinant however would not let him go but put him in the crib and went himself to the Marquis of Wellington where the fish now produced and the oysters were brought to him by William Boston the last witness. That the prisoner asked witness to let him go and that he would satisfy the man for his fish. Samuel Davies*.

You are commanded that you omit not by reason of any liberty of your county but that you enter the same and of all the goods and chattels and tenement s of all and singular the persons in the several extracts of this court annexed you cause to be levied the debts and sums of money upon them in the same extracts severally imposed and charged so that the money may be ready at the next

Q.S. and if any of the said extracts cannot be levied by reason of no goods or chattels to be found belonging to the parties that you take the bodies of the parties refusing to pay and lodge in the county gaol to await the decision of the next Q.S. and have you there this writ. Witness: Earl of Powis, Keeper of the Rolls of the county.

Examinations-theft. [1830H5]

18 November 1829. Examination of John Lodwick, Owen Lodwick and William Howls of pa. Llanfyllin taken before David Hughes, J.P. Says that having some suspicion that some wheat had been frequently stolen out of his barn, he, accompanied by Owen Lodwick and William Howls in the night of Tuesday 17 instant, remained on the premises to watch the barn. About 7 o'clock he heard some conversation between the said Owen Lodwick and some person who had then come out of the cowhouse adjoining the said barn. He immediately went up to them and found that it was John Evans, a person employed by him, examinant, in thrashing wheat who had a bag in his hand containing a quantity of wheat which he had taken out of his, examinant's, barn. Examinant asked him what is this you have John when prisoner said "It is only a little wheat". Owen Lodwick says that being desired by his brother John to remain on his premise on the night of 17 instant he placed himself in a cowhouse near the barn. That about 7 o'clock a person opened the door of the cowhouse and opened the door in order to go out when examinant fastened him and found a bag in his hand containing the barn and in a short time afterwards returned into the cowhouse and opened the door in order to go out when examinant fastened him and found a bag in his hand containing a quantity of wheat. Examinant asked him what he was doing but prisoner gave him no answer. Examinant then accompanied by John Lodwick and William Howls conveyed him before the magistrate.

William Howls says that being desired by John Lodwick to remain on his premises on the night of 17 instant to watch the barn, he accordingly did and that about seven o'clock of the same night he heard Owen Lodwick ask some person 'what is this or what are you doing or words to that effect' when he immediately went to them and found the prisoner with a bag in his hand containing a quantity of wheat. Examinant accompanied John and Owen Lodwick with the prisoner before the committing magistrate. John Lodwig*, Owen Lodwig*, William Howls.

Examinations-theft. [1830H6]

n.d. Examination of John Thomas taken before G.A. Evors. Says that he is servant to Mr Ellis in Newtown; that he looks after his horse. That about a month ago he found a cask of porter in Mr Ellis's dunghill; that he told young Mr Ellis of it; that Bevan Edwards came and looked at the cask or barrel and said it was his brother Edwards and took it away. That the cask was concealed under the dung. The mark of John Thomas. Examination of Evan Bevan Edwards. Says that about a month ago he was informed that a barrel of porter had been found in Mr Ellis's dunghill and his brother Edward Edwards having had one stolen of him a few days before he went and found that it belonged to his brother and took it home with him. That his brother was then absent at Shrewsbury and on his return he delivered the same barrel to him. That his brother immediately said that it was the barrel which had been stolen out of his warehouse. E.B. Edwards*.

11 December 1829. Examination of Richard Smout of Powys Castle taken before John D. Corrie and Edward Pugh. Says that he is engaged at Powys Castle to clean the shoes of the governess and young children; that the shoes are put out for him in the morning upon the stairs near the nursery and that he takes them to clean and brings them back again. That on the morning before yesterday he fetched the shoes of the young ladies as usual for the purpose of cleaning them, and also a pair of boots belonging to the governess, Miss de

Joyres. That after having cleaned the boots for the governess he placed them near her bedroom door as usual about nine o'clock in the morning and left them there. That the boots now produced are the property of Miss de Joyres which he cleaned and placed near her bedroom door the morning before yesterday. That he knows them to be her property from having cleaned them repeatedly before and also from having seen her wear them. The mark of Richard Smout.

Examination of Samuel Davies, one of the sergeants-at-mace. Who says that having obtained a search warrant yesterday to search the house of the prisoner who lives with his father and mother in the town of Welshpool, he went to the house of the prisoner's father and mother and in a room at the top of the stairs he found the boots now produced. That the prisoner was not in the house when he first went but came in soon after and upon asking him how he got those boots she said that she had got them from the castle. That the boots now produced are the same he found in the prisoner's house and which she said that she got from the castle. Samuel Davies*.

Examination of Francis Hill Brew. Says that on Monday last he saw Sarah Pugh, the prisoner, in the passage leading to the bedrooms at Powys Castle. That he asked her who she wanted to which she replied that she wanted Mrs Neil. That she then proceeded up stairs and examinant left her. Francis Hill*.

Examination-theft. [1830H13]

12 November 1829. The voluntary examination of Owen Parry taken before G.A. Evors. Says that about a month or five weeks ago I was sleeping in Edwards the tinman's tallant. I got up about half past four o'clock next morning and came up to the market hall and could see Edward Edwards and Richard Thomas standing near the lamp in the Cross and I saw them go into the street leading to David Davies's warehouse and I went up to see where they were going. I went up the street towards the warehouse and met Richard Thomas and Edward Edwards coming out of the warehouse with sugar in their caps and pockets. When Ned saw me first he was going to strike me with a stick but Dick said "it is Owen" and then Ned did not strike me. That Dick had a long hook with three or four links at it in his hand and they told me that it belonged to John Thomas. We then went all three down Tanners Lane towards Nancy Morris's house and Edward Edwards put his arm through the window of her house and opened the door. I saw Nancy Morris come downstairs in her shift and I saw Ned give her something which I suppose was the sugar as he came out of the house with his cap in which the sugar was when he entered, on his head. The mail coach was going out as we came from the warehouse. I then went to my work. On the Sunday following we all three eat the sugar in Edwards the tinman's tallant in some milk. A boy fetched us some milk and Ned gave him money to buy it. About a week after I went into Nancy Thomas's house and Ned was there who told Nancy that I knew all about the sugar. Nancy then said it was nearly all done and I said surely it is not done already, it was enough to last till Christmas, and she said indeed it was. Nancy then said I wish you would get some tobacco to send for Richard (meaning her husband) who was working at Mr Hall's at Llanbadarn. Ned said there is no tobacco in David Davies's warehouse and that Dick had told him that tobacco was in the cellar and that it was easy to get at it as there was only one lock. The mark of Owen Parry.

Examination-theft. [1830H14]

12 November 1829. Examination of Owen Parry taken before G.A. Evors. Says that on Monday morning after Edward Edwards the blacksmith's porter was stolen, about eight o'clock Edward Edwards, who is now in the house of correction, came to him on the bridge in Newtown and said "I and Dick had fine luck last night". That they had taken a barrel of porter and two bottles out of Edwards the blacksmith's warehouse. That they had buried the barrel in Mr Ellis's dunghill and had drank the porter out of the bottles and put the empty bottles in Edwards the tinman's tannant. That examinant afterwards saw the bottles in the tallant. That Ned Edwards told him that they had broken into the warehouse with a mattock which they had out of Nancy Morris's house. That immediately after it was reported that the porter had been stolen but examinant said nothing about it. The mark of Owen Parry.

The sheriff, with the assent of the last Q.S. having advertised for a new gaoler in consequence of the negligence of the present gaoler in leaving the gaol in an insecure state and of his having taken prisoners out to work (after having been admonished) in consequence of which one lately escaped. We have enquired further into his general conduct with a view to ascertain whether he is entitled to any indulgence and also whether he ought to be allowed any and what pension under the provisions of the 26th section of the Act of 4 George IV, chap. 64 and although it appears to us that he has been negligent in the performance of his office and that his conduct in the gaol has not been strictly proper and prudent yet considering all circumstances and particularly his very advanced age and that he has executed the office for nearly thirty years we think he ought to be allowed a reasonable time to provide himself with a habitation. And we recommend upon his being removed that he be allowed a pension of only $\pounds 20$ per annum for life to be paid him by half yearly portions instead of a higher annuity which we should have considered him justly entitled to from the long time of his service had his conduct been strictly regular and proper.

Informant then took her into the parlour and left Mrs Morris with her to search and informant, looking through the glass door between the shop and parlour distinctly saw Mrs Morris take from under the shawl of the prisoner two pair of silk stockings now produced which he says is his property having seen them there about half an hour before they were stolen. He then questioned her as to her having something more belonging to him but she denied saying she had nothing in her pocket besides her pocket handkerchief when

Samuel Davies having examined her pocket took another pair of silk stockings out which informant also identifies as his property being now produced. When informant discovered the two pair of stocking he sent for the sergeant-at-mace Samuel Davies who examined her as above. Edward Morris*.

Examination of Samuel Davies, one of the sergeants-at-mace for the borough of Welshpool. Says having been sent for by Mr Morris he searched the prisoner Ann Goodwin and found one pair of silk stockings in one of her pockets as described by Mr Morris when she acknowledged taking three pair of stockings and wished to pay for them. That the examinant and his fellow servant ran after the men; that they soon overtook one of them, viz. the prisoner Robert Bate. That examinant and Thomas Owen went after the other man and followed him to a road leading from Pentre Llymru mill towards Green Hall park, where he the examinant instantly knew him, who was John Williams the prisoner. That the prisoner John Williams begged upon the examinant not to say anything about the boards and asked him to take them back. That examinant about six o'clock the following morning went to the field where he detected the men the night before and found twelve pieces of oak boards, each piece being about a yard or yard and a quarter in length; that the boards appeared to be newly sawed across on the spot there being a quantity of fresh saw dust all about the place where the boards stood. Thomas Owen corroborated the evidence of the last witness in every respect, he being with Edward Ellis assisting him to detect the above prisoners and believes the boards now produced to be the boards the prisoners were sawing on Rhyscog field on the night of 26 March last. Examinations-theft. [1830T27]

5 June 1830. Information and complaint of John Pugh of Llanidloes, shopkeeper, taken before John D. Corrie and Edward Pugh, J.P.s of the borough of Welshpool. Says that on Thursday last 3 June he came to Welshpool from Llanidloes with a lot of pigs for sale which took place on the following day. That he sold the pigs yesterday in two lots; eleven in the first lot to a man of the name of Morgan and received for them two £5 Bank of England bills and two sovereigns; that one of the Bank of England notes was patched on the back of it. That he afterwards sold the remainder of the pigs to a man named Evans and received for them two £5 notes of Messrs Beck & Co Bank and half a sovereign. That he put the money which he so received into a bag or purse which he usually carried about him. That deponent put up at the Queen's Head in Welshpool, and upon leaving there after having sold his pigs and being about to return home he paid his reckoning amounting to 4s 2d, and gave half a sovereign to the woman of the house for that purpose, receiving back the difference which he put into his pocket. That there was then in his purse the $\pounds 22$ he had received for his pigs. That immediately afterwards about 12 o'clock he set out on his return home and had got about two miles or rather better from Welshpool when he put his hand into his pocket to look for his purse but found that it was gone. That he immediately returned to Welshpool to search for his purse suspecting either that he had left it at the Queen's Head which he had stopped at or that the prisoner had it. That upon making enquiry for it at the Queen's Head the people could not give him any information about it. And he thus went to search for the prisoner but could not find him anywhere in the town; his reason for suspecting that the prisoner had his money was that the prisoner was present when he received the whole of it and also when deponent paid his reckoning; that deponent never saw his purse after he had so paid his reckoning at the inn. That the prisoner is a townsman of deponent's and had been at the Queen's Head with deponent and had given him $2\frac{1}{2}$ d to pay for his upper the night before and had also promised to pay the people of the house 6d for his night's lodging and which was accordingly included in his reckoning the following day, for which the prisoner had rendered deponent some assistance in driving his pigs. That deponent not being able to find the person in the town described his person and soon heard that a boy like that he described had gone along the road towards Shrewsbury which he accordingly went in pursuit of him, and, meeting Mr Jones, one of the witnesses, at Buttington he told him of his loss and describing the person of the prisoner, Mr Jones set out on horseback in pursuit of him and deponent followed on foot. That sometime afterwards he met Mr Jones returning with the prisoner in custody of the constable and was informed that they had found the money upon the prisoner. That the bag now produced is his property and deponent also identifies positively one of the Bank of England £5 bills, the same having a patch of paper on the back of it, and deponent having objected to it on that account

when he had received it in part payment of his pigs. That deponent's initial letters of his name were upon the purse which now appears to be cut out but deponent nevertheless is able to swear and does swear that the bag now produced is his property, and which he had with him when he paid his reckoning at the inn. That the prisoner had a straw hat on when he last saw him previous to discovering the robbery and that when he saw him again in custody of the constable he had a new black hat on. The mark of John Pugh.

Examination of David Jones of the town of Welshpool. Says that on meeting John Pugh at Buttington yesterday and having heard from him of his loss and description of the prisoner he set out in pursuit of him on horseback. That he heard of him on the road and finally overtook him at the New Inn on the Shrewsbury road about seven or eight miles from Welshpool. That he was there in company with a Jew and came up to the door of the house as deponent rode up. That deponent having privately told the landlord of the house the object of his visit, and enquired for a constable. The landlord sent for a constable and deponent went into the house with the prisoner and had a glass of ale or two with him in order to keep him there until the arrival of the constable. That deponent entered into conversation with the prisoner and pretended to be in want of a £5 note when he put his hand in his pocket and brought forth the bag which is now produced. Deponent from the description which he had received from the prosecutor of his purse as well as the person of the prisoner had no doubt that the man he was in search of and accordingly upon the constable coming in he gave him in charge and charged the prisoner with having robbed a person of the money and insisted upon his giving up the person and money into witness's hands which he did immediately only asking witness who had told him he had robbed a man. That witness then gave him the bag with the contents of it to the constable and requested him to look at the contents which he accordingly did and there appeared to be three £5 notes and two sovereigns; two Bank of England £5, and one of the Messrs Beck & Co. £5 notes. That deponent took the numbers of the notes and they are the same as now produced. That witness came back with the constable having the person in custody and shortly afterwards met the prosecutor. The prisoner appeared to have a new hat on and in the conversation the prisoner admitted that he had just bought a watch of the Jew and he showed the hat to witness and asked him what he thought it was worth, and he told witness that he had given £3 for it which was afterwards confirmed by the Jew. That meeting the prosecutor on the turnpike road after leaving the New Inn and who was coming towards them in pursuit of the prisoner, witness observed "Here comes the poor man who had been robbed", to which the prisoner relied "Yes, that is John Pugh". Prisoner had previously, after asking witness what old man he had robbed, and witness replying to that, that he did not know but it was some old Welshman. Prisoner then said that if it was John Pugh, did he John Pugh tell him, witness, that he had taken the purse off the table. Witness then said "What table" wishing thereby to draw him but the prisoner then winked his eye and said to witness "Oh, I see that you are a sly one", and did not make any reply. David Jones*.

Examination of Thomas Parry of Middleton. Says that he was sent for to the New Inn yesterday to take the prisoner into custody. That he went there and found the prisoner there and Mr David Jones the last witness. Examination of Evan Thomas one of the sergeants-at-mace of the borough of Welshpool. That on receiving the prisoner from the hands of Thomas Parry, constable of Middleton yesterday he searched him and found in his possession the sum of £1 5s 6d [£20 in margin] which he took from him and now produces. That upon his again searching him this day having reason to suppose that he had more money concealed about him, he found the further sum of 5s concealed in his clothing, viz., a half-crown in each stocking which he also now produces. Evan Thomas*.

Examinations-theft. [1830T27b]

25 June 1830. Examination and complaint of John Bird of the Bishops Moat [Castlewright], labourer, taken before Charles Thomas Jones, J.P. Says that he wore his handkerchief now produced about his neck on Sunday last and put it into his jacket pocket when he went to bed and hung his jacket on the post of the bed and saw the handkerchief with the corner hanging out of the pocket on Tuesday morning last at five o'clock when he rose to go to his work. That he knows the handkerchief by the iron mold mark on the one corner about which he and his wife had been talking and thought if had been blood but it could not be washed out. That on Monday night last the prisoner (Ann Bowdler) came into his house at about eleven o'clock and he got up and the prisoner organised for John Matthews who had occupied his house and said she was his sister and begged of him to let her have lodging and he consented and she slept with examinant's wife and he (examinant) and his wife got up in the morning of Tuesday leaving the prisoner in bed and he went from home to his work. That on Wednesday morning he went in search of the prisoner and found her at Presteigne and charged her with stealing his handkerchief which she denied. He brought her back to Clun and there heard that she had lodged at Mrs Elizabeth Rickard's on the night after she left his house and went

to Mrs Rickard's house and told her he was come for the handkerchief that the bonny woman had left there for her lodging. When Mrs Rickard said he should have it if he would give her three pence, at which time he saw his handkerchief on the dresser and claimed it and took it away and is the same he now produces. The mark of John Bird.

Examinations-theft. [1830T28]

24 May 1830. Examination of Richard Skellorn, Edward Edwards and Edward Furney of the parish of Llanfyllin, farmers, taken before Edward Foulkes and Thomas Bibby, JP's.

Richard Skellorn of Rhyscog, farmer, says that on Saturday 27 March last about one or two o'clock in the afternoon he went into one of the fields belonging to the farm in his occupation and found a quantity of oak boards. Thinking they belonged to his landlord took them into the court before Rhyscog house door. That soon afterwards Edward Edwards, Mr Gill's tenant at Coedarle came to examinant and told him that the boards he had removed belonged to Mr Gill and took them away. That the boards now produced are the same boards which he removed. Richard Skellorn*.

The said Edward Edwards says that he took the boards which he found at Rhysgog court and delivered them to Edward Furney the constable and that the boards now produced are the same which he delivered to the said Edward Furney. Edward Edwards*.

The said Edward Furney says that the boards now produced are the same which the said Edward Edwards brought him and which were kept in his possession until they were produced before the magistrates. The mark of Edward Furney.

David Griffiths of Pentre llymry in pa. Llanfyllin, stonemason, says that he was present on the night of 26 March last saw John Thomas at the time he was overtaken by Edward Ellis and Thomas Allen. John Thomas asked examinant to go with him to take the boards back. That examinant asked John Thomas where the boards came from. That he answered that they came from the Old Hall. That examinant replied that he would not meddle or have nothing to do with him or the boards and returned home. The mark of David Griffiths. The voluntary statement of Robert Bate of Llanfvllin, shoemaker. The said Robert Bate being charged before us in the custody of the sergeants at mace and charged on the oaths of Edward Ellis and Thomas Owen with feloniously stealing on 26 March last at the parish of Llanfyllin a quantity of oak boards the property of James Gill Esq freely and voluntarily states that about six or seven o'clock in the evening of 26 March last at pa. Llanfyllin in company with John Thomas went to Rhyscog field to prepare the ground for potatoes. As I was returning home along the footpath about 10 o'clock that night I heard the sound of a saw. I went on with John Thomas and found a quantity of oak boards upon the footpath. I did not touch them and had not been there more than a minute when Edward Ellis came up to him and John Thomas. That I and John Thomas ran away and that Edward Ellis and Thomas Owen followed him and overtook him. The Mark of Robert Bate. The voluntary statement of John Thomas. John Thomas being charged on the oaths of Edward Ellis and Thomas Owen with feloniously stealing on the night of 26 March last at the said parish the property of James Gill Esq freely and voluntarily states that on the 26 March went to Rhyscog field with Robert Bate to prepare the ground for potatoes. On my return about 10 o'clock that night I heard the sound of a saw in this Rhyscog field. I came through the field from whence the sound proceeded and saw some boards on the ground. That I and Robert Bate passed by them along the footpath. I looked at them, was frightened, ran away and came home and went to bed. The Mark of John Thomas.

Examinations-theft. [1830T29)

1 June 1830. The information of Thomas Davis of Llanwyddelan, schoolmaster, taken before John B. Williames. That on the night of Wednesday the 12 or Thursday 13 May last past, he lost from the outside of this house nearly adjoining the road there a milking can and a milk strainer. That the constable of Pen-ymaes found those articles in the procession of John Jones of Pen-y-maes, taylor. That Jones told informant and the constable that he (Jones) had bought them of Williams James and that on their going to James he acknowledged that he had sold the above articles to Jones, and also told them that he had found them on the dunghill before informant's dwelling house door, on the opposite side of the road. Thomas Davies*. Richard Jones, petty constable of the township of Pen-y-maes. Says that about nine o'clock this morning he with Thomas Davies of Llanwyddelan, schoolmaster, and William Gittins of Cefncaled, farmer, searched the house of John Jones and found therein a milking can and milk strainer the property of the said Thomas Davies, and that Jones informed examinant and the said other parties that he had brought the said articles of a William James of Pen-y-maes, labourer, and that he had given him for them 6d in money and three piggins of oatmeal. They all went thence to James who confessed that he had so sold them and that he (James) had found them on the side of the road near Davies's house. Richard Jones*.

Examinations-theft. [1830T30]

28 April 1830. The information of John Williams of Sarkley, labourer, taken before H. Jones. Says that about six o'clock on Thursday evening 22nd instant he fed his cock and hen, and that about eight o'clock on the same evening on his returning home and found his cock fowl missing from the roost. On the following morning about 11 o'clock he asked his neighbour Robert Pryce if he had seen his cock fowl, and Pryce told informant that he had seen a man on the preceding evening a short distance from informant's house, carrying informant's cock fowl on his arm and that that man was proceeding along the turnpike road towards Berriew, and that he (Pryce) could swear to the cock and should know the man if he saw him again. Informant further says that the said fowl so missing is a gamecock. And that this informant from the information he has received believes that the person who carried away his said cock fowl is John Tudge of the town of Llanfair, and informant prays that a warrant may be issued for the apprehension of the said John Thomas. The mark of John Williams.

The within named John Williams says that the cock fowl now produced by George Roberts, as shown to him is his property: and it is this same cock fowl which he lost from his house on the same evening Thursday 22nd April. The mark of John Williams.

Robert Pryce, labourer, says that about soon after seven o'clock on Thursday evening 22nd on his return home from the Court Calmore towards him Hendomen, he met a man on the turnpike road near to Samuel Poulson's house there carrying a cock fowl on his arm. Examinant spoke to him and said "you have got the cock then" and that person answered "that he had", which cock fowl examinant thought was John Williams's. That he thinks the man was not drunk as he walked steady. On the following day examinant told the said John Williams that he saw a man carrying a cock last night and was going towards Garthmyl. Examinant further says that he did not tell John Williams that he could swear to the cock, but that he thought the cock was his, and says that he believes the cock now produced is John Williams's, and that he believes that John Tudge now presents is the person who so carried the cock as above stated. The mark of Robert Pryce.

George Roberts, saddler, says that he, together with Joseph Chilton of the same place, mason, yesterday morning 29 April, apprehended John Tudge of Llanfair, shoemaker, and then told him it was to answer a charge for stealing a cock fowl, and that they must have the cock to go with them to Montgomery and that he (Tudge) could make it up with the old man (meaning the owner of the cock). Tudge said that he had no money but must borrow some to take with him, and that he had bought the cock of a boy for 15d or 18d but he was then (when he bought it) so drunk that he did not know which sum he paid for it, and that he should not know the boy if he was to see him. Tudge, on being asked where the cock was answered that it was at his father-in-law's just by and said that he would go for the cock after taking his breakfast, and that he would meet examinant with it in a field (pointing to the field) which he accordingly did do and there delivered the cock into Chilton's hands in examinant's presence. And that the clock now produced by examinant is the same which Tudge saw delivered to Chilton as above stated. George Roberts*.

That he worked with examinant until the following Tuesday night when he absconded. That on the morning of Wednesday morning examinant discovered that a silver watch had been stolen out of his house, and, suspecting that the prisoner had taken same, he, examinant had handbills immediately printed and circulated in the neighbourhood. That soon afterwards he was informed that a man answering the description of the person had left a silver watch at a public house in the said village in payment for ale. That he immediately went there and found his watch; that the watch now produced is the one he lost as he knows it by the number and also from his name being written on a piece of paper inside the case of the same.

The said Thomas Lewis says that on Thursday morning the 24th the prisoner Richard Evans came to his house and called for several pints of ale, and in a short time afterwards said he had no money with him, but had engaged to work with a farmer in the neighbourhood and asked examinant to keep his watch and he paid for the same. That the watch now produced is the same which the prisoner left with him as he knows it by the number and name of the maker. Henry Ellis*, Thomas Lewis*.

The voluntary confession of Richard Evans the prisoner who was now brought before the us, J.Ps, charged with having feloniously stolen on 23 June at pa. And this deponent further says that on the faith of the above arrangement he proceeded to obtain and did obtain further information relative to the settlement of the said paupers and being prepared to

draw the case for the opinion of the said Mr Bather he did on 22nd of February last and on 7 March last write and send letters to the said John Llovd informing him thereof and requesting time to send this deponent a copy of the examination of the said paupers taken before removing them in order that this deponent might engross? the same in the said case. And in answer to the said last letter the said John Llovd informed this deponent of his inability to furnish him with a copy of the said examination. And this deponent further says that he thereupon sent Edward Jones one of the appellants to the said Griffith Howell to request him to furnish this deponent with a copy of the said ex-army nation or to procure the same and to inform this deponent what solicitor the said respondent wishes to peruse the said case on their behalf before it was submitted to the said Mr Bather, where the said Griffith Halliwell informed the said Edward Jones (as he informed this deponent) that the said extermination was in the hands of their solicitor Mr Bibby and that he could not furnish a copy without his consent but added that the respondents would rather try the appeal than have the same to the decision of counsel. Richard Pryce of Kerry, timber merchant, says that on Sunday last he was told by John Hammonds that there were two boards lying in a ditch belonging to and adjoining Kerry village. That the boards so found are his property. That he knows they are his by comparing them with the boards cut out of the same logs: but they are cut out of different trees. That he left the boards in the ditch where he first saw them. That deponent employed David Jones and John Hammonds to watch the boards on Sunday night and Monday night. That he saw the boards in the ditch on Sunday night and the next time he saw them was in his timber yard about 8.30 this morning. That he is positive that the boards seen this morning are the same as those seen by him on Sunday night in the ditch and he is also positive that the boards are his property. That the last time he saw the boards before seeing them in the ditch was on the perch in his timber yard. That the value of the boards is 7s 6d. That the boards in question are all quarter boards. Richard Pryce*.

David Jones of Kerry, constable says that he was employed together with John Hammonds to watch some boards which Mr Richard Pryce showed him in a ditch belonging to his field in the parish of Kerry and close to the village. That he watched on Sunday night and saw nothing but that about a quarter before 10 last night as he was lying in the ditch near the boards a man leapt out of Mr Pryce's field into the ditch where the boards where. That the man got out the boards from the ditch and was carrying them away when deponent followed and attempted to seize the man. That the man threw the boards in deponent's face and made his escape. That the man who ran away was dressed either in a blue or black coat, tight small clothes and grey stockings. That in consequence of information which deponent received, about 12 o'clock last night he applied for a warrant and went to Edward Pugh's house which he reached about a quarter before one. That he knocked on the door, said he was a constable and that he had a warrant against Edward Pugh who was suspected of having stolen some boards, but not receiving an answer he called upon a man, John Evans, who lived in another part of the house to let them in which he did: that Evans showed deponent the bedroom and knocked and called him by his name. Not receiving an answer he broke upon the door where he found on the bed the coat and small clothes which deponent now produces and which he believes were worn by the man who made his escape from him as above stated, and which also the prisoner Edward Pugh acknowledged in deponent's hearing to be his. That's deponent then searched every part of the house but did not find either the prisoner, his wife or children. That deponent immediately in company with George Hamer set off for prisoner's farmhouse in pa. Berriew and apprehended him there at breakfast about 7.30 this morning. That they brought him between two constables to Berriew village and there at the Talbot Inn he was handcuffed to George Hamer. That opposite Rhiwbank house gate prisoner wished to be released from his handcuffs. Deponent said he would not think of that as he had led him such a chase that morning. That deponent asked him why he should leave the house and if he did not expect him (deponent) after him, to which prisoner said he did. Deponent then asked him why he did not leave his wife there. Prisoner said he was afraid she would be frightened. Deponent asked him why he should go away and prisoner said that he went for his father to come with him up to settle with Mr Pryce this morning. That when deponent and prisoner were nearly come to Kerry village a similar dialogue conferred as that above deposed to. That deponent and John Hammonds took the boards which were thrown down by the man when he escaped and put them in Mr Pryce's timber yard and that these now produced are the same boards; that deponent cannot swear to the man who escaped but verily believes prisoner to be the man. That he has no doubt in his mind that prisoner is the man. David Jones*.

David Jones upon his oath this morning says that he has seen the prisoner Edward Pugh dressed in the clothes which were worn by the man who took away the boards from the ditch and now positively swears that Edward Pugh is the man. David Jones*.

George Hamer of Kerry, shoemaker says he was engaged by Mr Pryce in company with David Jones to search Edward Pugh's house in pa. Kerry. That they did not find there either prisoner his wife or children. That in company with David Jones he went in search of him to his father's house in pa. Berriew where they found him at breakfast about 7:30 this morning. That at Berriew deponent was handcuffed to prisoner and on the road this side of Berriew village he wished to have the handcuffs off which constable refused. That when he came to the New Inn at Kerry deponent asked prisoner if the constable touched him on the shoulder. Prisoner said no. Deponent asked him did he speak to you. Prisoner said yes. That this side of Berriew and near Kerry a conversation took place about the handcuffs which constable David Jones has deposed to and which this deponent heard. George Hamer*.

John Goodwin of Kerry, shopkeeper, says he saw the prisoner Edward Pugh in his shop in Kerry village last night between 9 and 10 o'clock and spoke to him. John Goodwin*.

John Hammonds says he was employed by Mr Pryce to watch some boards in a ditch belonging to his field adjoining Kerry village on Sunday nights and Monday nights last. That's on Sunday night he saw nothing but upon Monday night at about quarter before 10 he saw a man leap from Mr Pryce's field into the ditch, take away the boards and attempt to escape. That David Jones who was with deponent watching ran after him but that the man flung the boards into David Jones's face and got clear off. That deponent this morning with Jones and George Hamer between 12 and one o'clock went in search of Pugh to his house. That they did not find in their neither his wife or children. That he assisted David Jones the constable to carry the boards which the man flung down into Mr Pryce's timber yard. The Mark of John Hammonds.

David Jones of Kerry, shoemaker, says that after nine o'clock on Monday night opposite the Cross Lane near the village he met the prisoner Edward Pugh as he was coming to the village, going down. That deponent went into the Sign Inn and in about 10 minutes afterwards the prisoner came in who told deponent that he had met him at the Cross Lane as above stated. David Jones*.

John Evans of the Newhouse, Kerry says that about 11 o'clock on Monday night a light going up stairs in the direction of the prisoner's bedroom and the heard the noise of a footstep but that he did not see any person. John Evans*.

The prisoner being called upon to answer the above charge said that he did not take away the boards, and when called upon to explain what he meant by saying to David Jones the constable that he went for his father to come up with him to settle with Mr Pryce this morning, declined giving an explanation and also when asked to explain why he expected the constable to his house last night declined giving an answer.

Says that Sarah Syer became servant to her on the 15 October 1828 and left on 18 June 1829. That during that time the examinant missed some butter and some cheese and a small tablecloth and since the said Sarah left her service she has missed a white muslin gown and a cotton gown and small knives and forks and a green eye-shade. That yesterday she accompanied Evan Woosnam, constable of Hem, to Abermiwl alehouse to search the box of the said Sarah Syer and that a box which belonged to the said Sarah was produced to her (examinant) and the constable by Miss Jane Roberts who lives at Abermiwl Inn and the box was opened by a blacksmith and was full of clothing and amongst the items the knife and fork, the eye-shade, the breakfast cloth and the cotton apron now produced by the constable and which articles are the property of the examinant's husband and she knows the knife and fork by having others of the same make and the eye-shade by having made it for her husband; the breakfast cloth by its pattern and iron moulds and the cotton apron by having another piece from which it was taken. Elizabeth Bowen*.

Evan Woosnam, constable of Hem says that on Thursday last, 26 August he went to Abermiwl to search the box of Sarah Syer and saw it opened after being produced by Miss Jane Roberts and it was nearly full of clothing. That he found in the said box the knife and fork and the eye-shade, the breakfast cloth and the cotton apron now produced which Mrs Bowen had identified as her husband's property. Evan Woosnam*. Jane Roberts of Abermiwl, single woman, says that she hired Sarah Syer (prisoner) before May last and that she came to the service of examinant's aunt at Abermiwl in the beginning of May and her box was brought there about three weeks after and was put into the room where she was to sleep being the spare room Mrs Roberts, examinant's mother, slept in. That examinant saw the box in the room very often and at the end of two months Syer was unwell and went home to her mother at Forden and left her box behind her in the room. That she never saw the box open during the time Sarah Syer was at Abermiwl. That in August last Mrs Bowen and Mr Woosnam , a constable, and Mr Bowen came to Abermiwl to search Syer's box and examinant carried it out of the lodging room into the large room and delivered it to Mr Woosnam and Mr and Mrs Bowen at which time the box was locked and then she left the box with them.

That the gown and one of the caps belong to her fellow servant Elizabeth Jones. But the linsey apron and the other belong to herself and that the silk handkerchief is the property of her master and that she knew them from frequently seeing them before. That he saw the marks of the feet of the thieves in the dirt near the stack and traced them from it across the fields by hay that had fallen from the bundles to the canal lock near Pool Quay a distance of about half a mile. That finding that the boats of Thomas Jones and William Reynolds had remained at the lock the preceding night examinant gave information to Samuel Davies, a sergeant-at-mace of Welshpool who apprehended Jones and Reynolds and examinant saw their shoes compared with the tracks at the stack yesterday with which they corresponded accurately and he also saw two samples of hay compared with the hay in the stack this day and it was similar and examinant has no doubt from the great quantity of fennygrass and wild trefoil amongst it that the samples where part of the stack. The mark of Samuel Griffiths.

Examination of Samuel Davies of Welshpool, sheriff's officer. Says that he is employed to sell the effects of William Lloyd of Crowther's Hall in pa. Guilsfield which have been taken in distress for rent. That there is a stack of hay amongst the effects near the bank of the Severn. That Samuel Griffiths who is keeping possession of the effects informed examinant yesterday morning that some hay had been stolen from the stack the preceding night and that he suspected Thomas Jones and William Reynolds, two canal boatmen, of having stolen it. That he pursued them up the canal and overtook Thomas Jones in his boat near Brithdir kilns, and there found in the boat a bundle of hay of about hundredweight and Jones had then just taken a netfull of hay out of the bundle to feed his horse with. That he put Jones and the hay into the custody of James Jones his assistant and went on in pursuit of William Reynolds and overtook him in his boat beyond Efelfach and found a bundle of hay of about a hundredweight in the boat. That he (examinant) and his other assistant Richard Williams apprehended Reynolds and took him with the bundle of hay to Lloyd's Talbot Inn in Berriew where he found James Jones with the other prisoner Thomas Jones and his net of a hay. That he sent his assistants for the bundle of hay from Jones boat and examinant then took a sample from Reynolds

bundle and locked up the two bundles in the granary at the Inn and he and his assistants brought the two prisoners and Jones' net of hay into the crib and took off their shoes and delivered them to James Jones and examinant went down to Crowther's Hall and James Jones brought the shoes of the prisoners to the stack and examinant compared the shoes with the footsteps in the dirt at the side of the stack and the impressions in the dirt corresponded accurately with the shoes and the marks of the nails. That the samples of hay have been this day compared by examinant and James Jones and Samuel Griffiths with the haystack and from the great and unusual quantity of fennygrass that is amongst the hay examinant has no doubt that the hay found in the prisoners boats having been taken from the stack. Samuel Davies*.

Examinant of James Jones of Welshpool, labourer. Says that he is an assistant to Samuel Davies and went in pursuit of the prisoners Thomas Jones and William Reynolds yesterday up the canal and when near Brithdir and within about 40 yards of Thomas Jones boat he saw Jones taking hay out of a bundle of hay in the boat and putting it into a net for his horse. As Samuel Davies was with examinant and they charged him with stealing hay from Crowther's Hall which he denied. That examinant took charge of hay in the net and of the prisoner Jones and took him to Berriew. That he afterwards brought the prisoners Jones and Reynolds to Welshpool and saw their shoes taken off and conveyed them to Crowther's Hall with Mr Davies and Mr Griffiths and compared them with the tracks in the dirt about the stack and the prints of the nails and the shoes corresponded exactly with the tracks. That he kept the net of hay in the Welshpool and went to the stack with it today in company with Mr Davies and Mr Griffiths and the quality corresponded with the stack and it is remarkable from the quantity of fennygrass and trefoil and examinant has no doubt but hay found in Jones's boat was taken from Mr Llovd's stack. But when at Berriew Richard Williams brought the prisoner Reynolds there with a quantity of hay and a sample that was brought down to Welshpool and the two samples where there taken procession of by examinant and have been kept by him since. But on their way to Berriew Jones told examinant that the hay found in his boat was his own and that he had about a ton and a half of it in his stack. James Jones*.

Examination of Richard Williams of Welshpool. Says that he went up the canal yesterday with Samuel Davies and James Jones to apprehend the prisoners and saw Thomas Jones boat and the hay in it near Brithdir where he was taken into custody. That examinant went on with Mr Davies in pursuit of William Reynolds and found him in his boat above Efelfach with a bundle of hay where he was apprehended and brought to Berriew with the hay and a sample was taken from the bundle and brought to Welshpool with the prisoners, and the two samples of hay where there taken by James Jones. That he went down to Thomas Jones's house at Burgedin this day and examined Jones's it to be of a very different quality to what he had found in Jones's boat. Richard Williams*.

Examinations-theft. [1831H60]

6 December 1830. Examination of Andrew Davies of Tymawr in pa. Carno, farmer, taken before George Meares. Says that on Saturday night last 4th about 9.30 he happened to be standing on the ruled near his house when he saw a man at a little distance carrying a lantern and candles. Felicia Meredith, wife of Thomas Meredith of Welshpool, mason. Says that she saw the prisoner Elizabeth Shaw between six and seven o'clock last night enquiring for lodgings for her and her husband. She was at examinant's house and had with her the bundle and basket now produced. The mark of Felicia Meredith. Richard Griffiths, apprentice to Mr Griffith Parker of Welshpool says that the prisoner Elizabeth Shaw came to Mr Parker's shop and purchased a yard of calico about four o'clock yesterday afternoon. She asked for some of ribbon which I showed her a drawer with ribbons of different colours. She wanted black ribbons and asked to look at some. Examinant went to fetch another draw containing black ribbons leaving the first named draw on the counter. I turned my head and saw the prisoner's hand in the draw, which she withdrew and put under her arm. I suspected she had stolen something and mentioned it to Edward Price my fellow apprentice. Richard Griffiths*.

Edward Price, apprentice, says that his attention was directed to the prisoner by Richard Griffiths and he saw a piece or roll of red ribbon similar to the one now produced under the prisoner's arm. She kept it under her arm and covered it with her cloak. I then went and told Mr Parker who told me to come and ask the prisoner if she had not taken the ribbon which she denied. I took the candle and searched the floor but did not find it. I looked a second time and then found the piece of ribbon on the floor close to the prisoner's feet. I went and told Mr Parker who ordered the prisoner out of the shop. I went out to fetch a constable whom he did not find but found a constable on his return who was talking to the prisoner, she protesting her innocence. The prisoner had been in the shop half an hour before this. Edward Price*.

Examinations-assault. [1831E32]

28 February 1831. The information and complaint of Samuel Davies, one of the sergeants-at-mace of the borough of Welshpool taken before. Mr Beck. Says that about a quarter or half an hour past nine o'clock on Sunday night the 20th being sent for to the Britannia Inn in Welshpool to quell a riot there he accordingly went. That's when he arrived there he found Edward Powell and Richard Smout in the kitchen very drunk. Powell was standing up cursing repeatedly in consequence of having as examinant understood being refused drink. That examinant desired him to go home peaceably and not kick up a row in the house upon a Sunday night. That Powell swore he would not go and insisted upon having some drink, and said to examinant "what dost thou want, dost thou want to put me in the crib again". Examinant replied he did not want to put in in the crib, he only wished him to go home peaceably. Powell then sat down and said "I'll be dammed I'll not

stir from here till I have some drink, and immediately called for a pint of ale which was refused him. Examinant then sent for James Jones of Welshpool, a special constable, to come to his assistance who in a few minutes arrived. That upon his arrival examinant said to Powell "thee hadst better go home peaceably, if not it will be my duty to put you in the crib", upon which Powell struck at James Jones and laid hold of his staff. Examinant then caught hold of Powell and prevented his taking the staff from Jones and said "now you must go to the crib" where he endeavoured to convey Powell but failed. That examinant then went to Mr Beck, the magistrates residence to request his assistance and directions. That Mr Beck attended examinant to the Britannia where they found Powell coming out of the kitchen into the passage assisted by Benjamin Waring of Welshpool, mason, who had hold of Powell's arm. That Mr Beck requested Waring to assist examinant in conveying Powell to the crib which for a moment he pretended to do, but when Mr Beck left and they had proceeded to about the middle of the street opposite the Britannia Powell entangled examinant's legs and threw him down and fell upon him and endeavoured to wrest his staff from him. He got up before examinant and kicked him while on the ground. They proceeded five of 6 yards further pulling Powell along and all but resisted with all his might. He succeeded in disentangling his right-hand with which he struck examinant who was struck down several times afterwards. The struggle continued and examinant got up finding that his assistants had left him and that he had to encounter Powell alone. He demanded assistance from persons who had assembled there to enable him to secure Powell came to help him. On the contrary William Hughes of Welshpool, maltster, John Collingwood of Welshpool, joiner, and Joseph Boston of Welshpool, skinner, endeavoured by violent expressions to excite Powell and other persons to abuse examinant, saying "now Ned give it him, dam his blood he deserves his guts kicked out". That examinant finding himself in imminent danger was obliged to retreat and take shelter in the house of Mr Waidson and was afterwards conducted home by special constables. Samuel Davies*.

If it is possible that his sentence could be mitigated probably it may be the means of restoring him to health otherwise he must face a sacrifice to the united circumstances of ill health and close confinement. He then made several enquiries and caused handbills to be printed and circulated about the country. That he soon afterwards was informed that the said Evan Evans had purchased a lot of pigs at Oswestry Fair which appeared to answer the description of the pigs described in the handbills. On 18 instant he went to the Crow public house in Shrewsbury where he found the pigs in the possession of the said Evan Evans who said he had purchased them at Oswestry Fair from John Phillips at 18s 6d a piece. That deponent immediately knew the pigs to be his property by some particular black spots and the marks upon them and Evan Evans delivered up the pigs to deponent who then sent home to Plasgwyn where they now are and deponent knows the pigs to be his property. That he looked at the pigs and in a short time afterwards purchased them from the prisoner, John Phillips, at 18s 6d a piece, paid him for them and took the pigs to Shelton that day. On the Friday following, 18 instant, he took the same pigs to Shrewsbury and put them up at the Crow public house intending to offer them for sale. Soon afterwards John Lewis came to deponent and enquired if he had a lot of pigs and upon reading a handbill which John Lewis delivered him he immediately gave up the pigs to John Lewis and that the pigs he then delivered up to John Lewis and that they are the same which he had purchased at Oswestry from the said john Phillips. Mary Williams the wife of the said Thomas Williams says that she was at her husband's standing today when the last witness enquired of her whether she had sold any shoes to that man, pointing to the prisoner who was going down the street. She told them she had not and desired him to go after the prisoner. The last witness and the prisoner came back together and witness received one pair of shoes now produced from the last witness and the other two pairs the prisoner put on the standing and that the three pairs of shoes are the property of her husband. The prisoner told her that he had bought one pair of shoes from her first saying that he had paid her 4s 6d. Witness says she sold the prisoner no shoes whatsoever. The shoes now produced witness gave to Samuel Davies. Mary Williams*.

Samuel Davies, sergeant-at-mace received three pair of shoes from the last witness. They are the same now produced. Witness took charge of the prisoner who voluntarily and without any threat went down on his knees and requested witness to get him forgiven. Samuel Davies*.

I have in reply to inform those magistrates that I shall give myself no further trouble upon the business. If it is not paid I know the worst that can happen, viz., paying it out of my own pocket but if so no future order shall be issued by me, how urgent soever the case may be; and as it will be most agreeable to me to withdraw from all interference in the public business of the county I cannot have a better opportunity that the one now offered me and which I can with great pleasure in every respect excepting that which relates to poor of this

district. I am however obliged to trouble you to ask a question which is very frequently put to me – whether any and what allowance is to made to the special constables who were sworn in sometime ago. They have seen by the accounts published by the county treasurer that some have been paid and therefore think they are equally entitled. There have been expenses necessarily incurred which ought to be paid at all events. The present Q.S. is the last fixed by the act of parliament for the magistrates to determine what remuneration is to be made to those who prepared the population returns. 7. John Edwards aged 25. Committed for three months for bastardy unless he shall pay to pa. Kerry £7 7s, 29 August 1831 by T.B. Browne and William Pugh.

8. John Bates. Committed until he give security or enter into a recognizance to indemnify pa. Meifod for bastardy, Rowland Williams, 2 September 1831.

9. Thomas Hamer aged 30. Committed for three months for being a rogue and vagabond for having runaway and left his wife chargeable to pa. Llanidloes, by George Meares, 2 September 1831.

10. David Davies aged 22. Committed until he give security or enter into a recognizance to indemnify pa. Machynlleth for bastardy, John Edwards, 12 September 1831.

11. Elizabeth Maddox aged 40. Tried at Summer Great Sessions 1831 and convicted of keeping a disorderly house in the town of Welshpool and sentenced to be imprisoned in the house of correction for six calendar months and kept to hard labour, 23 July 1831.

12. Martha Hughes aged 30. Committed for maliciously and unlawfully throwing down a gate upon lands at Moel-y-Garth in pa. Guilsfield now in the holding of David Pryce was ordered to pay the sum of 2s 6d for the said offence to an overseer of the parish and 8s costs to the said David Pryce and in default to be committed to the house of correction for six weeks, by Thomas Morgan, bailiff of the borough of Welshpool, 29 September 1831.

Report-house of correction. [1831M44]

20 October 1831. Convicted felony – 2 males; Convicted misdemeanours –6 males, 2 females; Suspicion of felony – nil; committed misdemeanours – 2 male; Vagrants – nil.

The whole of this building is in good condition but there are addition courts and yards required by the late gaol acts so as to make the prison conformable to the provision of those acts. New gaol and house of correction now in progress. John Davies*, keeper.

Examination-theft. [1831M46]

21 September 1831. Examination of John Butler of the town of Shrewsbury taken before Thomas Morgan. Who says that he lives at Shrewsbury with his father who makes list shoes which he sells there as also at different towns in the neighbourhood together with tape, cotton and other small articles. But about eight o'clock on Monday night last he was packing up his goods which had been exposed on his standing in the town of Welshpool for sale (the market being then over) when the prisoner came up and sat upon a box at the back of his standing. That he saw the prisoner take several sheets of pins from his standing part of which deponent observed him to put in his pocket, the remainder being about four sheets which he held in his hand. The prisoner then walked off and went and sat down upon a box at the back of deponent's brother's standing. Samuel Butler, which was adjoining to deponent's standing where he sat about a quarter of an hour. That as soon as deponent had missed the prisoner from his brother's standing he went to his brother and asked him if the prisoner had given him any pins who informed him that he had not. But deponent then went in search of the prisoner when he found him in custody in the town hall. That deponent accompanied William Morris into the town hall where they searched him when they found in his left hand coat pocket the several articles enumerated by the last witness. Deponent says that the eight sheets of pins, the blue and white tape, and to the best of his knowledge the two pieces of black ribbon found on the prisoner as aforesaid and are now produced by the last witness, William Morris, are the property of this deponent's father Thomas Butler and that the same were stolen from his standing on Monday night last as before stated. Deponent has other pins the paper cover in which they are enclosed corresponds with those he lost. John Butler*.

William Morris, one of the constables of the borough of Welshpool says that about eight o'clock on Monday night last he was engaged in packing up the frames of the stalls or standings that are placed in the streets on a fair day or market for the purpose of placing goods on after the market was over and was assisted by Richard Williams and another person. That Williams called deponent to him and pointed out the prisoner who was sitting upon a box behind John Butler's standing, and said to deponent that man will steal something just now. But deponent watched his movements and in a few minutes he saw the prisoner, Peter Carter, take a paper or bundle of pins from Butler's standing and put it into his pocket. That the prisoner then took hold of some blue and white tape which was upon Butler's standing and drew it gently over the back part of the standing. That deponent who is Bellman of the borough was then called to make a proclamation and upon his going he called the said Richard Williams and desired him to take notice of the prisoner until he returned. That he returned in about a quarter of an hour and found the prisoner sitting upon a box at the back of Samuel' standing and seemed to be handling some of the articles upon the standing, but was desired by Samuel Butler to go away. That the prisoner then proceeded to another standing where deponent took him into custody and conveyed him into the town hall and having called John Butler he proceeded to search the prisoner and found in his left hand coat pocket the following articles, 11 yards of blue and white tape, part of two pieces of black ribbon, eight sheets of pins, a new pocket knife, and some other trifling articles which deponent now produces. That deponent also found in one of his pockets a small book in which the name John Brick was written which deponent pointed out to them saying is this your name but he would not say whether it was or was not. That the articles now produced and which were found upon the prisoner deponent has had in his custody ever since. William Morris*.

Richard Williams of the town of Welshpool, labourer, says he was engaged at the Town Hall in Welshpool on Monday night last about eight o'clock with other persons in packing up the standing frames as mentioned in the former examination and was desired by Evan Thomas one of the sergeants-at-mace for the said borough to notice the prisoner's movements which he prepared to do and in a few minutes he observed him, the prisoner, go to John Butler's standing and sit down upon a box at the back of it. That he discovered him attempting to take some yarn from the standing but failed it being entangled in something. The deponent then went nearer to the prisoner and observed him take some small bundles from the standing twice, and put them into his pocket and then went to Samuel Butler's standing and sat down on a box at the back of the stall. That the prisoner then began to handle the things on Samuel Butler's standing. That deponent then went up to Samuel Butler and asked him if he allowed the prisoner to finger his goods and put them into his pocket to which he answered that he did not and that he had been doubtful of the prisoner a good while. But the prisoner then got up and went away and in a few minutes after deponent and William Morris took him into custody where they searched him and found the things on them as mentioned by William Morris. That whilst witness was talking to Samuel Butler he saw the prisoner throw some hanks or scones of thread or cotton under the stall. Richard Williams*.

He also knows them by the pitch mark. He says that he is a skinner in the employ of Mr Charles Jones of Llanfyllin and that on Tuesday last 20 instant John Davies of Llanfyllin came to him and offered to sell three sheepskins; that they differed about the price that night and that the said John Davies had come to him on the following morning and sold him through the sheepskins for 2s 6d. William Williams*.

Hugh Humphreys of the town of Machynlleth, yeoman, states that being at Welshpool on Thursday 22 December and entered into conversation with a Henry Jones of Machynlleth, tailor, in the course of which conversation he asked him if he had seen anything of the prisoner there about to which he replied he had. Witness then said the prisoner had left Machynlleth the previous week with two watches. Jones then asked him who the watches belonged to. Witness then said they belonged to Will, John Jones's servant and the blacksmith Jones then said he sold one here to some drover. Witness then asked him if he Jones knew who the drover was. That if Will knewhe would be sure to get it back. Jones then said he did not know him neither did he know how much prisoner had paid for it. Hugh Humphreys*.

Edward Rowland of Pontardyfi, pa. Pennal, states that to the best of his knowledge on Monday 12 December last the prisoner came to witness he having had some conversation with him the day before and requested he might have his watch to put a glass on it and to repair it. That witness delivered his watch to prisoner with an understanding that he was to have it back on the following day. That witness never saw prisoner since Sunday night1 January when he was taken into custody. That he never had an opportunity of asking prisoner for his watch. Edward Rowland*.

David Humphrey, the prisoner, states that on Monday 12 December he received the watches from William Williams and Edward Rowland and that on the Tuesday following he went to Welshpool to seek for work, his father having turned him away or otherwise he would not have gone. That when he went to Welshpool he went to call upon Henry Jones and asked him if he would give him 10s. That prisoner told Jones that the watch which he pledged him for 10s belonged to William Williams and should wish to return it to him. Jones then told him that he expected Howell Rees over and that she should be over at Machynlleth in the course of

The prisoner Lewis Jarman called me into an adjoining room and said "God bless me Ned make it up" and then said he would sell his watch to make it up. He acknowledged that he took the articles. After I collected the stolen articles into a heap the prisoner Jane Davies (who lives in the same house as the other prisoner, Lewis Jarman) said I could not help it or I cannot help it or if I had said anything they would have kicked me and abused me. The mark of Edward Morris.

Elizabeth Jarman of pa. Llandinam, single woman, says I live with my mother, Ann Jarman. My mother went from home about a week ago and is not yet returned. On Sunday last I put a linsey gown and apron, a flannel gown and two flannel petticoats, all belonging to my mother, upon the garden hedge near the house to dry. I forgot to take them in at night and going the next morning to fetch them I found they had all been taken away (except one of the flannel petticoats). Hearing that the prisoner, Lewis Jarman's house, was searched on Monday last for some stolen shoes and being told that the prisoner was seen to pass by my mother's house on Sunday night I suspected that he had taken the lost articles. I obtained a search warrant and went yesterday with the constables to the prisoner's house which is about 2 miles from my mother's. The constables where John Watts and Edward Morris. I stayed a little distance from the house while the constables went forward to search it. I presently followed them and there found all the lost articles, except the flannel gown. The linsey gown and petticoat now shown to me by John Watts the constable are the same that I put on the hedge on Sunday last and they are the same that I saw at the prisoner's house yesterday and they are my mother's property. The mark of Elisabeth Jarman.

John Watts of pa. Llandinam, innkeeper, says I am one of the constables of pa. Llandinam and was applied to Elizabeth Jarman to search the house of Lewis Jarman the prisoner by virtue a warrant for the purpose. I searched the house accordingly yesterday and Edward Morris was with me. Elizabeth Jarman was at this time a little way off. I found such articles as she said she had lost. The gown was in three or four pieces and some parts of its as well as the other things were under a straw bed. I collected the things together by the door when Elizabeth Jarman came in and identified them to be those she had lost. The prisoner Lewis Jarman was present at the time. I heard the prisoner Lewis Jarman confess several times that he had taken the goods. The articles I now produce are the same I found in the prisoner Lewis Jarman's house. John Watts*.

Recognizance-theft. [1832H35]

2 January 1832. Edward Rowland, blacksmith, in £20. Taken before John Edwards for the said Edward Rowland to appear at the next Q.S. to prefer a bill of indictment against David Humphreys of Machynlleth, watchmaker, for stealing at pa. Machynlleth one silver watch, property of said Edward Rowland. *At the foot*: Appeared.

Examinations-theft. [1832H36]

28 November 1831. Extermination of John Edwards of pa. Llandysul, taken before George Arthur Evors. Says that on Tuesday 22 November instant he attended at Newtown market with a quantity of shoes for sale. That's about four o'clock the same evening examinant, as he was packing up his shoes previous to returning home, missed two pair of men's leather shoes from the standing on which they had been placed. That from the circumstances of Sarah Jarman, the sister of Jane Davies the prisoner, having purchased a pair of shoes from examinant on the same day and from further enquiry which he made examinant had a search warrant granted to search the dwellinghouses of the prisoner and her sister. That the pair of shoes now produced are the same which were stolen from examinant on Tuesday last. That from the make of the shoes and a mark which examinant made with his nail inside one of the vamps he can completely identify the shoes as being his property. John Edwards*.

Benjamin Baxter, constable of Newtown, says that on this present day examinant searched the house of Jane Davies in pa. Llandinam under a search warrant. That he found the pair of shoes now produced and which are claimed by the said John Edwards hidd inside the house under the thatch. That examinant is found also in the same house five other pairs of shoes and quarter boots. That the prisoner's sister Mary Jarman informed examinant that a shawl which he founded the house was purchased by her from Mr Jones of Crown shop in Newtown together with a gown piece both now produced. Benjamin Baxter*.

Elizabeth Thorley wife of William Thorley of Newtown says that John Jarman the prisoner brought a pair of new shoes which were not nailed to her standing on the Newtown Street last Tuesday evening and asked her if he should leave them for a short time on her standing. That she consented for him to do so and the shoes remained there for some time. That the prisoner informed examinant that he had given 7s for them. The mark of Elizabeth Thorley.

Jane Davies of Llandinam says that the house on which the property now produced was found was in her occupancy. That Lewis Jarman and his wife came to lodge with six weeks after May and continued with her till the present time and John Jarman and his wife came to lodge with her a fortnight today. That one pair of women's shoes now produced she bought of Edward or John Ingram a shoemaker in Llanidloes and for 3s 6d. But one pair of men's shoes belongs to Lewis Jarman and the other pair of men's shoes and one pair of women's quarter boots, one pair of girls quarter boots belonged to John Jarman as also two planes now produced. That the two hats now produced also belong to him. That the shawl and gown piece now produced are the property of Mary Jarman her sister. The mark of Jane Davies.

Mary Jarman says that she and her husband Lewis Jarman came to lodge with her sister Jane Davies about 1 May last and continued to live with her until this time. That one pair of women's shoes, one yellow shawl and a gown piece now produced belonged to her and one pair of men's shoes to her husband. That's all the other articles belonged to John Jarman. That John Jarman and his wife were in Newtown last Tuesday and brought with them home one pair of men's shoes which they said they purchased in Newtown. The mark of Mary Jarman.

Lewis Jarman says that immediately after the disturbance at Merthyr he came to live with his sister-in-law Jane Davies with whom he has continued to this time. That one pair of men's old shoes now produced are his property and the shawl and gown piece are his wife's property. That one pair of women's shoes he believes to be Jane Davies's property and all other articles are the property of John Jarman. The mark of Lewis Jarman.

Examinations-theft. [1832H37]

29 November 1831. Examination of Edward Morris of Llandinam, shoemaker, taken before George Arthur Evors. Says that about 10 o'clock last night he apprehended John Jarman the prisoner at the house of Elizabeth Thorley, the sister-in-law of the prisoner on Newtown Green. That he found the pair of shoes now produced upon the feet of the prisoner which the prisoner stated had been purchased at Tredegar in Monmouthshire. That he took the prisoner with the shoes to John Edwards, the prosecutor, at the Kings Head Inn immediately said they were one of the pair of shoes which he had lost from his standing on Tuesday last. The mark of Edward Morris.

John Edwards says that the shoes which the prisoner had on this feet when he (the prisoner) was brought to him by Edward Morris last night at the Kings Head Inn and which are now produced are his property, and one of the pairs of shoes which he lost from his standing in Newtown on Tuesday last. John Edwards*.

Examinations-theft. [1832H38]

18 November 1831. Examination of Charlotte Langford of the town of Welshpool, spinster, taken before William Clive and David Pugh. Says that she is an assistant to her sister Mrs Newell of the Wheatsheaf Inn in Welshpool and that on 3 November several pieces of flannel belonging to different persons where put up at the Wheatsheaf in a room upstairs among which were two or three pieces belonging as she believes to one

Nicholas Bennett in grey wrappers marked with the letters NB. But on Wednesday morning last, being Welshpool fair day, examinant and one of Mr Newell's servants moved the flannels and that the wrappers where whole about them and that they appeared to be in the same state as when first brought there. But during the morning several persons had been drinking in the room. That after dusk she went through the room into an adjoining room and found that some of the flannels were down upon the floor, no person being then in the room. That soon after she again went through the room into a bedroom beyond to see if a man who had been put to bed drunk had fallen asleep. That on her return she saw a woman to the best of our knowledge the prisoner with a basket containing papers and gingerbread in the room she had no light and was stooping down among the flannels. That examinant asked her what she was doing there to which she answered in an undertone that "she was coming to sell". That examinant said there were no persons there to buy and desired her to go downstairs and not let examinant see her there again. That shortly after examinant went upstairs into another part of the house and as she was coming down she met the same woman again upon the stairs coming up. That examinant drove her down before her into the kitchen and desired her to go out of the house. That in about half an hour after this as examinant was coming out of the room adjoining the flannel room she met the woman a third time upon the landing of the stairs. That she took her down into the kitchen and reprimanded her and desired her to walk off. That examinant having found the woman so often near the flannel room she went up to see if the flannels were all right and upon her examining them she found one of those enclosed in the grey wrapper market NB had had the wrapper torn off and a part of the flannel seemed to have been undone and that she also discovered a raw edge to the flannel from which it appeared to her that a piece had been torn off. The examinant left the flannel in the state she had found it and informed her sister of the circumstances and also of the suspicion she had of the woman she had so often seen in and about the room. Charlotte Langford*.

Samuel Davies, one of the sergeants-at-mace for Welshpool, says that Mr John Newell of Welshpool, innkeeper, came to him about 11 o'clock yesterday morning and told him that a part of a piece of flannel had been stolen from his house on Wednesday evening last and that he suspected a woman who had been selling gingerbread. That upon this information examinant went to Morris Jones's lodging house and learnt that a woman had left his house between nine and 10 o'clock that morning with some flannel in her procession. Examinant immediately went in search of the woman and overtook her near the Garreg turnpike gate in company with three men one of whom was wheeling a barrel containing three baskets and other things. That examinant asked the prisoner which was her basket and she pointed out the middle one and said that was hers. That examinant search the basket where he found part of the flannel now produced. That he then searched the other baskets and in one of them he found the remainder of the flannel now produced enclosed in a piece of linsey which the man who was wheeling the barrel said belonged to the prisoner which she acknowledged. That examinant then asked her how she came by the flannel to which she in the first place said that she had bought it upon the streets and again she said she had bought it under the town hall. That examinant said that there were no such things sold under the town hall upon which the prisoner said she did not know how she came by it and added that she had been much in liquor the night before and did not know what she had done or that she had any flannel till that morning when she found it in her basket. That examinant then said that some flannel had been stolen from Mr Newell's of the Wheatsheaf in Welshpool on the fair night and that he suspected that the flannel he had found on her was the flannel which had been so stolen or words to that effect. The prisoner then begged of examinant to see Mr Newell and tell him that she would pay for the flannel and that she hoped that he being the father of children would forgive her saying she did not know what she had done. She told examinant that she had half a crown and what ever more would be for her to pay she would pay when she came to Welshpool next. That examinant then took her into custody. Samuel Davies*.

Andrew Jones of Trefeglwys, farmer and flannel manufacturer, says that Mr Newell gave him the piece of flannel from which the piece lost was supposed to have been taken that he found the wrapper torn and a piece of flannel torn off marked 116 in raddle. That examinant's brother dresses all the flannels for Mr Nicholas Bennett and when dressed marks them with the number of yards with raddle and from these circumstances examinant measured the piece of flannel in order to ascertain the quantity stolen which appeared to be about 7 yards. Andrew Jones*.

The prisoner says her name is Mary Mulvaney commonly called Devany.

Examinations-theft. [1832H39]

21 November 1831. Examination of Benjamin Allen of the town of Shrewsbury, silversmith, taken before W Clive and Francis Allen. Says that about four o'clock in the afternoon of Friday 18 instant the prisoner George Jackson came to his shop and asked examinant's son in examinant's presence and hearing whether

they bought silver and upon being answered that they did the prisoner produced the spoon now produced broken into three pieces. Examinant asked the prisoner whose spoon it was and how he came by it. The prisoner said that his master George Blithe of Newtown gave it to him saying he did not know whether it was silver or not. That examinant then asked the prisoner how he came to leave his master who had been so kind as to give him such an article. When the prisoner said he had left because his master would not give him clothes or pay him his wages. That examinant observed he thought the prisoner had come by the spoon dishonestly and that if he would call about nine o'clock in the morning he would consider the matter whether he would buy it or not. That examinant kept the spoon and in about 5 minutes after the prisoner had left his shop he informed Mr Samuel Farlow of the circumstance who went with the examinant and took the prisoner into custody. But after the prisoner had been apprehended examinant delivered the pieces of the spoon to Mr Farlow which are the same as now produced, and which had never been out of his custody from the time the boy delivered it to them in his shop to the time he handed it to Farlow. Benjamin Allen*.

Richard Hodges of Powis Castle says that he is house steward to Lord Clive at Powis Castle and that there where a dozen silver tablespoons with his Lordship's crest and a coronet engraved upon them for the use of the steward's room and that on Friday evening last two of the said spoons where missing. That the spoon in three pieces now produced by Samuel Farlow of Shrewsbury is one of the spoons so missing and which must have been stolen from the still room in the castle on Thursday or Friday morning last and that he knows it by the crest and coronet and by the initials SR which signifies steward's room. Richard Hodges*. Richard Smout of Powis Castle says that he has the cleaning of the silver spoons which are used in the still

room and steward's room at Powis Castle, being a dozen, and which are exclusively used in those rooms. That one of the spoons has been missing for about two months. That about 12 o'clock on Wednesday last (15th) examinant cleaned the 11 spoons and took them into the steward's room where they were made use of at dinnertime. That they were afterwards used about the castle but the examinant did not count them between Wednesday and Friday evening. But about eight o'clock on Friday evening (after Lord Clive returned from Shrewsbury) examinant was desired to look up the spoons and see if any of them were missing which he accordingly did and during that night and the next day and up to this time only 10 could be found. But the pieces of school now produced are the property of Lord Clive and parts of one of the spoons above described as used in the steward's room. The mark of Richard Smout.

Jane Lloyd, servant at Powis Castle, says that she has the care of the still room and out on last Friday morning the prisoner George Jackson and Thomas Croden, two sweeps, came to Powis Castle to sweep some chimneys. That examinant let them in about six o'clock in the morning. That they swept the still room chimney and that during the time they were engaged the examinant was present except in a few minutes when she went to Mr Tinkler the housekeeper for the key of another room to let the prisoners in. That the prisoner Corden went up the chimney of the still room and also that of the housekeeper's room and that she saw him come down and Jackson held the cloth at the bottom. Jane Lloyd*.

Samuel Farlow of Shrewsbury, police officer, says that on Friday evening 18 instant he was informed by Mr Allen of the prisoner Jackson having offered to sell a silver spoon at his shop as described by Mr Allen and that examinant took him into custody. That Mr Allen delivered the three pieces of the spoon which he said the prisoner had offered to sell at his shop, which examinant now produces. That as examinant was conveying the prisoner to prison he asked him how we came by the spoon. That the prisoner said his master who he said resided in Newtown had given him in part of wages. That the next day as examinant was conducting Jackson before the magistrates he asked him if the statement he had made the day before as to his possession of the spoon was correct or not. But the prisoner then said that he had been sweeping some chimneys with another boy at Powis Castle on the Friday morning and that the boy who was there with him had given him the spoon. Samuel Farlow*.

7. John Edwards aged 25. Committed for three months for bastardy unless he shall pay to pa. Kerry £7 7s, 29 August 1831 by T.B. Browne and William Pugh.

9. Thomas Hamer aged 30. Committed for three months for being a rogue and vagabond for having runaway and left his wife chargeable to pa. Llanidloes, by George Meares, 2 September 1831.

10. David Davies aged 22. Committed until he give security or enter into a recognizance to indemnify pa. Machynlleth for bastardy, John Edwards, 12 September 1831.

Report-bridges. [1832H45-49]

Pwll Trewern and Cefn Brook bridges

At a meeting of the committee held at the Oak Inn on Thursday 10 November 1831. Present: Viscount Clive, chairman, Panton Corbett, John Davies, James Proud Johnson. Having considered the evidence given by Henry Webb, Edward Williams, William Bland and Evan Ricahrds by which it appears that the bridges at Pwll Trewern and Cefn Brook were erected by the passing of 43 George III c. 59 and under the powers of an act in 1801 'for making a new line of road from Buttington Hall to the tenth mile stone on the road from Welshpool to Shrewsbury' are of opinion that the expense of maintaining and repairing the same is chargeable to the county of Montgomeryshire and we recommend the adoption of these bridges to the consideration of the court.

It appears to the committee upon their own view as also on the report of the county surveyor that the bridge at Pwll Trewern is at present in a dangerous state.

It is the opinion of this meeting that it would be expedient that the same should be secured forthwith and that the county surveyor should be empowered to expend a sum not exceeding $\pounds 10$ so as to secure the bridge against the effects which may be apprehended from a winter flood if left in its present state.

10 November 1831. Evan Richards. Is 64 years old and has lived in Trewern about 38 years. Has worked the last 22 years on the new line. There was not any carriage bridge over the book to the new line of road was formed. Remembers the present bridge being repaired about eight years ago and the expense was paid by Mr Cook the surveyor of the commissioners. Does not remember it being repaired but this once since he was on the roads. The mark of Evan Richards.

Henry Webb is 81 years old and has lived in tp. Trewern almost all his life and remembers the new line of road being made either 28 or 29 years ago. There was a footbridge above the present bridge on the old line of road at Pwll Trewern. There was not any carriage bridge at the place but the present carriage bridge was built when the new line was made. He remembers the place 70 years ago and more and is sure there was not a carriage bridge till the new line was made.

Cefn Brook Bridge. He remembers the bridge built over the Cefn Brook as it was built about the same time as the Pwll Trewern bridge when the new line of road was made and there was not any bridge at this place before. The mark of Henry Webb.

Edward Williams. Is 70 years old and has lived for the last 47 years in the same house in tp. Trewern which he now occupies. Remembers the present line of road from Buttington Hall to Trewern gate made.

Remembers the bridge built at Pwll Trewern in the year 1802. Mr Colley, Mr Withey and Mr Gould directed the work; David Lloyd was the contractor for the bridge. There was a footbridge but no carriage bridge at that time, but there had been a low carriage bridge of planks which had been carried away from 5 to 10 years previous to the new line being opened. Has heard David Lloyd says he was paid by the commissioners for building the bridge but never remembers the bridge being repaired.

Particulars for building a new stone bridge at Pontgwenwyn-farch.

The present bridge is to be taken down at the expense of the contract who will be entitled to make use of any of the materials which are suitable for the new bridge and he is to keep up a safe and convenient road for the public through the ford during the execution of his contract. The new bridge is to be built according to the plan and elevation annexed in such situation near the present bridge as the county surveyor shall mark out. The foundation of the abutments are to be sunk full 5 feet deep below the level of the low water and the foundations of the wing walls 3 feet deep below the same level, built with large square bedded stone hammer-faced on the outside laid close and true on their beds and joints, the internal work being filled well with large stone set in mortar and grouted with hot lime and gravel every 12 inches in height. No stone for the internal work of the abutments and wing walls up to the level of the first set on to be less than 18 inches in bed with headers every 6 feet in each course to bind two and a half feet into the sole of the work. The external work of the abutments the wing walls and spandrels above the set on is to be built with stone well and clean, hammer-faced set in regular courses in good mortar, no stone being less than 17 inches in bed with headers in every course not less than 2'3" in bed nor more than 6 feet asunder.

The arch stones are to be worked through in regular courses chamfered on the joints the full-size in bed expressed upon the elevation the quoins set to project 2 inches battered two-way template to the radius of the arch with the backs and cross joints well pinned and grouted. The said masonry to the level of the dotted line on the elevation at which height the wing walls are to be 3 feet thick and the whole built with a large stone set in mortar and well grouted at the height of every external course. The wing walls are then to be set on so that they shall be 2 feet thick 6 inches below the level of the underside of the stuncourse laid in mortar and grouted as before specified. This stuncourse is to be very well, hammer-faced set to project 3 inches before the face of the spandrel, the inside also hammer-faced to form a portion of the parapet. Examination-theft. [1832E73]

22 March 1832. Examination of Margaret wife of Edward Evans of Trawscoed taken before David Pugh and John Jones. Says that she lives in a part of Trawscoed Hall and on the eighth day of this March she discovered that their house had been broken into the night before and the house had been entered through the milkhouse window by breaking a part of the wire window. That she then proceeded to search to ascertain whether any property had been stolen when she found that two pairs of shoes, a silk bonnet, two shawls, to silk handkerchiefs, a cheque apron, 13 yards and a half of printed cotton, about half a dozen caps, three pairs of worsted stockings, a child's tippet, and two or three frills, a cake of bread and a little flour. That she then sent for her husband who came home shortly when she informed him of the burglary. That she suspected the prisoner Mary Williams had broken into the house and stole the above articles. That the cheque apron now produced is the one that was stolen from her house and that she is able to swear to it from a hole in the corner which she had mended in a particular manner, and also the piece of a frill now produced is also part, the border of a cap which was stolen from the house. 22 March 1832. Examination of Edward Evans of Trawscoed taken before David Pugh and John Jones. Says on the morning of 8 March his wife, the last witness, sent for him from his work and that he went home about nine o'clock when his wife informed him that his house had been broken into the night before and that several articles had been stolen and at the same time told him that she suspected the prisoner to be the person who had so broken into the house. That he went immediately in search of the prisoner (his suspicions being strengthened by the discovery of the track of a person's feet about the size of the prisoner about the house, there being a little snow upon the ground), but was unable to find her but he received intelligence that she had gone towards Llandrinio or Oswestry. That the following day he went in search of her in that direction and met with her in Llanymynech with a bundle under her arm tied up in his wife's shawl and his wife's bonnet on her head and saw several other articles which had been stolen from his house. That he then took her into his custody when she violently resisted. That several men came up who after some enquiry into the circumstances rescued her but examinant secured the bundle. That the prisoner then ran in the direction of Oswestry and that examinant pursued and overtook her about a half a mile on the Oswestry road, but from her violent behaviour and being unable to get any assistance he was obliged to leave her there. That he then returned to the Cross Keys in Llanymynech where he left the bundle and bonnet which he had taken from the prisoner, in the care of the landlord and returned home. That having received information that the prisoner was seen in the neighbour of Broniarth Common he went this morning in company with one Thomas Jones to the house of Robert Thomas of the Clawdd where they apprehended the prisoner. But as they were bringing her away a short distance from where they had found her examinant asked the prisoner what she had done with the apron and the several other things meaning those that had been stolen to which she said I will show you the apron and thereupon handed him the one now produced. Edward Evans*.

The conduct of the constables and others at Uttoxeter has been very meritorious, and the members of the Association feel themselves called upon to discharge the several amounts claimed, but as the society's funds are nearly exhausted in consequence of the late prosecution, the several members will consider themselves very much obliged if your lordship will submit the enclosed bills and make a representation of the circumstances to the magistrates at the Q.S. requesting they will be pleased to allow the same, or such part as they may see right, out of the county funds. Report-bridge. [1832T24]

Rhyd-y-ceirch bridge. At a meeting the committee on 3 May 1832. Present: William Pugh, Thomas Browne Brwne. Having heard the evidence of Thomas Morris, Lewis Humphreys, John Davies, John Lloyd, Edward Bevan, Anthony Jandrel and Thomas Penson, county surveyor, in which it appears that this bridge in pa. Mochdre was built by the commission under the Kerry Enclosure Act subsequent to the year 1803 and on or about 1807. The committee has perused the Enclosure Act in which pa. Mochdre is included and certify that there is not a special clause relating to the maintenance and repairs of any bridge or roads at the ends thereof which may be built by the commission under that Act. It is the opinion of your committee from the evidence submitted to them and the decision of the Q.S. on former similar cases that the county is liable to the maintenance and repairs of this bridge.

Report-bridge. [1832T25]

Thomas Morris of Mochdre, parish clerk, says that he is in his 77th year and remembers the situation of Rhyd-y-ceirch bridge since he was eight or nine years old. That at that time there was a plank for foot people without a hand rail but which was not passable by horses. Horses and carriages passed through the river lower down the stream. The footbridge remained till the present bridge was built about twenty-five years since, then Mr Vickars made an alteration in the line of road. He saw Edward Bevan working at the new bridge and workmen under him. The footbridge was occasionally carried away by the floods and was replaced in his belief by the expense of tps. Mochdre-Ilan and Esgairgeiliog which are the only townships in the parish and the bridge is now one half in one townships and the other half in the other.

Report-bridge. [1832T26]

John Davies of Mochdre, farmer, says that he is 75 years of age and has lived in pa. Mochdre for the last 46 years. Remembers the situation of Rhyd-y-ceirch bridge ever since that time. That there was then and until the present bridge was built a plank across the stream for foot passengers but the carriages or horses road was through the river lower down. The present bridge was built about 25 years ago. And he believes the parish paid the expense thereof. He occupied the land adjoining the present bridge when it was built and has continued to do so ever since.

Report-bridge. [1832T27]

John Lloyd of Mochdre, farmer, says that he is now surveyor of tp. Mochdre-llan. Has lived in the township for the last 13 years. Remembers the present bridge at Rhyd-y-ceirch repaired about seven years ago and that the expense of such repairs was paid out of the poor rates.

Report-bridge. [1832T28]

Edward Bevan of Newtown, mason, says that he was employed about 25 years since by Mr Williams to build the present bridge at Rhyd-y-ceirch. Previous to this time there was not any appearance of a carriage or horse bridge and foot passengers passed the river by a plank. He was paid by Mr Williams for building the bridge except £10 which he received in equal moieties by orders on the late Mr Ruffle and Mr Jones of Cencoed. He understood that the expense was defrayed by Mr Vickars the commissioner for the Kerry and Mochdre Enclosure Act out of funds raised by the sale of waste lands.

Report-bridge. [1832T29]

Anthony Jandrel says he remembers the present bridge at Rhyd-y-ceirch about 18 years since during which time he has lived in pa. Mochdre as a farmer. Remembers the present bridge injured by the floods about seven or eight years ago and that it was then repaired at the expense of pa. Mochdre.

Report-bridge. [1832T30]

Thomas Penson of Oswestry says that he was appointed county surveyor in 1817.

5. Hugh Humphreys aged 20. Committed for two months for assaulting John Williams of the town of Machynlleth was ordered to forfeit the sums of $\pounds 3$ and also the sum of 15s 6d costs and in default of payment to be imprisoned, by Isaac Bonsall and Thomas L. Hughes.

6. John Watkin aged 24. Tried at Spring Great Sessions 1832 and convicted of larceny and to be imprisoned in the house of correction for six calendar months.

7. Richard Jones aged 28. Convicted for breaking branches of an oak tree at Llettycochynant in Llanidloes property of Lord Mostyn and ordered to pay 1s as a satisfaction and £1 as a penalty and also £1 2s for costs and in default of payment to be imprisoned for two months, by George Mears and Thomas Price.

8. Anne Williams aged 48. Committed for cutting and carrying away a quantity of growing wood and ordered to pay 10s and also 7s 6d for costs and in default of payment to be imprisoned for one month, by J.A. Herbert.

9. Richard Morris aged 32. Committed for want of sureties to appear at the next Q.S. for bastardy, by John Lloyd.

10. William Rowlands aged 38. Committed for want of sureties to be bound in recognizance to appear at the next Q.S. and keep the peace especially towards Anne Brown, by John Jones, bailiff of Montgomery.

Speicifications-bridge. [1832T32]

Specifications for building a new stone bridge at Millbrook.

The old bridge is to be taken down by the contractor and the materials are to be his own property to be used in the erection of the new bridge but he is to form and keep during the execution of his contract up a safe and convenient road for the public through the river.

The bridge is to be placed in such situation as may be marked out by the county surveyor near the present bridge. The materials to be excavated from the foundations of the abutments and wing walls are to be laid on the line of the embankment of the road.

The foundation of the abutments are to be sunk 7 feet below the level of the low water and the foundations of the wing walls 5 feet below the same level, laid with large square bedded stone from the Pool quarries well hammer-faced set close and true in good mortar no stone for the external work of the abutments and wing walls up to low water level be less than twenty inch in bed with headers in every course and more than six feet asunder to bend two feet and a half into the solid of the work the whole set in god mortar. The external work to be carried up solid the full as expressed upon the plan and large stone laid close and solid in mortar and grouted at the height of every course.

The foundations are to be kept dry nor is the water to be allowed to rise in them till they are brought above the water level. The stone for the arch is to be from the Pool Quarries the full depth in bed figured upon the elevation worked through the whole width in regular courses to proper template to the radius of the arch, the joints set true and close in mortar and the backs and cross joints well pinned and grouted. The external work of the wing walls and spandrels above the level of low water is to be built with Pool stone well hammerfaced set in regular courses not less than fifteen inches in bed with headers and more than six feet asunder or such course to bend? two feet three inches in to the solid of the work. The internal work of the abutments to be carried up solid to the level of the dotted line A on the elevation to which height the wing walls are to be three feet thick, the whole built solid in mortar and grouted with hot lime and sharp gravel at the height of every external course. The wing walls are then to be set on regularly so as to be two feet thick under the stuncourses.

The stuncourse to be of Pool stone very well, hammer-faced set to project 3 inches before the face of the work. The parapets are to be of Pool stone according to the section in two courses and drafted with a chisel no stone in the upper course to be shorter than 4 feet with a dowel of half inch iron 5 inches long equally let into each joint and leaded.

The wings of the bridge and for ten feet on each end are to be filled in to the level of the underside of the stuncourse as the work advances.

The whole is to be done in the most substantial and workmanlike manner under the direction and fully to the satisfaction of the county surveyor. The materials are to be of the best quality and should it be found requisite during the progress of the work to do any thing extra of the contract the same is to be paid for at the valuation of the surveyor whose decision is to be final.

That between five and six o'clock yesterday morning examinant was called up by the said Mr Pryce who told him that the iron had been taken away but that he did not know by whom. That examinant went and informed Samuel Davies of the circumstance who together with John Roberts, another constable, accompanied examinant in pursuing the prisoner in the direction of Newtown. That they overtook the prisoner near Coedydinas and found a quantity of the same sort cast iron rails as those he had seen in the mixen in the bottom of the prisoner's cart. That examinant heard the prisoner tell Davies that he had bought them. That the prisoner had in the cart a greater number of the iron rails than those which examinant had seen in the Packhorse mixen. But about a month ago there was a great quantity of the cast-iron which belonged to the rail road in a heap in the rail road field adjoining Welshpool and that upon is going to the places morning he found that they were nearly all taken away. William Morris*.

This deponent sat on a bench near the door the said Francis Jones being in the act of pickling wheat on the kitchen floor and the said Ann Jones in that of feathering a drake, two ducks and a drake lying on a table near the fireplace unfeathered, with their necks hanging over the said table and their bodies covered with a cloth. After sitting there for a few minutes went and sat near to the table on which the three unfeathered ducks and were lain, removed the cloth which covered them, handled and examined them. She took particular notice of the drake which the said Ann Jones was feathering knew them to be and was certain that they were the very ducks which she had lost which were her husband's and her own property. Two of these four were ducks, and two were drakes. Of the ducks one was a brindled one with a circle of white feathers around its neck with a pale yellowish colour without any circle of white feathers along its neck. The said Hugh Jones then ran towards Lletty this deponent following with all the speed she was capable of, and on her and her husband reaching there, he first entered into the house and said where are my ducks then seized some of the ducks, the said Ann Jones laying hold of them also and saying if he did not loosen them she would put the knife which she held in the hand in his heart. The said Francis Jones went and stood with his back to the door holding a spade, lifted it up in his hands and threatening to cleave the said Hugh Jones with it. The mark of Elizabeth Jones.

He went to see for William Buckham hearing about the prisoner had taken some property of Charles Owens and left Rhaiadr with William Buckham and John Evans, constable. They came to Llanidloes and heard that the prisoner had been at the Boar's Head there. They went to the watchmakers, Owen Davies who said that a man had been there and taken William Buckham's watch but afterwards he said that it was his the witness's watch and that the man called himself Bevan. They came to Newtown and not finding the prisoner at the Boar's Head. He saw William Buckham take him and the prisoner delivered up some articles to him in a parlour when they were both alone. Afterwards he went in and saw some things on the table among them was his watch and a rule marked with the T belonging to Joseph Bound who works with him. John Beavan.

accounts I think you rather wished to have my sentiments in writing. I expressed dissatisfaction (and the feeling is not at all abated) at the magistrates are allowing me only one guinea for examining dead bodies whilst they allow the other medical men of the county too. There is surely a very broad distinction between calling in a medical man to testify what he knows, and calling upon him to qualify himself by a scientific investigation to give testimony to what without such investigation he cannot know. The professional men have very properly made the distinction in the degree of remuneration they demand and expect them to give their attendance without such remuneration is the extreme of illiberality and injustice. Since the objection was taken to my accounts I have as much as possible called in the testimony of other professional men though my own would be quite satisfactory to juries and be attended with less expense to the county. The competency of my testimony (though presiding in the court) I expect from the highest authority is unquestionable. I am fully aware that I have the means of compelling any person to testify as to what he knows but I should be very glad to be informed by what means I am to enforce the attendance of a surgeon to examine a dead body without tendering him remuneration. As the reason of my expressing dissatisfaction formally is attached to the accounts already in possession of the clerk of the peace I see no use in repating it and must therefore decline any correspondence with that gentleman. Examination-theft. [1833H57]

12 January 1833. The examination of William Davies of Brithdir, farmer, taken before David Pugh. Says that Thomas Powell who lives in the neighbourhood of Brithdir came to my house this morning and gave me information that he had just apprehended an old woman and that he had found two geese upon her which she suspected she had stolen. That I had just then ascertained that two geese which I had penned up in the stable had been stolen last night. That having received this information I accompanied Powell to Welshpool and that the geese now produced by John Thomas are exactly similar in colour and the left wing of each is cut in

snaggling manner the same as those which was stolen from his house last night, and have no doubt that they are my property and the same that was stolen from my premises. William Davies*.

Examination-theft. [1833H58]

9 February 1833. The examination of Elizabeth Swain, servant to David Jones of Sutton in the borough of Montgomery taken before A.D. Jones. That she is a servant to Mr Jones and on last Thursday week in the morning she was in the pantry at her master's house and she counted the loaves of bread on the shelf there and also again in the evening of that day. But in the morning there were half a dozen loaves but in the evening there was one missing. That she told her fellow servant Abraham Jones of the loss. That's about seven o'clock after she returned into the house from milking, Abraham Jones brought in a loaf which she examinant and which she believed to be one of the loaves that were on the shelf. Being now produced to her she says that it is the loaf that Abraham Jones showed her that evening as she believes. Elizabeth Swain*. Abraham Jones, another servant of the said Mr Jones, says that the loaf he now produces is the loaf he showed to the last examinant. That in consequence of what she said to him he spoke to John Lloyd to watch Samuel Evans, another of the servants coming from the house which John Lloyd did out of the building and stack yard. That he went into the house but soon after went into the stack yard after Lloyd fearing that he might let Evans go and he found Lloyd and Evans talking together in front of the wainhouse. That examinant went up to them and seeing that Evans had something under his arm wrapped up in but in shape like a loaf, he put his hand upon it asking him what he had got there and adding "Not the loaf bread I hope - turn it out". Whereupon Evans undid it. Examinant asked him whose the handkerchief was. He said John meaning one John Thomas who was generally called John . Swears the loaf there was a Banagon jacket which Evans said was this own. Examinant asked how he could think of taking the loaf, upon which Evans said "Lord a mighty bless you don't say a word about it". After some other conversation they parted, the examinant going into the house with the loaf which he showed his fellow servants. He cut a hole in the top of it putting a piece of paper in the hall and placing the crust in the hole again. The mark of Abraham Jones. Samuel Evans voluntarily acknowledges that he did take the loaf.

Examination-theft. [1833H59]

12 January 1833. The examination of John Thomas of the Dingle, pa. Welshpool taken before David Pugh. Says that I assisted Thomas Powell the last witness in apprehending the prisoner Elizabeth Barrett this morning at Cefnheilyn as deposed by Powell and that I conveyed the prisoner and the geese from Bodheilyn to Welshpool and that the geese which I now produce are the same geese which were taken from the prisoner as stated in Powell's examination. The mark of John Thomas.

Examination-theft. [1833H60]

12 January 1833. The examination of Thomas Powell of Gelli cottage in the borough of Welshpool, gardiner, taken before David Pugh, who says that about 7:30 o'clock this morning I was going to work at Bodheilyn and as passing Cefnheilyn, Mr Humphreys's farm, I saw the prisoner coming out of a wainhouse and was proceeding across the fold as if intending to go to another wainhouse beyond the house in which some pea fowls and poultry roosts and that when she had proceeded as far as the kitchen door she stood there for about three or 4 minutes as if she was hearkening at the door. That she then passed on and went into the wainhouse and thinking she was intended to steal some of the fowls I followed her and before I had got in to her one of the pea fowl flew out as if disturbed from the roost as it was not then light. I went into the wainhouse and caught hold of the prisoner who was in a dark corner by the side of a wagon. But the prisoner said "Be quiet, let me alone I only want a rest here". That I and John Thomas, a workman of Mr Humphreys, who had accompanied me into the wainhouse brought the prisoner out into the yard and proceeded to search her and found the geese now produced concealed, the one under her cloak and the other in a small bag. That I asked her where she had had the geese from to which she said, "I do not know where I had them and pretended that she did not know where she was, and said, "Take the geese and let me go". We then took the prisoner to Bodheilyn where I left her in John Thomas's custody, and they went to make enquiry in the neighbourhood if any geese had been stolen and I ascertained at Mr Davies of the Brithdir that he had lost two geese answering the description which I gave him of those found upon the prisoner. Thomas Powell*.

That he took her into the house of Evan Thomas one of the sergeants-at-mace where he searched her and found on her person the whole of the articles he now produces except three of the hanks of yarn which had been given him last night by John Butler. Examination-theft. [1833H79]

22 October 1832. The information and complaints of Mary Newell, wife of Thomas Newell of the borough of Welshpool, taken before Richard Griffiths. Says that two brass cocks for barrels a new bucket and a new brush, property of her husband were taken away from her husband's premises on Tuesday night last or early on Wednesday morning and she believes that they were stolen. Examinant cannot positively swear that one of the brass cocks now produced belongs to her husband but has every reason to believe that it is her husband's. The other brass cock examinant had from Richard Davies of the Lion Inn as she had previously lent him a brass cock but in return he sends her the one now alluded to and examinant is informed that Mr Davies identifies it. The two cocks are worth about one guinea.

Report-gaol. [1833H80]

2 January 1833. The report of the visiting justices at the gaol. In pursuance of the order of the last Midsummer Q.S., the male prisoners have been removed from the old gaol to the new one, and the male prisoners from the house of correction. Only three of the courts, besides the debtor's court are yet completed. When all the courts are finished it appears to us not one of them may be appropriated to the use of the women (who are at present in the old house of correction) and still leave sufficient room to class the male prisoners, unless this should be more numerous than they are at present or then they may have been during the time we have visited the gaol. We therefore recommend that one of the courts should be so appropriated and that the women now in the house of correction should be removed there as soon as they can.

22 October 1832. Information of William Beattie of Welshpool, gardener, taken before Richard Griffiths. Says that on Saturday evening last he was in the kitchen of the Castle Inn in Welshpool. That at six o'clock or a little after the prisoner Evan Owen was there and appeared a little in liquor. Mrs Jones informed examinant that the prisoner had some brass cocks for sale and asked the prisoner to lend her one. He replied that he would sell the two to examinant for 2s 6d and pulled them out of his breeches pocket. The two brass cocks now produced are those which were offered to examinant for sale by the prisoner Evan Owen. The prisoner said that he had purchased one of them from Mrs Currie of Diserth for 1s, and the other he had purchased in town (but did not say from where) for 10d. Examinant knowing that his brother-in-law had lost two brass cocks and some other articles immediately suspected that the prisoner had stolen them and accordingly sent for the police officer and whilst examinant and the officers were in the passage talking of the business the prisoner passed them and went out, and about two minutes afterwards came in again. He then was apprehended but the brass cocks were not in his possession and upon being asked where they were he said he had sold them (after he had gone out) to a man from Chirbury. In a short time afterwards he said he had sold them to a man from Worthen. Then afterwards to a man from Leighton who was selling potatoes in town, contradicting himself altogether. The prisoners was not so drunk that what he knew what he was about. William Beattie*.

Examination-theft. [1833H84]

22 October 1832. The information of Edward Pugh of Welshpool, labourer, taken before Richard Griffiths. Says that on yesterday evening about three o'clock examinant found the brass cocks now produced on the dunghill in the Castle Inn yard (belonging to Mr Jones) half covered over with soil. The mark of Edward Pugh.

William Beattie says that the two brass cocks now produced (and sworn to by the above Edward Pugh) are those which the prisoner Evan Owen offered to him for sale in the kitchen of the Castle Inn. William Beattie*.

22 October 1832. Information of Richard Davies of Welshpool, innholder, taken before Richard Griffiths. Says that his neighbour Mary, wife of Thomas Newell, borrowed a brass cock from examinant and examinant having sent for it, and it then being in use in a porter barrel, Mrs Newell sent examinant another until she could return examinant's. That one of the brass cocks now produced (and dented) examinant believes to be the one so lent by him to Mrs Newell. Examinant has not returned the one he had from Mrs Newell but that is still in his possession. Examinant cannot swear positively that the brass cock now produced (and dented) is his property and is the one lent to Mrs Newell by him. Richard Davies*.

Examination-theft. [1833H86, 88, 90]

22 October 1832. Examination of the prisoner Evan Owen, taken before Richard Griffiths. Who being warned not to say anything unless he wished it and that whatever he did say would be taken down and used in evidence against him in his trial (if committed) says: The way I had the brass cocks was off a travelling man up the back road in Welshpool near Mr Powell's houses. He asked me if I would tell him where he could have comfortable lodgings. I told him we kept a lodging house ourselves. He said he did not know what to do as he was broke down and could not pay for his lodgings unless he could sell an urn butt that he had and these two cocks which he drew out of his pocket. He asked me to buy them and would take a shilling for them as he was broken down. I offered him 8d which he refused. I then offered him 10d for them and purchased them. I cannot in particular tell the day I purchased them but am not certain whether it was the beginning of last week or the week before. I paid the man 10d for them and he lodged with me that night, saying that if he could not have sold then he must have gone to Llanfair that night. I offered them to Mrs Jones in consequence of her saying that she wanted them. This was on Friday evening last and in the house. It was from Mrs Jones's saying that she was short of brass cocks to tap some barrels and I said I had two at home which she might have and she said she'd like to purchase them. I went for them and left them with her and the following day she gave them back to me in her kitchen and I have offered them to Mr Beattie (who is married to a sister of Mrs Thomas Newell) but we could not agree for the price. I then offered them to some other man for 2s but he did not buy them. I afterwards left them in that man's possession (but I do not know who he was) and went into Mrs Jones's house again and being overcome with liquor I fell asleep and was awoke by the officers taking me into custody on this charge. I had no connection or communication whatever with Thomas Jones that day. The mark of Evan Owen.

Examination-theft. [1833H89]

22 October 1832. Information of Edward Jones of Welshpool, innholder, taken before Richard Griffiths. Says that on Saturday evening last the prisoner Evan Owen of Welshpool, labourer, came to examinant in his yard and offered him for sale two brass cocks for barrels and asked for a shilling for them and a jug of ale. Examinant told him to go down into the house to examinant's wife and talk with her as he examinant knew nothing of these things. Examinant did not see anything of the other prisoner Thomas Jones. Edward Jones*.

Examination-theft. [1833H91]

24 December 1832. Information and complaint of Thomas Jones of Frongreen in pa. Llanllugan, farmer, taken before Says that on Saturday night last four hen fowls and a cock were stolen from his father's premises at Frongreen and that examinant saw those fowls about three or four o'clock that evening and that on the following morning he found they had been stolen from the other fowls and examinant says that about the close of the evening of Saturday he saw the prisoner John Harris crossing a field adjoining examinant's father's land in which there was no footpath. That examinant went towards him but before he could overtake him the prisoner went over a hedge into a wood and examinant saw no more of him. That examinant came to Welshpool this morning in search of the fowls and he overtook the Llanfair stage wagon near Dolarddyn in which he saw in a hamper among some other fowls and geese some of the fowls which had been stolen from his father's premises as aforesaid. That he asked the wagoner (Thomas Davies) whose fowls they were when he said that they belonged to the prisoner John Harris who deals in fowls who was not present. That examinant proceeded to Welshpool and gave information to Samuel Davies, one of the sergeants-at-mace who secured the fowls and apprehended the prisoner. And examinant says that the fowls now produced, viz, three hens and a cock are the property of his father Lewis Jones of Frongreen and were stolen from his premises as aforesaid. That the value of the fowls is about half-a-crown a couple. Thomas Jones*.

Examination-theft. [1833H92]

1 December 1832. Examination of Mary Lloyd of Powys Castle Park taken before William Owen, J.B. Williames, Thomas W. Thomas. Says that she knows Arthur Beedles and that she saw him at the Cross Keys Inn in Welshpool on this day fortnight in the afternoon and there saw some silver in his hand and also as they came out of the house she questioned him about the money he had, and he then showed her two sovereigns, a five shilling piece and four half crowns and left it with her to take care of and was to call that night at her house for it. He did call accordingly but he was in liquor and she would not give it him, but she took it to him the following morning and delivered it to him but he never said where he got the money from. The mark of Mary Lloyd.

Examination-theft. [1833H93]

1 December 1832. Examination and complaint of John Evans of Ffridd in Berriew, taken before William Owen, J.B. Williames, Thomas W. Thomas. Says that on 16 November last he went to Welshpool fair and took a county five pound note with him in his pocketbook. That he was about to pay a few shillings between seven and eight o'clock in the evening and took out his pocketbook and there saw the five pound note and a bill with it. That he then went into the parlour of the Coach Inn with the pocket book in the side pocket of his coat and at the time he went in there were six or seven persons sitting about a large table drinking and amongst them Richard Davies of the Glyn in Berriew and he (complainant) sat down by him and Arthur Beedles another of the persons. But in five or 10 min after he sat down he took out his pocketbook to look for silver he thought was in the book and thinks that the book was not out of his hand. That the following morning he was in Welshpool where he had been all night and upon opening his book found that his five pound note was gone and supposing it had dropped out of his book at the Coach Inn he went there to enquire after it but could not obtain any information. That on Sunday morning (the next day) Richard Davies was passing by his house when complainant asked him if he remembered in being in his company at Welshpool fair and if these saw him take out his pocketbook and he said he did and that a paper had dropped out of it which he gave into his hand and told him to take care of his pocketbook. That he was not in the parlour more than a quarter of an hour and then left all the same presence in the rooms and the said Arthur Beedles was sitting within two persons of him when he took out his pocketbook. The mark of John Evans.

Examination-theft. [1833H94]

1 December 1832. Examination of Arthur Beedles, the prisoner, taken before William Owen, J.B. Williames, Thomas W. Thomas. Says that he was going out of the kitchen of the Coach Inn in Welshpool into the street on the night of last Welshpool fair he put his foot upon a paper and then took it up and handed it to Richard Davies of Glyn in the street who went out of the house with him (examinant) who looked at it and said it was a five pound bill. That the bill was dirty and Davies told him to go to Mr Pugh's the ironmonger and change it which he did and Davies then told him to keep the money and give it him as he wanted it to pay for liquor. That they were together a day and a night and he paid out of the change of the five pound note during that time for what they drank. The mark of Arthur Beedles.

Examination-theft. [1833H95]

1 December 1832. Examination of Thomas Withers of Berriew, taken before William Owen, J.B. Williames, Thomas W. Thomas. Says that Oliver Evans brought Arthur Beedles to his father's shop on Thursday last in custody and that examinant said to Beedles, what is this charge against you and he said it was no harm and after some other observations and without any promise or threat, Beedles said he found the note in the mixen opposite the Wheatsheaf stables in Welshpool. Thomas Withers*.

Examination-theft. [1833H96]

1 December 1832. Examination and complaint of Oliver Evans of Ffridd in Berriew, taken before William Owen, J.B. Williames, Thomas W. Thomas. Says that on Thursday mornig last Arthur Beedles of Waterloo house in Berriew was put into his custody by Arthur Evans a constable to take him (Beedles) to Berriew. That on their way they were talking about the note and examinant told him he had better own to taking the money when Beedles said he saw the note dropping in the Coach from John Evans with its face up and he (Beedles) put his foot upon it and that after John Evans (examinant's brother) had left the room he (Beedles) took up the note and winked at Richard Davies and they went out of the house together and Davies looked at it at the window and said it was a £5 note and that they then went up to Mr Pugh's shop where he (Beedles) got change for the note – in two sovereigns and £3 in silver. That when examinant and Beedles got to Berriew they went to Mr Withers' shop where … Mr Withers asked Beedles where he got the money who

answered that he and Richard Davies found the note in the mixen up the lane by Mr Bostock's house in Welshpool. Oliver Evans*.

Examination-theft. [1833H97]

27 November 1833. Examination of Catherine, wife of Richard Harris of Brithdir Common, labourer, taken before Edward Pugh. Says that yesterday afternoon about dusk she went to a standing a little below the hall in Welshpool which belonged to Samuel Keatley Butler where two women were, one of them the prisoner but not seeing Butler there she enquired of the two women where he was, when the prisoner said it is very odd he is gone and left the standing. Both of the women were meddling with the different articles on the standing and each of them put something in her pocket which caused examinant to suspect they were stealing. She then went and informed a person who keeps a standing adjoining Butler's. That he was not at his standing and that he did not know his loss. While examinant was talking to her the prisoner and the other woman went away from the standing above. Presently Butler returned to his standing and examinant told him he did not know his loss, that two women had been there but whether she told him they had stolen or taking anything away she does not recollect. Examinant not finding what she wanted at Samuel Butler's standing went to his brother's (John) when the prisoner came from it (John's standing) putting something large under the cloak. Examinant stood there looking at thinking she was stealing and presently the prisoner returned to John's standing, took some yarn of it without saying anything to him and put it under the cloak and then went away. Examinant immediately told John Butler a woman had taken yarn of his standing and pointed to her as she was going and went with him to her. The mark of Catherine Harris.

Examination-theft. [1833H98]

24 December 1832. The information of Thomas Davis of Llanfair, carrier, taken before Edward Pugh and Richard Griffiths. Says that this morning about seven o'clock the prisoner John Harris who lives in Llanfair brought the deponent who carries from Llanfair to Welshpool, a hamper containing a number of fowls and geese which examinant was as usual (Harris being a dealer in poultry) to convey for him to Welshpool market. That examinant accordingly brought them in his wagon to Welshpool and soon after his arrival Harris and his wife came to examinant for the hamper and examinant delivered its contents to Harris. That immediately afterwards Samuel Davies, one of the sergeants-at-mace, came and charged Harris with stealing some of the fowls and took him into custody. Thomas Davies*.

Examination-theft. [1832H99] xx 2nd part missing?

24 December 1832. The information of Samuel Davies of Welshpool, sergeant- at-mace, taken before Edward Pugh and Richard Griffiths. Says that Thomas Jones of Frongreen having informed him this morning that some fowls had been stolen from his father's premises on Saturday night last and that he had discovered them in the Llanfair wagon coming to Welshpool examinant went to meet the wagon towards the upper turnpike gate and met it by the Raven Inn at a short distance to the town hall, where he waited in sight of it till he saw the prisoner John Harris and his wife come and take the fowls out of the wagon. That examinant then went up to the prisoner and asked him whose fowls they were who said they were his. That examinant charged him with stealing them from Jones of the Frongreen and took him into custody. That after he had taken him to the town clerk's office the prisoner said that he had bought them in Llanfair on Friday last from Mrs Bebb of Hendre, and upon being further questioned he said that he had only bought one couple from Mrs Bebb and that he had bought the others in Llanfair from ... some other persons whose names he did not know but he knew their faces and he had no doubt but he could find them about. Samuel Davies*.

Examination-theft. [1832H100, 109 (fist part)]

27 November 1832. John Butler of the town of Shrewsbury, hawker, taken before Edward Pugh. Says that he ahd a stall or standing in Welshpool market yesterday for the sale of yarm, taper, cotton and other small articles and that about 5 or 6 yesterday evening (it being dusk) he was informed by one Catherine Harris tha the prisoner, Margaret, wife of Thomas Davies, labourer, who had then just left his informant's stall had stolen some yarn from it. The he, examinant, pursued the prisoner and overtook her about eight or ten yards from his standing and charged her with stealing the yarn which she denied but in a few minutes she drew the hank of grey woollen yarn now produced from under her cloak and gave it to examinant but he does not recollect what she said when she gave it him. That examinant let the prisoner go and returned to his standing when the said Catherine Harris told him that she the prisoner had some more yarn. That examinant went again after the prisoner who had only proceeded a few yards from the place he had first overtaken her. That examinant charged her with having some more of his yarn in her possession which she denied but after some

hesitation she drew the hank of dark brown yarn now produced from under her cloak and gave it to the examinant. That the examinant let her go again and he returned to his standing and was again informed by the said Catherine Harris that he had not had all the yarn from the prisoner. That he went again to the prisoner and asked her to give him the remainder of the yarn which ...

she had but she said that she had not got any more but after being pressed a great deal by examinant she gave him the part of the hank of black and blue worsted yarn now produced, which said several hanks of the yarn are the property of the examinant (he being able to identify the same by marks that are on them) and that the same had not been sold by him to any person. That examinant left the prisoner and returned to his standing and was again informed by the said Catherine Harris that the prisoner had stolen some things from off his brother's standing which adjoined that of examinant. That examinant went again in search of the prisoner and found her by John Pozzy's standing several yards lower down the street. That he asked her for the things she had taken from his brother's Standing when she denied having taken anything from it. That examinant then brought her back to his brother's Samuel Keatley Butler's standing and gave her in charge to William Stone, and then went to call a constable to take her into custody but when informant returned she was gone; and examinant says that three other hanks of worsted yarn, one white, one blue, and the other russetting? blue now produced by the constable is his property. John Butler*.

Examination-theft. [1832H101]

20 November 1832. The examination of Hugh Jones of Coedcaehaidd, pa. Llanfair, farmer, taken before John Lloyd and Griffith Howel in the presence and the hearing of Ann Jones charged this day before us with feloniously stealing at the said parish on the evening of Monday 5 or Thursday 6 November four ducks of the value of 3s, property of Hugh Jones. This deponent says that on Tuesday 6 November when he was harrowing in a field beyond his house, he heard his wife crying and coming down the field towards him and saying our ducks are killed at the Lletty. Not believing her and supposing that they had been either coursed by dogs or stoned, went on harrowing. She again said that the wife of Francis Jones is feathering the yellow drake and the three other ducks are on the table killed with the necks hanging over the table. He then left the horses on the field, went to Lletty when the said Ann Jones was cutting off the head of one of the ducks and putting it into the pot that was on the fire. Three other ducks were lying on the table. I asked her why she had killed his ducks and laid hold of them, the said Francis Jones going and standing with his back to the door and lifting a spade up with both his hands and threatening to cleave him this deponent if he did not loose the ducks, the said Ann Jones saying if he would not loose the ducks she would thrust the knife through his heart. This deponent then went out having loosed his hold of the ducks, the said Ann Jones throwing a spade after him. Further says that on 31 October last meeting with John the son of the said Ann Jones upon the road between the Llety and Coedcaehaidd, ask them was he going to Welshpool that day. He said he was and I asked them where he had things to carry to Welshpool every day. He, the said John Jones, said that his mother had yesterday bought at Pantgwyn two couples of fowls and one couple of ducks and when being asked what was in the cloth which was in the side saddle between the hampers he said that they were the couple of ducks which is mother had had at Pantgwyn the day before. The mark of Hugh Jones*.

Recognizance-theft. [1832H102]

King on the prosecution of Richard Rowland against John Williams and Richard Bennett, for larceny. Richard Rowland in £20 to appear and prefer a bill; Mary Jones, witness in £10; Thomas Evans, witness in £10; David Owen, witness in £10; Lewis Rowland, constable, in £10; Richard Jarman, constable, in £10.

Examination-theft. [1832H103, 106]

29 November 1832. The examination of Richard James of Kerry, a special constable, taken before William Morris. Says that on Saturday morning last about 10 o'clock he saw the prisoner driving a drove of about 25 ducks along the turnpike road into the village of Kerry. That they were of different colours, some black and some blue black ones, the ducks were much tired and dirty. That examinant asked the prisoner where he had the ducks and where he was going with them and he answered he had bought them about the farmhouses in Churchstoke. That the prisoner said he had the ducks to sell and examinant asked him what he should give him for the four that were tired and could not be got on. That they had some words about the price and at last examinant agreed to purchase the four for 3s and a pint of ale, and paid the prisoner for them and soon after several persons were about the ducks in the village buying them and examinant and his son chose two for Mr Salter who gave 2s for them. That examinant and his wife afterwards sold three of the ducks to 3 of their neighbours for 1s each and that the prisoner had sold all the ducks he came to examinant's house for the pint of ale, and during the time he remained and in consequence of suspicion after he followed the prisoner and

overtook him about a mile from Newtown and brought him back to Kerry and kept him there the Sunday evening when Mr Morgan's servant came ... owned the ducks. That one of the feet now produced is from the duck he kept and the others were collected from tem different persons in the village who had purchased them from the prisoner, and examinant examined the footmark on the duck that he sold to widow Davies and it was marked the same as his duck. Richard James*.

The examination of John Edmunds of Kerry, labourer. Says that on Saturday morning last between eight and nine o'clock he met the prisoner in the turnpike road opposite Glanmeheli with a drove of ducks and asked him where he had them and the prisoner answered from Abermiwl and was taking them to Newtown to sell. That examinant observed it was a queer way to take them from Abermiwl to Newtown through Kerry to which he answered his father lived in Kerry. Examinant said he would buy the ducks of him when he loosed five that had been tired out of a haircloth bag that he had on his back. That the prisoner offered the ducks at 2s 2d or 2s 3d a couple but examinant said he should be back in the village about 12 o'clock and would then try to buy them but the prisoner had left the village before examinant returned. That he assisted James to apprehend the prisoner who then said he had bought the ducks that morning from a man he did not know on the road above Gwern-y-go which is about a mile from Pentreheilyn and not on the road to Abermiwl. The mark of John Edmunds.

29 November 1832. The examination of James Thomas of Pentreheilyn, taken before William Morris. Says that he has lived servant with Mr David Morgan of Pentreheilyn two years next May and the adjoining Cae Bittra brook divides the counties of Montgomery and Salop. That his master had many ducks hatched about May last to the number of about 36 and that he footmarked all the young ducks except for by a round hole in the left <u>claw</u> of the right claw of the same foot slit up. But the ducks were generally feeding about the stack yard by day and went down to the brook at night to roost where they remained all night often on the Montgomeryshire side of the brook. That he saw all the ducks in the stack yard on the Friday evening a little before night but did not count them. They were large ducks some of them black backed with white rings around their necks and other blue backs white breasts and white round their necks had been stolen and in the afternoon that they heard that a man was in custody at Kerry on suspicion of stealing ducks and he went up and there saw one of his last ducks dead in the possession of Richard James and for live ones in the possession of Samuel Tomley. But he remembers seeing the prisoner (John Wood) in the service of Mr Farmer of Bacheldre near Pentreheilyn about four years ago. James Thomas*.

Examination-theft. [1832H104]

20 November 1832. The examination of Ann Jones of Llety, pa. Llanfair, poulterer, taken before John Lloyd and Griffith Howel. The said Ann Jones being charged on the oath of Hugh Jones of Coedcaehaidd with feloniously stealing at the said parish on the evening of Monday 5 or Thursday 6 November four ducks of the value of 3s, property of Hugh Jones. Says that of the four ducks which the said Hugh Jones claimed on 6 November and seized as being his property, two of them she purchased on Tuesday 13 October and the other two at Llanfair fair on 1 November instant. Ann Jones*.

Recognizance-theft. [1833H105]

20 November 1832. Francis Jones of Llety, pa. Llanfair, farmer, and Ann his wife, each in £20; David Ingram of Goetre in pa. Llanerfyl and William Williams of Caestwbwrn in pa. Llanerfyl, farmers, each in $\pounds 10$. Taken before John Lloyd and Griffith Howel for the said Ann Jones to appear at the enxt Q.S. to answer concerning the felonious stealing of four ducks the property of Hugh Jones of Coedcaehaidd, pa. Llanfair, farmer.

Examination-theft. [1832H106]

29 November 1832. The examination of Samuel Tomley of Kerry, blacksmith, taken before William Morris. Says that on Saturday morning last he purchased four ducks from the prisoner in Kerry village for 4s and he now has the ducks at his house in Kerry and the footmark of three of them are similar to the foot now produced by Richard James. Samuel Tomley*.

John Wood the prisoner having heard the witnesses examinant says that he bought 25 ducks from a man on the turnpike road near Sarn in Kerry on Saturday morning last soon after daybreak. That he did not know the man but he gave him 18s for them and he drove them to Kerry and sold and there. That he is a native of Dolfor in Kerry. The mark of John Wood.

Examination-theft. [1832H107]

20 November 1832. The examination of Catherine Ellis of Tynbach, pa. Llanfair, poulterer, taken before John Lloyd and Griffith Howel. Says that on the morning of Friday 2 November she went to Llety the residence of the said Francis and Ann Jones to see her husband who was there at work. She went into the house and saw two ducks upon the table killed and not feathered. She said to Ann Jones you have killed the two ducks which you yesterday bought at Llanfair. Yes said the said Ann Jones. This deponent then said, they are good ones. They are, answered Ann Jones considering that the cost only 2s save 1d. This deponent further says that on the Thursday 1 November she went to Llanfair fair for the purpose of buying fowls. She purchased about 20 couple. That the said Ann Jones was also there on that day buying fowls. That those purchased by the former and then by the latter were placed near each other, the daughter of the latter standing between the fowls to prevent them being mixed together. That this deponent assisted the said Ann Jones in packing up her fowls in her hampers and having missed a couple of her own fowls searched very minutely among those of the said Ann Jones where they were found. She is certain that this said Ann Jones had only one couple of ducks among the fowls she had that day bought. Must have seen them has she had any more, having been with her almost the whole of the day and as she has before stated assisted her in packing up her fowls in her hampers. The mark of Catherine Ellis.

Examination-theft. [1832H108]

26 October 1832. Examination of Margaret, wife of Thomas Jones of the Fish Inn in the town of Llanidloes, taken before George Meares and Thomas Price. Says that the prisoner who calls himself Edward Revel came to her house about 10 o'clock yesterday morning and called for a pint of ale and 3d of rum and then for ham and eggs, again 2 pints of ale. He then asked if he should have a bed for the night and paid down 6d for the bed. About 12 o'clock noon he asked if he should go and lie down, and her servant Mary Griffiths showed him upstairs. About 2.30 o'clock she (examinant) went upstairs to the chest of drawers and upon opening them found there was not anything therein. She used to keep therein her caps and collars. She then went down and sent for a constable. The constable David Elias came there and soon after she followed him upstairs. She then found the caps and collars which ought to have been in the drawers upon the feet of the bed. The prisoner was lying on the bed. She then went out of the room. That the caps and collars now produced are her property. She left the room leaving the constable and Thomas Richards to search the prisoner. Afterwards she returned and looked the other drawer and found a trousers and two waistcoats and a pair of small clothes removed from the drawer. That the two waistcoats, trousers and small clothes now produced are her husband's property. Margaret Jones*.

Examinations-theft. [1833H109] see above at 100

On the reverse: Thomas Jones, a native of Denbighshire is a brother to Michael Jones of the Swan Inn in Denbigh.

Richard Jones a pedlar says he took the half sovereign at Bromyard. He gave 9s and a pair of bracers for it. He can make bracers and stands fairs and markets with needles. That he took the sovereign in Hereford of a man to whom he sold a pair of bracers about a month ago there were 5 pawnbrokers duplicates found on him Thomas Jones came to town together and also...ends

Examination-theft. [1833H110]

27 November 1832. The information of Samuel Keatley Butler of Shrewsbury, hawker, taken before Edward Pugh. He had a stall or standing in Welshpool market yesterday upon which knives and forks and other articles of hardware and also yarn, tape and other small things were exposed for sale. That's about five or six vesterday evening or thereabouts he went to buy some candles to light his stall and desired his brother who had a store adjoining his to watch examinant's in his absence. But upon his return he was informed by Catherine Harris that he examinant did not know his loss, and said that a woman had stolen some things from his standing. That examinant upon looking over his standing missed a piece of blue and white worsted binding but did not then miss anything else. But in a few minutes examinant's brother, John Butler, who it appears had gone in search of the prisoner came to examinant's standing with the prisoner and showed him three hanks of varn which he said he had taken from the prisoner and which she had stolen from his standing. That examinant's brother left the prisoner with him and then he believes went in search of a constable to take charge of the prisoner and that during his brother's absence some person came to examinant's standing and whilst he was attending to that person someone who was standing by pushed the prisoner into the crowd and she made her escape. And examinant says that the pair of braces and a piece of worsted binding now produced by William Morris, constable, are his, the examinant's property and were stolen from his standing yesterday and that he is able to swear to the said braces for their having his own private mark on them. And

that the brush shaving box and two pieces of black ferreting, a piece of white frame tape, the two small tooth combs and an opening comb, now also produced, examinant believes to be his property. Samuel K Butler*.

Examination-theft. [1833H111]

26 October 1832. The examination of David Elias, constable of pa. Llanidloes, taken before George Meares and Thomas Price. Says that he was sent for to Thomas Jones's of the Fish Inn in Llanidloes about three o'clock yesterday. When he went there he was told mischief had been done by the prisoner who calls himself Edward Revell. He went upstairs and wakened him and asked what was the matter, that he must get up. He said nothing had been done amiss. Examinant then asked him to strip. Prisoner said he would not. Examinant then told him he would oblige him to strip. Prisoner then sat down on the chair and began to strip. Examinant then found it trousers, pairs small clothes and two waistcoats, now produced, upon him and the two waistcoats were under his shirt. The caps and collars were on the bedside. The mark of David Elias.

John Williams*.

Informant went into the said field and lands about it but was unable to find any of them and his said servant on his return said that she had not found them. But on Saturday last being told that persons who had sold geese at Montgomery were detained there on suspicion of having stolen them, and was there shown five geese by Thomas Lloyd and others who said they had bought them of the said detained persons. That informant has had one of the said geese, namely the gander, about 10 or a dozen years and has had the goose some years but does not recollect how many. That the others were their produce this year and were hatched at informant's house, and there kept with the old ones until they were good strong goslings and then they were returned and kept in the said field. That informant has another maid servant named Mary Morgan who has lived with him many years, and had the care of the said geese. That he has had five geese shown to him this morning as those which were so sold as aforesaid, and they are like those he lost in colour which were dark ones, but he cannot swear that those so shown to him are those he so lost. He believes that they may be them and he also believes those he so lost were feloniously stolen from him. John Jones*. At the foot: A very unwilling witness.

Thomas Lloyd of Montgomery, a mercer, says that on Thursday last between eight and nine o'clock in the morning he saw James Clare and William Vaughan with five geese in the market hall at Montgomery. That informant bought two of them at the price of 5s 3d of Clare and they are the same he now produces. That when they were about bargaining for the two geese, Clare said he had brought two loads of coal with Mr Plats and Mr Kempster's teams from Aston to Mrs Snead at Chirbury. That Clare after that and at the same time and place said that two of the geese belong to Vaughan and 3 to himself and that they won them at cards. Thomas Lloyd*. *At the foot*: Thomas Lloyd in £20 to give evidence.

Jane the wife of Edward Corbett of Montgomery says that last Thursday morning in the market hall in Montgomery she bought one goose of James Calre at 2s 11d price. It weighed 11 ½ lbs. That the goose she so bought is that which she now produces. Jane Corbett*.

Edward Corbett in £20 for her giving evidence.

George Weaver of Montgomery, butcher, says that last Thursday morning about nine o'clock in the market hall in Montgomery he treated with James Clare for two geese which he asked for 5s but which informant offered only 4s 6d. Claire then said he would take 4s 9d for them but informant is refusing to give more than he had offered Claire turned to Mr Vaughan, who was with him, and said that he (Vaughan) might sell them for 4s 6d if he liked for they were his (Vaughan's). That he (Clare) had sold his own and must be off to the horses. And then Vaughan sold informant the two geese at 4s 6d which geese this informant now produces. George Weaver*. £20 to give evidence.

William Passant, servant to John Jones of Worthen says that he has been Mr Jones's servant nearly a year and a half. That he saw his Masters five geese in his field near Worthen last Wednesday morning as he was going further on to his work. He left his master at home and went alone and is not certain whether he saw his master again that they day or not until he returned home at night. He has not seen the geese since that he knows of, but he believes that the five geese now shown to him are the same which is master lost. William Passant. *At the foot*: Kept his eyes very much on his master.

When examinant asked him how he would have bought more and brought them to Kerry on Monday as he had said he would if he had spent the money to which he answered he could have them where he had the others by the brookside by Mr Morgan's, and that he saw light in Mr Morgan's house as he drove the ducks by and that he did not know how many there were and they got into the brook at Gwern-y-go where he got his feet wet in going after them. The mark of Richard James.

Afterwards deponent asked David Owen if he would come and see the track of the carts both going to and coming from the deponent's stacks but said he was too busy and that Tudor Robert would come with him. That Tudor Robert came with him when he this deponent in the presence of the said Tudor Robert saw the track of two carts coming towards his, this deponent's stacks from the direction of Machynlleth and returning in the same direction. That before he left the turbary saw John Williams of Maes and Richard Bennett of Esgairgaled coming from the direction of Machynlleth and called to Richard Bennett and asked him to stop that he wanted to speak to him upon which both John Williams and Richard Bennett stopped and he went to them and asked them if they would each of them bring in a load of turf instead of what they had sold that day upon which Richard Bennett drove his cart on without making any reply but John Williams asked deponent "what person can you bring to prove that we were near your turf", when deponent said "I will take my chance for that and so will I to". John Williams replied and they parted. Upon returning home deponent met Richard Lewis of Maes and Evan David and told them that he supposed the persons who had gone down that morning before them could afford to sell their turf cheap when Evan David asked deponent if they were his turf. When deponent replied that they were when Evan David told him that a load of them were at the Bowling Green upon which deponent went to the Bowling Green and saw the turf before the door. He examined them and said to the woman of the house these are my turf, when she said some two persons had been there saying that they were stolen turf. That on Monday morning 22 October deponent went to the house of the said John Williams and asked him if he would make him some recompense for the turf otherwise he would prosecute him. When he said he could do nothing to him unless the turf was thatched and that would have more pain about them than they were worth and if he had stolen them they were but a load of turf. That in a short time afterwards deponent saw Richard Bennett and asked him why he did not come to him the night he wanted him, when he replied that the turf were nothing to him and if they were deponent's tur he dared say he would be paid for them. That deponent met John Williams and Richard Bennett going up with their carts upon the evening of Friday 19 October with their carts empty and that he saw them returning early the following morning with their carts laden with turf. He produces the turf found out the Bowling Green saying that they are part of his turf; he knows them from their size and form. Says that Mary Jones of the Bowling Green told him that another load of the same turf were sold on that evening to one Thomas Evans of Machynlleth. That in a few days afterwards he had occasion to go to Machynlleth and called upon Thomas Evans and asked him if he had bought any turf lately, he replied that he had and showed part of them to this deponent who is now producing part of the same turf says they are part of it is turf. The mark of the Richard Rowland.

Report-bridges. [1833E5]

At a meeting of the committee held at the Goat Inn in Llanfair on 17 September 1832 to enquire into the circumstances relative to the bridges:

Upper Heniarth on road Llanfair to Meifod

Lower Heniarth on road Llanfair to Welshpool

Pontprendann, Pont Tynewydd, Twrch, Dolymaen, Pontdugoes, all on road Llanfair to Machynlleth. Present: Viscount Clive, Joseph Hayes Lyon, David Pugh.

Having examined evidence find that with respect to the two bridges at Heniarth the upper was built about 22 years ago and that there was a bridge on or near that situation before; that it was built by the trustees of the road from Llanfair to Meifod who paid £50 on account of it. That it was badly and insufficiently built. With respect to Lower Heniarth bridge. That it was built about 25 years ago by the trustees of the turnpike controlled from Berriew to Heniarth but that it was well and sufficiently built. That there was no county surveyor at the period at which these bridges were built to whom the trustees of the road who built them could apply to have the building superintended. That the county did not interfere with or interrupt the building of the bridges during their progress nor since as insufficient or likely to become chargeable to the county. That the opinion of eminent counsel have been taken upon the circumstances before stated by which it is recommended that the bridges should be repaired as county bridges to submit to the consideration of the court the expediency of acting upon this recommendation.

Pontprendanno. We find that it was built in the year 1806 by the trustees of the road and under the superintendence of a surveyor. That there had been a footbridge.

We consider these bridges and the circumstances similar to the Heniarth bridges with the exception that they were built under the superintendance of surveyors and there had previously been in each case foot bridges. Pont Tynewydd, Twrch and Nantydugoed. We find that these bridges were built subsequently to 22 Henry VIII and previously to the passing of 43 George c.59 and we consider the county liable to maintain them. Dolymaen bridge. We found that it was built about 25 years ago by the trustees of the road under the superintendence of a surveyor and there was before existing a footbridge. In addition to the foregoing bridge the attention of the committee has been drawn to Pont Tannatt near the village of Llanerfyl which is not included in the list of bridges referred to their consideration but for which to be referred to a committee application was intended to be made at the last April Q.S. but was by a mistake omitted. With respect to this bridge we find that it was built subsequently to 22 HenryVIII and before the passing of 43 George c.59. There has been a wooden fort or horse bridge before. We consider the county liable to maintain this bridge. Upper Heniarth bridge. David Jones says that he knows the bridge and that it was built from 21 to 22 years ago. It was built by his brother Robert Jones who died five years since. There was not any bridge existing at this situation before the present bridge was built. The mark of David Jones.

Upper Heniarth bridge. David Evans, esq., Says that he remembers the bridge being built about 22 or 23 years ago, there was not any bridge at this place before. He acted as a Commissioner on the road from Llanfair to Llansanffraid and the trustees of the district paid Roberts Jones for building the bridge. David Evans*. David Evans further says that at the time the work was to be paid for the trustees made objection to paying for it in consequence of the work being badly done and the materials being insufficient, he measured the work at the time it was finished with Mr Owen of Dyffryn and he then objected to the work as you made a bad job of it.

Edward Owen says that in the year 1811 Robert shows built the bridge. He knows that the trustees on that line of our road paid ± 50 on account of building the bridge. He knows the situation of each bridge and that previous to the building of the present bridges there was not in existence a bridge in either place. Edward Owen*.

Lower Heniarth bridge. David Jones of Llanfair says that he is a mason and knows the bridge on the road from Llanfair to Welshpool. Remembers the situation before any bridge existed. He built the present bridge from 24 to 25 years ago being the only bridge ever built their within his knowledge. In certain it is not more than 25 years ago. He was employed by the trustees of the road from Berriew to Dolarddyn and paid by Mr Matthew Jones who acted as treasurer of that district. He was paid by measurements having agreed by the yard for the work. Can positively swear that it is not more than 25 years ago since he built the bridge. The mark of David Jones. David Jones further says that his work was measured by Richard Davies and he took his bill to Mr Matthew Jones who paid him. He had not any objection made to it at the time on account of the work. The mark of David Jones.

David Evans, esq., says that he remembers the bridge being built about 24 or 25 years ago and is sure that it is not more than 25 years ago. He acted as a Commissioner on the district from Heniarth to Berriew at that time and knows that the trustees of that district paid for the building. There was not any bridge at this place previous to the present bridge being built. David Evans*. He further says that the bridge on the road from

Llanfair to Welshpool which was built by David Jones was in his opinion a good and substantial work the money do was paid to David Jones without any deduction or dispute.

Pontprendanno. Edward Owen remembers the bridge being built by Thomas and Robert Jones, masons, in the year 1806. That it was paid for by the trustees of the road from Llanfair to Nantydugoed as appears by the Treasurer's book. There is also a payment to John Williams for superintending the building of the bridge of two guineas dated 7 January 1808. Previous to building the present bridge there was a footbridge consisting of a plank and a rail for foot passengers. Carriages and horses passed through the ford. The roadway has from that period been repaired at the expense of the trustees. Edward Owen*.

Pont Tynewydd. Humphrey Tudor says he remembers the bridge built and he is sure it has been built more than 50 years. He is a farmer and lives at Tynewydd. He is 63 years of age and believes the same persons paid for the bridge who made the road. He is sure that there was not any bridge at the place previous to the erection of the present one. The mark of Humphrey Tudor.

Twrch bridge. David Jones says that he is a labourer on the road and knows the bridge over the Twrch near Garthbeibio. He is 62 years old. He remembers the present road made near this bridge before which time there was not any bridge in existence here nor in any situation over this stream near the present bridge. The bridge was built upwards of 40 years since. The mark of David Jones.

Dolymaen bridge. David Jones remembers the bridge being built about 25 years ago, previous to which time there was a footbridge. Is sure there was not any carriage bridge3 previous to building the present bridge. The mark of David Jones.

Edward Owen remembers the bridge being built and other superintendence of a surveyor in the year 1806 or 1807 and knows that it was paid by the trustees of the road from Llanfair to Mallwyd. Edward Owen*. Nantdugoed bridge. David Jones says that he knows the bridge and remembers it being built upwards of 40 years since previous to which time there was not any bridge in existence. Knows that it is a bridge on the boundary of the counties of Montgomery and Merioneth. The mark of David Jones.

Edward Owen says that the trustees of the road have repaired this bridge in the year 1811 and paid £6 17s 6d for so doing. Edward Owen*.

Pon Tannat neat Llanerfyl. Rev'd John Lloyd says he remembers the bridge since the year 1794. John Lloyd*. David Jones says that he is at present a labourer working on the road. He is 62 years old and knows the situation there. Remembers the present bridge being built previous to which there was a wooden bridge either for foot passengers or a horse bridge but certainly not a carriage bridge. There was not any appearance of a carriage bridge at this place previous to building the present bridge. The mark of David Jones. **Order**. Confirmed. [1833E/SO/5/230]

Report-visiting magistrates. [1833E6]

Having examined the state of the gaol we have to report not all the courts are finished and the prisoners classed accordingly and regularly at work upon the treadmill. We suggest the propriety of the female prisoners being removed from the old house of correction; one of the courts of the new gaol which was intended for vagrants may be divided for about the sum of £50 so as to separate the female prisoners before and after trial. This arrangement would make both courts very small and as the number of female prisoners is generally few the visiting justices wish to call the attention of the magistrates as to whether it is necessary to divide the court for the purpose of affording the classification required or whether it might not be more expedient to use it as it is at present. The visiting justices have drawn up a set of rules for the management of the gaol which we recommend for the adoption of the court.

We beg to call the attention of the court to the fifth rule upon which we have some doubts but as it acts well in Denbighshire where it has been long adopted we are inclined to recommend a trial of its till the next Q.S. It appears to the committee expedient that a small portion of the courts appropriated to debtors and misdemeanours before trial should be taken as a deposit for coals as a means of carrying away ashes and other refuse from the prison and that a door should be opened into each from the inner arcade of the prison. We also recommend that a water closet should be fixed in the basement story for the gaolers use and that the water closet attached to the infirmary should be fitted up.

Rules-gaol and house of correction. [1833E7]

Rules and regulations relating to prisoners.

1. Each sleeping cell shall contain the following articles: one chamberpot, one bedstead, one canvas mattress filled with straw, two blankets and one rug.

2. Clean sheets shall be put on each bed for debtors once a month; shirts and stockings to be furnished for criminals who have them not, and changed once per week. Prisoners convicted to wear the gaol dress; their own clothes to be taken charge of by the gaoler, and delivered to them on their discharge.

3. The first bell shall be rung at six o'clock in summer and at sunrise in winter (summer in these rules means from 1 April to 1 October and winter from 1 October to 1 April) when every criminal prisoner shall rise, make his bed, and be conducted to the yard where he shall be provided with soap, water and towels; half an hour shall be allowed for breakfast, one hour for dinner, and half an hour for supper. At sunset in summer and throughout the winter criminal prisoners shall wash in yards and then be locked up in their day rooms, and in their cells in half an hour after in summer and at eight o'clock in winter.

4. All criminal prisoners shall be shaved by some prisoner or prisoners twice a week.

5. An allowance of 2s 6d per week to be paid to each criminal prisoner in lieu of diet; and the articles of food to be served to the prisoners twice a week; the bread to be 24 hours old. The sum of 2s 6d week to be allowed to such debtors as are poor and request it as charity. The articles allowed shall be bread, cheese, bacon, butter, potatoes, onions, buttermilk, milk and whey. A table with the prices of the different articles of food allowed to be thus purchased by prisoners shall be fixed every Monday in each court, and in the visiting justices committee room; and the articles shall be furnished to the prisoners in the presence of the keeper. Prisoners under the care of the surgeon shall be allowed such diets as he shall direct.

6. Debtors should not be allowed to receive more than 1 pint of wine, a quarter of a pint of spirits, or 1 quart of cider or of ale per day each.

7. Scales and legal weights shall be taken in the yards when any food is served out and the articles shall be weighed if any prisoner shall request it.

8. An allowance of coal not exceeding 1 cwt per week shall be made to each day room for debtors and criminals.

9. All prisoners shall attend divine service as often as it is performed in the prison.

10. The schoolmaster shall give instructions to all such prisoners as wish for it, as such hours as shall not interfere with their punishment.

11. The hours of admittance of visitors for all prisoners shall be between nine and twelve in the morning and between two and four in the afternoon in summer and between nine and twelve in the morning and one and three in the afternoon in winter on Wednesdays and Saturdays.

12. No letter shall be sent from or received by any criminal prisoner without having been inspected by the keeper or a visiting justice.

13. No person shall be allowed access to any prisoner in solitary confinement except the chaplain, the keeper and turnkeys who shall deliver his daily allowance of food (bread and water) without speaking.

14. No tap shall be kept in the prison nor shall spirituous liquor of any kind be admitted for the use of any of the prisoners except debtors under any pretence whatsoever; unless by a written order of the surgeon specifying the quantity and for whose use.

15. No gaming of any sort shall be permitted in the prison.

16. No money under the name of garnish shall be taken from any prisoner on his or her entrance in the prison under any pretence whatsoever.

17. Prisoners shall be employed with the approbation of the visiting justices in menial offices.

18. Prisoners entitled to their discharge in the evening shall be allowed at their option to remain till the next morning; if labouring under any acute or dangerous distemper they shall not be discharged until in the option of the surgeon such discharge is safe or shall be required by such prisoners.

19. The visiting justices will report the particularly good conduct of any prisoner to the justices at Q.S. who may recommend such prisoner to the Royal mercy and in case such prisoner be discharged the visiting magistrates shall order to be given to him a sum of money not exceeding 2s.

20. The keeper shall have power to hear all complaints touching any of the following offences, that is to say, disobedience of the rules of the prison, assaults by one person confined in the prison upon another, profane cursing and swearing, any indecent or irreverent behaviour at the chapel by any description of prisoners absence from chapel without leave, idleness or negligence in work or wilful mismanagement of it, and may punish all such offences by ordering any offender to close confinement in the refractory or solitary cell, and by keeping such a offender upon bread and water only, for any term not exceeding three days, or may put him in irons if necessary, and he shall report the same to the visiting justices at their next meeting: any greater offence shall be reported to the visiting magistrates in the first instance who shall enquire and punish by solitary confinement is for a month or by personal correction.

21. The keeper shall select the most orderly and fit criminal prisoner in each court and appoint him a monitor in it taking care that such appointment shall not interfere with any punishments to which such prisoner may have been sentenced.

22. The monitor shall be allowed credits for 3d per week as long as he performs his duty.

23. He shall be responsible for the cleanliness and order of his court of the day room and cells belonging he shall see them swept every morning, and the flagging of the court and the day room washed at least twice a week in winter and thrice a week in summer and the cells once a week the year around.

24. The hours of labour at the treadmill to be from 8 o'clock to 12 and from 2 to 6 in the summer and from 9 o'clock to 12 and from 1 o'clock to 4 in the winter.

25. No prisoner confined under the sentence of any court, nor any prisoner confined in pursuance of any conviction before a justice, shall receive any food, clothing or other necessities other than the gaol allowance.

26. Any prisoner feeling himself aggrieved may complain to the visiting magistrates (who visit the prison once a month or oftener) keeper, chaplain, surgeon as the case may be. Charles Thomas Jones, Panton Corbett, William Morris, John Davies.

Examination-theft. [1833E37]

27 March 1833. Examination of Lewis Jones of Cwmmedrol, pa. Cemaes, farmer, taken before John Hughes. Says that about two or three o'clock on Friday afternoon last he saw prisoner who came to him to enquire for work that witness desired him to try to plough which he did and then asked him what wage he asked. Prisoner answered £2 or two guineas till May (witness is not certain which). Witness said 6d a day would have been proper, they then parted. Lewis Jones*.

The voluntary confession of prisoner William Rowlands who being informed that any statement made by him would be given in evidence against him on his trial says that he is guilty of the offence of which he is charged. The mark of William Rowlands.

Examination-theft. [1833E38]

27 March 1833. The information and complaint of John Ellis of Pen-y-gyrn, pa. Cemaes, taken before John Hughes. That on Saturday night or early on Sunday morning witness lost a grey mare out of his stable at Peny-gyrn. That about three o'clock on Sunday evening he went in search of the mare towards the Dinas Mawddwy and on arriving there he heard of the grey mare having passed through the gate he then went to a Wrexham where he saw his mare at the stable of the Red Cow Inn. That prisoner William Rowland was in the stable at the same time. Examinant stated that the mare was his and that on further conversation William Thomas, a police officer, seized the prisoner and said I take you into custody, I have no remedy, or something to that effect. Examinant says that the mare shown this evening here is his mare and that she is the same mare as he found at Wrexham in the stable of the Red Cow Inn when the prisoner was taken into custody. John Ellis*.

William Thomas of Bala, co. Merioneth, officer, says he saw the prosecutor John Ellis about 12 o'clock on Sunday night last at Llanfawr who asked him whether he would come with him in search of a mare he had lost. Examinant agreed to go with the prosecutor in search of her. Witness and prosecutor in consequence of a fair being to be held at Wrexham on Monday proceeded there together, about a mile from Wrexham met a person and enquired from him whether the horse fair was over at Wrexham and that person replied it was but that several persons had then horses to sell there. Examinant then enquired whether any person had arrived there with a grey mare. Witness was then informed that a person had arrived on Sunday evening with the horse of the description. Witness enquired for that on witness's arrival at Wrexham he met with a drover named William Jones and enquired of him whether he had seen a grey mare as he was in search of one that had been stolen. William Jones answered he had, adding that he was very sorry for William Rowlands (witness believes he said). I thought he stole the mare Jones said and witness then met the prisoner in Wrexham. Witness asked the prisoner if he had a horse to sell. Prisoner said he had and took witness with him to the stable of the Red Cow Inn and pointed out in the stable a grey mare which witness has this day seen at Cemaes, and said it was his mare and that he would sell for ± 12 . Witness then went for prosecutor and on prosecutor coming with him into the stable he identified the mare and prisoner was taken into custody by witness who brought in before the magistrate. William Thomas*.

Richard Ryder of Maesmachreth in pa. Cemaes, farmer, says that on Friday last about 12 o'clock noon he saw prisoner at Maesmachraeth coming out of the fold. Prisoner had been at the house acquiring for work as witness understood. Witness is quite positive that prisoner is the person he then and there saw. Prisoner was directed in witnesses presence by John Hughes a tailor that worked at witness's house to go to Cwmmeidrol, but Lewis Jones the occupier of that place was in want of a workman. Witness subsequently in the evening of Friday met prisoner and ask them if he had hired. Prisoner said no he was too hard for wages. Prisoner asked witness the distance to Machynlleth. Witness answered about 5 miles and a half. Richard Ryder*.

That's about two o'clock in the afternoon of the same day she missed the shirt from the other linens and that she immediately concluded that it must have been stolen, and having seen the prisoner Richard Davies who is a servant of Mr Holloway of Guilsfield in the village of Guilsfield pass several times up and down the road with his master's team she suspected that the prisoner had stolen the shirt. That examinant informed Samuel Lewis of Guilsfield of the circumstances and described the particularity of the stitching in the collar and desired him to take notice what shirt the prisoner wore. That yesterday morning the said Samuel Lewis informed examinant that he had seen the prisoner wear a shirt answering the description which examinant had given him. That upon hearing this examinant and Thomas Davies, a constable who accompanied her to Mr Holloway's where the prisoner resided and that she accused him of stealing the shirt which he strongly denied. That examinant asked the prisoner to let her see the shirt which he had then on. That the prisoner then pushed examinant away and said that the shirt was his own. That examinant insisted upon seeing it and after a great deal of persuasion from his master and mistress and the interference of the constable the prisoner unbuttoned the front of his smock frock and examinant had a sufficient view of the shirt to know it had to be the one she had lost. That examinant then requested the prisoner to draw it off that she might see the marking on the hip but the prisoner at first refused but after a good deal of hesitation the prisoner went upstairs with the constable for the purpose of taking off the shirt. That the shirt now produced by Thomas Davis the constable is the same shirt which was stolen from her garden hedge as before stated and is the property of her son Richard

Lewis and that the letters RL marked on the hip are now cut or ripped out but examinant is able to identify it by the peculiar stitching of the collar and lining inside his shoulders. Mary Lewis*.

John Williams the prisoner says that more than three months since he went between four and five o'clock in the morning to look for sand. That he found a bucket near the abutment of Newtown Long bridge which he carried home. That in about a week afterwards he took it to the Bryn and offered it to Mr Powell for sale for 2s 6d or three shillings. That Mr Powell offered him 2s for the bucket and told examinant that he should have the bucket again upon having the 2s returned to him and the examinant left the bucket with Mr Powell upon those terms. The mark of John Williams.

Walter Davies of Newtown, ostler, says that about a month ago after the last Newtown Cavalry meeting he lost a bucket his property out of his master's stable at the Elephant in Newtown. That the bucket now produced is his property. That on Tuesday morning last he was informed that a bucket similar to deponent's had been sold by the prisoner to Mr Powell of the Bryn. That yesterday evening examinant went to Mr Powell's house and found the bucket in question in Mr Powell's stable and which was delivered to him by Mr Powell's servants. The mark of Walter Davies.

Richard Pugh of Newtown, cooper, says that the bucket now produced is of his master and believes it to be the one he sold to Walter Davies on the day before the Cavalry met for 4s 6d. Richard Pugh*.

Report-visiting justices, gaol. [1833T13]

At a meeting of the committee at the gal on 4 July 1833. Present: Charles Thomas Jones, Panton Corbett, William Morris. Having made enquiry into the effect of an arrangement made on 6 June last directing that the sum of 2s 6d per week be allowed to each prisoner in lieu of diet the find upon enquiry from the prisoners as also from the gaoler that the system is advantageous and that the prisoners are well satisfied with it. The justices also recommended that the female prisoners from the old house of correction be removed into one of the courts and wards of the new gaol according to the suggestion contained in their report to the last Q.S. The justices recommend in consequence of this arrangement that Mrs Lloyd be appointed matron to the female prison.

In consequence of the increased duties of the gaoler it is the opinion of the visiting justices that the present salary is inadequate. They therefor recommend that the salary of the gaoler and matron shall be ± 100 per annum to commence from the last Q.S. The visiting justices recommend that a salary of thirty guineas per annum be paid to the turnkey from the last January Q.S. including his allowance for board and coal. **Order**. Decisions confirmed. [1833T/SO/6/11]

Report-gaol site. [1833T14]

The report of the committee appointed by order of the last Q.S. for the purpose of considering of the best means by which the site of the intended new gaol and house of correction may be conveyed by the Viscount Clive to trustees for the use of the county. The value of such site to be ascertained by the county surveyor all in such other manner as the said committee may think most expedient and for the further purpose of examining into the nature of the leases granted by the late Earl of Powis to the county of the sites of the present gaol and house of correction stated himself to be tenant for life only; he could not convey unless the act of 4 George Iv, c. 64 gave him that power. Your committee have therefore looked into the act and find by section 56 that "it shall and may be lawful for the guardians and trustees etc of infants and for all other persons seized possessed of or interested in any houses, buildings and which shall be deemed necessary for the purpose of the said act to contract for and to sell convey and assure such houses and lands etc to such persons as shall be named by the justices at general or Q.S. in trust and for the purpose of erecting new prisons or of enlarging old ones etc".

Your committee also find by the will of the late Earl of Powys and a conveyance subsequently made by the trustees under that will that the present Lord Clive is seized of the said premises as tenant for life without impeachment of waste with the remainder to trustees in the usual manner to preserve contingent remainders with the remainder to the first and other sons in tail; and therefore his Lordship in his own right and as the natural guardian of his sons (of whom there were several now in esse) has an unquestionable power to sell and convey "provided the premises be deemed necessary for the purposes of the act". But the compulsory clause (section 58) is confined to houses or lands contiguous to any gaol or house of correction which shall be deemed necessary for the purpose of enlarging or rendering more commodious such gaol or house or

correction and does not apply to this case, and therefore it is wholly optional in his Lordship to contract and convey the new proposed site or to refuse so to do. His Lordship however has not only repeated his readiness to contract and convey the new site but also to purchase the materials of the present gaol and house of correction, and has communicated to your committee certain terms in writing to that effect as herein after mentioned.

That in further compliance with the above order the committee has proceeded to examine into the nature of the leases therein mentioned and having obtained copies thereof from the clerk of the peace they find that the lease of the house of correction bears date 1 January 1783 and was made by and between the late Earl of Powys of the one part and Humphrey Jones, esq., late clerk of the peace, of the other part whereby his Lordship for a nominal rent demised the premises therein mentioned to the said H. Jones his executors etc for a term of 99 years to be used as a house of correction. The lessee to keep the same in repair and not to assign and in any case the rent (6d per annum) was in arrears or in case of assignment or of the premises ceasing to be used as a house of correction the lease was to be void. The lessee at liberty to re-enter etc. That the lease of the gaol bearing date 1 January 1785 and is for a term of 999 years at a nominal rent but in all other respects the same with the first mentioned lease, mutatis mutandis.

The terms proposed by Lord Clive as above-mentioned are signed on his behalf by Mr Salt his solicitor and your committee have annexed the same hereto meaning them to be taken as part of their report. That the power of contracting on the part of the county be invested in the magistrates at their Q.S. your committee did not feel themselves competent to enter into any contract with his Lordship. Your committee however trusts that it will not be deemed improper in them to report from the county surveyor that the space of ground necessary for the site of the intended new buildings consists of three acres, two roods and 30 perches or thereabouts and that in his judgement the sum of £331 17s 6d will under all circumstances be a fair price for the same to be paid by the county and accepted by Lord Clive. All the above matters your committee beg to submit to the consideration of the magistrates at the ensuing Q.S.

25 July 1833. Examinations of Edward Swift of the town of Llanfyllin, glazier; Margaret wife of Richard Edwards, labourer; Jane Evans, single woman; John Humphreys and Richard Edwards, labourers, all of the town of Llanfyllin, taken before David Hughes.

Edward Swift says that he was returning home from Llanrhaeadr Fair about 11 o'clock last night. He was coming along the turnpike road from Glantanat towards Rhosybrithdir and on the most steep part of that road he passed two men with short jackets and two women, one with a white bonnet, the other with a black one, apparently returning from the said fair one of the men had a bundle on the point of a stick on his shoulder and examinant said in Welsh as he passed 'Good Night', and he then walked on about 100 yards when the ... together him and one of the two men struck defendant on the back of his neck, deponent verily believes with a stick until he fell on his hands, that the four then rushed at him and endeavoured to ruffle his pockets with apparently an intent of robbing him. That deponent held his hands in his pockets to prevent his being robbed and cried murder three times when the robbers ran away. Deponent then returned back to see if he could find anybody returning from the fair to protect him, as his life was in great danger. That Margaret Edwards very soon met him and Jane Evans, the said John Humphreys and Richard Edwards then came up together and deponent then returned with them and informed the other witnesses how he had been attacked by the prisoners, and deponent and the last mentioned witnesses came together some distance this side Abernaint and they all sat down as deponent was then rather fatigued from the scuffle he previously had with the prisoners; and asked his companions to sit down to rest themselves on the side of the road, he being much tired at the time, and in the course of 10 minutes the two men and two women that had previously attacked him, deponent, came and passed him and they went towards Llanfyllin. Deponent followed them at a distance and when he came to Llanfyllin he called for the peace officer to lodge them in the lock-up which they did. That he counted his pocket soon after he came out of Llanrhaeadr and found his money in his pocket, and he also counted what money he had in his pockets immediately after the scuffle he had with the robbers and found he was then short of 5s. And deponent also says that he verily believes that some of the prisoners took his money. And deponent further says that he is certain that the prisoners were the persons who attacked him on the road at the time and place above stated. The mark of Edward Swift.

Margaret Edwards says that on her return home from Llanrhaeadr fair about 11 o'clock at night on Wednesday last as she and others were coming over Glantanat bridge, she heard someone crying out murder three times. Deponent then answered also three times and walked up the road towards Rhosybrithdir ... she could and nearly opposite David Roberts's house ... Edward Swift on the turnpike road standing ... was searching his pockets, and the said Edward Swift then immediately exclaimed "thank God that somebody came to my assistance" and informed deponent that four persons, two men and two women had attacked him on the old and knocked him down and run away and enquired with her this deponent if she had met them, who in answer said she had not. That the said Edward Swift appeared much alarmed, had his waistcoat open and one his xmacers? in his hand. That she and the other witnesses accompanied the said Edward Swift to the part of the road near Abernaint when Swift asked her and the rest of the company to sit down on the side of the roadd, as he informed her that he was much fatigued, and in about 10 minutes afterwards two men and two women came by and the said Edward Swift then claimed those were the people that have robbed me as he said he knew the two men by their short jackets and said they were the same persons as had previously attacked him on the road. The mark of Margaret Edwards.

Jane Evans says that she was in company with the last witness and others, was returning home from Llanrhaeadr fair on Wednesday night last about 11 o'clock at night as she was coming over Glantanat rage she heard a man in the direction of Rhosybrithdir crying out murder three times and the last witness ran forward and examinant then followed her up the road until they met Edward Swift at the part of the road above mentioned, that examinant asked Edward Swift was it him as shouted out murder. That he answered it was and informed her of his having been attacked by four robbers at the time he cried out. She then accompanied him and the other witnesses to the part of the road above mentioned by the other witnesses where they rested together about 10 minutes. And four persons then came by and Edward Swift then said those other persons that attacked me on the road, he could swear to their dress. And examinant also says she can swear that the prisoners are the persons she saw on the road. The mark of Jane Evans.

John Humphreys corroborates the evidence of the last witnesses, heard a man crying out murder three times on the night in question saw four persons passing on the road near Abernaint and can swear that the prisoners are the persons as passed them on the road.

Richard Edwards also says that he was returning home from Llanrhaeadr fair on Wednesday night last past about 11 o'clock of the night when coming over Glantanat bridge he heard a voice of a man crying out murder twice, and he then replied in the strongest voice you could, hai, or words to these effects and walked up the road until he and the other witnesses met Edward Swift on the turnpike road standing and appeared quite alarmed, with his waistcoat open, was then speaking Welsh to the other witnesses and afterwards Edward Swift told examinant that he had been struck down by a man on the road and immediately afterwards he said that another man and two women joined the first to pick his pockets. Witness sat upon the side of the road with the other witnesses near Abernaint is sure that the four persons that passed them are the prisoners. The mark of Richard Edwards.

Examination of William Bowen, labourer to Edward Williams of Maerdu taken before John J. Turner, who says that as he was coming to his work this morning between five and six o'clock being 16 August 1833 he saw the prisoner John Williams bringing a parcel and throwing it into their hedge and then he met him in a lane, after which he went to see what was in the hedge. They, the deponent and John Pugh walked after, when the prisoner after looking back at them run away they ran after him to Mr Moses Evans's where he, deponent, received information having for a few minutes plus sites of the prisoner, from one of Mr Evans's servants

where he was ... He went up to him and took him to his master's house. The mark of William Bowen, who swears to the truth of the aforesaid.

Sarah Hughes of Maerdu, servant to Edward Williams says that William Bowen came to her this 16 August 1833 and asked her if certain shirts he brought with him were her masters. She answered they were and the said deponent swears they are her masters, and that she had seen the shirts on their hedge half an hour before they were brought to her by William Bowen. The mark of Sarah Hughes.

Watkin Jones of Maerdu says that he was asked by Mr Williams if he would come to his house to see if the knew the prisoner who after looking at them answered he did not know him and asked him if he was the person who had broken open his boats, he then cried bitterly and said he did not break open the boats but that he had taken the masters shirts and this confession was made without any hope of promise being made through the prisoner. As soon as they came out of the stable I saw that the mare was lame in the off fore leg and appeared stiff but I did not further examine what was the matter and drove them into a meadow near the house. I fetched the mare and horse from the meadow about five o'clock in the evening and then found the mare very lame and as soon as I got home I examined the mare and found that she had been stabbed and wounded in the shoulder with a ... and two holes made by the prisoner being very plainly seen. The mare has not recovered and never will and the ... father suspected that the mare to have been wounded by some one of the family of John Evans of Ffridd ... father and Mr Evans have been at variance and in law about trespass. I have heard and believe that Elizabeth Pugh, a neighbour of Mr Evans's's saw the said John Evans stab the mare in or near his fold on the morning of 22 November last and that the said Elizabeth Pugh informed examinant's father that she saw him do it. James Higgins*.

3 August 1833. Examination of Elizabeth Pugh of Lower Gilfach in Ffridd, taken before J. B. Williames and Thomas William Thomas.

Says I was going to Betty Parry's to work one morning about a month before last Christmas but I cannot say what day of the month it was but I heard the next day that one of Mr Higgins's horses had been wounded the day just after I was going. About eight o'clock in the morning between seven and eight I was on the turnpike road near the house of John Evans of Ffridd. There is a gate out of Mr Evans's fold yard into his close behind his house and which close adjoins the turnpike road and I was standing still on the road and saw Oliver Evans, one of Mr Evans's sons, driving two horses out of the fold towards the gate that goes into the close. The one was a bay one and the other a black one and ... which adjoins the house was open. Mr Evans was in the gateway ... next the house and the two horses were going through the gateway at the same time, the bay one on the side next Mr Evans and as the horses passed Mr Evans I saw Mr Evans strike the bay horse with something which made it jump and then I saw that it was a long pikel he struck the horse with. The pikel was pushed straight at the horse and not as a blow but I do not know what part of the horse the pikel struck and I was about 50 yards from the horses at the time. Mr Evans went back from the gate into the fold and the horses came trotting up the close and through a rails place into the road just as I passed the place and the horses went down the road towards Berriew and I went up the road towards the castle and saw nothing more of them or Mr Evans. I did not mention what I saw (although I heard that the horse of Mr Higgins had been hurt for about three months). I saw Mr Evans strike with the pikel and I then only said that I knew who had done it. She has been intimate with Mr Evans son' John and had a child by him about four years ago and she has been at variance with the son about half a year and quarrelled with him on the road about three months ago and then asked him who stabbed Mr Higgins's mare and she supposes Mr Higgins heard of what she said and asked her about it and she informed him what she had seen. The mark of Elizabeth Pugh.

3 August 1833. Examination of Elizabeth Pryce of Ffridd, taken before J. B. Williames and Thomas William Thomas. Says I went to live with Mr John Evans of Ffridd as a servant in the latter end of last harvest and was there 10 weeks and two or three days before I left him. I left Mr Evans service without any quarrel upon Mr Evans asking me if I would ... and I was paid my wages. The day I left Mr Higgins asked me if I yet seen any strange horses and I told him there had been some in the Ffridd fold all night. The mark of Elizabeth Pryce.

That examinant got up and inspected the house when she discovered that a pair of half boots the property of examinant and which she had placed under her bed the night before as well as several articles of wearing apparel belonging to examinant's sisters had been stolen. That examinant then went in search of the prisoner and not finding her in Llanfyllin she came the same day to Welshpool but she could not get any intelligence of her. That she then gave information of the robbery to William Morris one of the constables of Welshpool and described to him the prisoner and the articles stolen and that the half boots now produced by William Morris are the property of examinant and are those which were stolen from her father's house as aforesaid. Rose Oliver*.

7 October 1833. Examination of Mary Oliver of the town of Llanfyllin, spinster, taken before Thomas Beck and Thomas Davies. Says that on Tuesday night last examinant was engaged ironing some clothes when Elizabeth Rowlands (the prisoner) came to her father's house, and before examinant retired to bed she put part of the clothes which she had ironed in a basket which she placed upon the chest of drawers in the kitchen and the remainder of the clothes she put upon the shelves. But when examinant arose in the morning she found that the prisoner had decamped and also that a cap apron and a cotton gown the property of examinant and also bonnets belonging to her sister Sarah Oliver, a neck handkerchief belonging to examinant's brother John and a pocket handkerchief belonging to her father as well as the half boots stated in the last witnesses examination had been stolen. And that the articles now produced by William Morris namely a cap apron and cotton gown are the property of examinant and also the neck handkerchief pocket handkerchief and bonnet now also produced are the property of examinant's father, brother and sister as above stated. The mark of Mary Oliver.

Says that he was working for Job Bray about six weeks since making a new cart. That Job Bray told him to go up to Mr Turner's building where Maurice Evans was working and bring from there a piece of timber for the cross tree. But he went up to the building which was about a quarter of a mile distant. That he then looked about for a piece that would do but found none without cutting which was 3 by 2 ³/₄. He cut the spar and took a piece away 4 foot 3 long which was a sound good new piece of timber and which he worked as a cross tree in the new cart for Job Bray . That all the body of the cart was made of seasoned new stuff except one middle piece which was only about half dry and are not so fresh from the saw as which came from Mr Turner's building. That he enquired of Job Bray if he had seen any of the timber that had been missed. Job Bray said that he had one piece from the hill and that Maurice Evans knew of it. Richard Williams*.

30 August 1833. Examination of Maurice Evans, mason, taken before T.B.. Browne and William Pugh. Says that he saw the wheelwright George Shoot take one piece of oak 4 ft 3 long by 3 by 3 from a new cottage belonging to Mr Turner which this deponent is building. That the said piece of timber so taken was a new piece. This took place in the daytime before dinner. That's George Shoot said when he took the piece of timber that he was taking it for Job Bray's cart. But when questioned by Richard Williams the carpenter he told him that he had seen the timber taken by George Shoot the mark of Maurice Evans.

5 August 1833. Examination of Richard Owen of the town of Llanidloes, servant, taken before George Meares. Says that he is the servant of Mrs Mary Clayton of Llanidloes and he as such dyed two large hanks of the yarn belonging to her to make flannel. That he tied the hanks up in his usual way and left them in the water in his mistress's yard on Saturday last. That hearing that one of the hanks had been stolen he, with David Jones the constable, searched the house of the prisoner, Edward Mills, this morning and found in his bedroom concealed between a box and a bedstead one of the hanks above-mentioned in a wet state. The prisoner was not in the bedroom when the yarn was found there, but was downstairs. That she saw the two hanks there between 8 to 9 o'clock that night. That between 10 and 11 she was going to the pump and found one of the hanks of yarn in a basket near the brewhouse door, but did not see the other hank which she supposed to have been removed by Richard Owen, the dyer. She asked him about it on the following morning when he said he had not removed it and begged her to say nothing to his mistress about the loss till morning, when he would get a search warrant. 10 September 1833. Examination of Daniel Matthews of Glanhafren, pa. Newtown, gent, taken before Richard Griffiths and Edward Pugh. That when examinant got up he was informed by one of his servants that an old copper furnace which was placed by the brewhouse door for the purpose of holding wash had been stolen. 10 September 1833. Examination of William Powell of the town of Welshpool, ironmonger, taken before Richard Griffiths and Edward Pugh. Says that yesterday morning when he was at breakfast his shopman came to examinant and asked him if he would buy some old copper and what he would give for it. That examinant's brother said that he did not care much about it, and added that he must see it before he could offer anything for it. That's about 12 o'clock the prisoner William Hollins came to examinant's shop with a bag upon his shoulder and said that he had brought the copper and asked what he would give for it. That examinant, suspecting that there was something not right in the transaction he said that he would have nothing to do with it upon which the prisoner again asked him what he would give for it to which examinant replied that it depended upon the quality and the prisoner then walked off.

Edward Lloyd of the same, earthenware man, says that the prisoner Francis Morris came to examinant at the Crown Inn in Welshpool and asked him to step out. That examinant did so and Morris then asked examinant whether he purchased any old stuff. That examinant replied that he did sometimes. That old stuff in the trade means any kind of old metal. That examinant asked Morris what was the metal he had and he replied it was copper. Examinant then said "Where is it", "let me see it", Morris answered "I have its just by and will take it up to your house". Examinant said "no, do not take it there as I must see it here as I shall be with my standing for some hours". "Let me see it here". Morris still said he would take it to examinant's house. Examinant then said I will not have it at all and Morris afterwards left him. The mark of Edward Lloyd.

Examination-theft. [1833M55]

10 September 1833. Examination of Margaret wife of William Owen of the town of Welshpool, taken before Richard Griffiths and Edward Pugh. Says that on Saturday evening last the prisoner William Hollins came to husband's house and asked him in the presence and hearing of examinant if he was accustomed to buy old metal, who said that he did. But the prisoner then ask him what a pound would he give who answered 5d. That the prisoner had not the metal with him but said that he had about a hundredweight and that he would bring it on Monday morning. That the prisoner then went away and yesterday morning he came again to her husband's house accompanied by the prisoner John Glynne each of them having a bag containing some of the metal. That examinant together with her husband and the prisoners Hollins and Glynne went into the warehouse for the purpose of weighing the copper, but when examinant's husband had seen it (it being cut up into pieces) he immediately informed the prisoners that he would have nothing to do with it as he thought they had not come by it honestly. That Hollins said "Oh yes we had it honest enough and don't care who sees it". That examinant husband asked Hollins where they had it who said they had bought it at Westbury. That examinant said husband then observed that if they had bought it at Westbury it was a wonder as they did not take it to Shrewsbury to sell as that place was much nearer Westbury than Welshpool, in reply to which Hollins said that examinant's husband gave as much for it as they could get in Shrewsbury. That examinant's husband again said that he would have nothing to do with the copper upon which Hollins said that if he would buy it they would trust him a fortnight or three weeks for the money but examinant's husband still refused and the prisoners then took the copper away all which conversation between examiners husband and the prisoner Hollins passed in the hearing of this examinant. The mark of Margaret Owen.

That she asked who was there and was answered by the prisoner John Lloyd was said "it is Jack Lloyd", he having gained an entrance into the house (she believes) by slightly pushing against the door, the lock being rather out of repair. That the prisoner asked examinant if he should leave a bundle there. That she having given him permission the prisoner said that he would not leave it downstairs. That examinant then told him to bring it up into the bedroom and put it on the floor which he accordingly did and then went out saying that he would come for it in the morning. That witness got up about five o'clock this morning and proceeded to examine the bundle which she found to contain three ducks, one having its head cut off and the other two appeared to have been necked, all of which seem to have been recently killed. That examinant tied up the bundle and informed her husband who was then in bed of its contents were desired examinant to go immediately in search of the prisoner and desire him to take the bundle from there. That's about seven o'clock this morning Samuel Davies of Welshpool, one of the sergeants-at-mace, came to her husband's house and asked examinant if the bundle had not been left there by Jack Lloyd the barber. That examinant answered from upstairs that there had been a bundle left there by the prisoner and she came downstairs and handed it over to Davies. The mark of Hannah Pugh.

Examination-theft. [1833M64]

30 August 1833. Examination of Ann Jones servant to Mrs Whitehall of the Oak in Welshpool, taken before Richard Griffiths. Says that the three ducks now produced by Samuel Davies she verily believes to be the property of her mistress the said Sarah Whitehall but she cannot positively identify them, and with witness says that there are three ducks of the same colour as those now produced missing this morning from the Oak yard and that the ducks now produced are very like them, and witness believes them to be the ducks missing and to be the property of Mrs Whitehall but will not swear positively as the ducks. The mark of Ann Jones.

Examination-theft. [1833M65]

28 August 1833. Examination of Jane wife of Richard Davies of Moel-y-garth [Guilsfield], labourer, taken before Richard Griffiths. Says that she went up from home on Friday morning last about seven o'clock and that she locked the door and put the key into her pocket and at about seven o'clock in the evening she returned and having gone into the house she discovered that a pane of glass had been broken in the window and that the casement had been opened. Says that on Sunday last the last witness came to examinant and informed him of the robbery and described the person who was suspected of having committed the felony and that examinant then recollected that he had seen such a person about breakfast time that morning at a public house very drunk and who had a bundle. That examinant went in company with Davies the prosecutor and found him laying in a garden about a mile from the public house where he had seen him. That examinant went to Collings who handed over to examinant the shirt and the cotton shawl, waistcoat and a piece printed cotton now produced and said that he had bought them off the prisoner and that he had given him 3s 9d for them. John Smith Pate*.

30 August 1833. Examination and complaint of Richard Davies of Moel-y-garth [Guislfield], labourer, taken before Richard Griffiths. Says that when he returned from his work on Friday evening last he was informed by his wife the last witness that his house had been broken into and that several articles had been stolen thereout. He immediately went into his bedroom to a breeches which was hanging on the bed post in the pocket of which he had put it a sovereign on last Wednesday morning but he found that the sovereign had been stolen. That upon the following morning (Saturday) he made some enquiry in the neighbourhood and he was informed by two persons that they had seen a man of suspicious appearance by his house on Friday morning about 10 or 11 o'clock and the also informed examinant that that person had been about the neighbourhood with a brief. The committee of magistrates are pointed at the last Q.S. for the purpose of drawing up such order rules and regulations and elections as they should think most advisable for the more effectually carrying the provisions of Act 3 and 4 William IV c. 40 relating to the removal of Scotch and Irish paupers into execution in pursuance of section 4 of the said act having presented to this court their report wherein after stating that in taking into consideration the matters referred to them as aforesaid they have made enquiry respecting the arrangements adopted in regard to such matters in other counties and found that in the county of Chester an arrangement has been made with Mr George Forwood, assistant overseer of the poor of pa. Liverpool for

receiving the Scotch and Irish paupers arising within that county and passing them from the port of Liverpool to Scotland and Ireland. That they have ascertained that Mr Forwood will receive and pass the Scotch and Irish paupers of the county of Montgomery upon the same terms as he does for the county of Chester (a printed circular form the said George Forwood containing such terms and several other suggestions relating to the removal of such paupers being annexed to their report) the committee recommend the adoption of similar arrangements. And the said committee having also presented to this court copies of the forms of examination, orders, directions and other rules and regulations adopted in the county of Chester with relation to such removals they recommend that similar forms and regulations be adopted in this county, and they also suggest to the court the expediency of appointing a person at Welshpool to receive all Irish and Scotch paupers to be removed from the several parishes in this county and convey them to Mr Forwood. It is ordered that the said report and recommendations and suggestions be approved of and adopted and that copies of this order and of the circular forms of examinations be transmitted to the clerk of the peace and to the several magistrates clerks.

Order. Report confirmed. That Samuel Davies be appointed to receive at Welshpool the Irish and Scotch paupers of the several parishes and townships and convey them to Liverpool. Copies of this order and of the forms, examinations orders and direction etc be transmitted by the clerk of the peace to all magistrates. [1834H/SO/6/86]

Report-coroners fees. [1834H5]

1 January 1834. The report of the committee of magistrates appointed to take the bills of the coroner into consideration and to investigate the various charges therein made, and for reporting thereon. Your committee having met under the annexed order and considered various documents laid before them, find that at the Hilary Q.S. 1829 the court took into its consideration the charges made by the coroner for holding inquisitions and journeys to hold the same, and ordered that the coroners be paid in future for such inquisitions and journeys such sums as are directed by the several acts of parliament to be paid and no more. It was at the same time ordered that in case a medical examination of a body be deemed necessary at an inquest the coroner (excepting in a case of immediate emergency) should call in another medical man to make such examination; in this order no provision is made for payment of such medical man. At the July Q.S. 1830 it appears by an order of the court that the committee of accounts presented to the court a charge of £56 14s made by the coroner Dr Johnes for examining dead bodies, exclusive of his own charge for holding inquisitions and travelling; the court declared its opinion that such charges could not by law be allowed. And being also of opinion that the sum of one guinea is sufficient remuneration. It is not stated by whom or out of what fund the sum is to be paid.

At the April Q.S. 1832 it appears from an order of the court that the county treasurer had called the attention of the auditing committee to a demand of Dr Johnes upon the County and also to a communication received by the treasurer from him expressing a desire that there should be a re-examination of a bill of his in which a sum had been disallowed by the auditing committee, the court requested that the coroner Dr Johnes should state his objections to the clerk the peace who was ordered, in the event of any error prejudicial to the coroner being found, to communicate the same to the auditing committee at the next Q.S. for their consideration. And it was further ordered that the clerk of the peace examine and report upon the authority upon which magistrates are empowered to order payment to surgeons for attending inquests when summoned by the coroner. The clerk of the peace has stated to your committee that a copy of this order was sent to Dr Johnes, but that no communication was received by him from Dr Johnes. And that he examined and reported to the auditing committee that he could find no authority empowering magistrates to order payment to the surgeons for attending inquests when summoned by the coroner.

Your committee have proceeded themselves to examine the law regulating the office of coroner; they find that anciently the coroner had no fees. But by the 3Henry VII c.1 he was to have 13s 4d upon every inquisition taken upon the view of a body slain, to be levied upon the goods and chattels of the slayer, if he have any, and if not, he shall have for his said fee the out of such amerciaments as any township should be amerced, for the escape of such murderers. By the 25 George II c. 29 s. 1 for every inquisition taken upon view of a body (not dying in gaol) taken in any township or place contributing to the county rate, the coroner shall have 20s and also 9d for every mile he shall be compelled to travel from his usual place of abode to take such inquisition, to be paid by order of the justices in Q.S. out of the county rates without fee for the order; and for every inquisition taken in gaol he shall be paid in like manner so much not exceeding 20s as the Q.S. shall allow, but for an inquisition on a body slain he is to have 13s 4d. By the fourth section of 25 George II, c. 29 it is provided that any coroner taking for his office doing, other than the fees allowed by this act and that of 3 Henry VII shall be guilty of extortion and by the sixth section for such extortion shall be removed from his office. It does not appear that any allowance can be made for the attendance of witnesses of any description but it would seem the coroner, as an incident to his office, has authority, and it is his duty, to issue a summons to compel the appearance of witnesses and to commit them for their contempt. Should they refuse to appear or having appeared, to give evidence on the enquiry. It appears also by a decision of the court of King's Bench in a case King v. The justices of Oxfordshire that the 9d a mile should be allowed only for every mile he is compelled to travel from his abode to take the inquisition and not also for the miles he travels back to his place of abode.

Your committee have next proceeded to consider the bills laid before them; they find that the first accounts of Dr Johnes comprises the period from February 1829 to July 1830. This account appears to have been audited by the audit committee at the July Q.S. 1830 and is the account referred to for the examination in the order of court in 1832. That of the account so audited the committee directed payment only of £63 4s 11d leaving without any direction on their part the charge of £56 14s for examining 27 dead bodies. It appears to your committee by the order of July 1830 above noticed that the attention of the court was called to the discharge and that thereupon the order was made directing the allowance of one guinea for each examination. In conformity with this direction £28 7s seems to have been paid by the county treasurer instead of £56 14s for examining the 27 bodies in addition to the £63 4s 11d making in the whole £91 11s 11d for which amount Dr Johnes has given a receipt dated 23 August 1830 stating that such sum had been received from

the treasurer as ("being such part of the annexed account as has been allowed by the magistrates"). Your committee do not conceive themselves competent to interfere with this account, it having been regularly allowed by the auditing committee and reported to and settled and adopted by the court; upon general principles they further object to an account once audited and approved by the court being reopened unless to correct undoubted errors. The next account commences in July 1830 and terminates on 26 June 1833. To this account amounting to £14719s 6d is annexed one charge of two guineas for examining the body and another charge of two guineas for attending an inquest on a body by summons from the coroner of the borough of Montgomery. And also an arrear of old account £28 7s being the half of the £56 14s above-mentioned which was not allowed by the court.

It is the opinion of your committee that notwithstanding the order of court in July 1830 directing the allowance of one guinea for the examination of a body that such allowance being unauthorised by law ought not be made. It is also their opinion that Dr Johnes's claim, cannot be allowed for his attendance as a witness on an inquest in the borough of Montgomery and therefore that the charge of two guineas made for attending such inquest should be deducted. With respect to the charge of $\pounds 28$ 7s your committee consider this to be a matter settled and not now to be interfered with in therefore that it should not be allowed. The last Bill made before your committee commences in August 1833 and ends 5 December 1833; it includes the bill of £147 19s 6d and also the three charges before mentioned and mounting together to £32 11s which your committee as before stated think ought not to be allowed and two further charges of two guineas each for examining two bodies the bill amounting in the whole to ± 197 12s 6d. Your committee are of opinion for the reasons before stated that the above some of £32 11s and the two last mentioned charges amounted together to the sum of £36 15s should be deducted out of the total amount of £197 12 6d and that the sum of £160 17s 6d only should be paid to the coroner Dr Johnes in discharge of his bill which with these exceptions your committee find correct. Your committee begged to submit the expediency of causing it in future to be distinctly understood that the justices in Q.S. will allow no other than the charges allowed by the act of Parliament regulating the fees and charges of coroners, viz. £1 for each inquest and 9d a mile from the coroner's place of abode to the police where the inquest is held. Report-bridge. [1834H6]

At a meeting of the committee held at Machynlleth on 25 October 1833. John Edwards, George Meares, Thomas Lewis Hughes, John Hughes, Isaac Bonsall, The committee appointed at the last O.S. to examine evidence in order to ascertain what parish, district, hundred or township or place is liable to the repairs of Gelligoch bridge near Machynlleth having examined the evidence of Robert Evans, Isaac Jones, Evan Oliver, Robert Peters, and John Watkin hereunto annexed are of opinion and do report that the inhabitants of the county are liable to the repairs of the said bridge and the 100 yards of road at each end thereof. Robert Evans of Derwenlas says that he is in his 84th year, was born at Aberystwyth and lived at Hirol from the time he was two years of age till he was between twelve and thirteen years of age. Hirol is two miles and a half from Gelligoch bridge. He then went out to service for a year to Brwynog about five miles from the bridge. He then returned to Hirol for two years and a half or three years or more. He then went to Garthgynnin about a mile from the bridge and remained a year and a half. He then returned to Hirol for a year and afterward went to Maeskillen within two miles of the bridge for a year. He was then bound apprentice in pa. Penegoes to a carpenter and was there one year. He then went to Machynlleth and remained here three years within a month. He then went to Bryn Melyn within a mile and a half of the bridge and remained there two years. He then went to a house on Gwrthgynnin farm called Bryn Ellwyd about half a mile from the bridge and remained there three years. He then went to Derwenlas and has lived there ever since. When he first recollects the road from Derwenlas to Machynlleth there was not any bridge at Gelligoch. He fully recollects the situation from the time he was nine or ten years old and was in the habit of going that way when he was a boy. He recollects the turnpike road being first made. A bridge was then built as the road was going on which has been since widened. The bridge as originally built was a carriage bridge and teams passed over it. There was not at any time previous to building the bridge either a footbridge or a horse bridge and the foot passengers passed by stepping stones at that time there was only one cart in the neighbourhood. He does not know who built the first bridge nor by whom it was built. He was about fifteen years of age when the bridge was first built. He recollects the bridge being widened but cannot fix the time. He has no recollection of any repairs but at the time that Robert Peters widened. The bridge now there is the bridge which was originally and widened by Robert Peters. The initials of Robert Evans.

Isaac Jones says that he is in his 83rd year, was born at Barmouth. His father was a chip carpenter. Remembers his father contracting for building a vessel at Derwenlas; he was then from twelve to fourteen years of age. He was at Derwenlas backwards and forwards with his father during the time the vessel was building about half a mile from the bridge. There was not at that time any description of bridge at Gelligoch. The present bridge was not then made. He remembers many years before a bridge was built, but he remembers the present bridge being built. That present bridge was built before he was married and he has been married sixty years. He had not anything to do with building nor does he know who built it or paid for it. Previous to the bridge being built persons passed over by stepping stones from one stone to another and he did it often himself as well as a great many more. Isaac Jones.

Evan Oliver says that he lives at Dolgarnedd near Llyfnant Mill in Isygarreeg township. He is sixty years old. He was employed thirty-six years ago to work on the turnpike road from Machynlleth to Derwenlas and was constantly employed on the road for five years. He has occasionally taken jobs on that road since. The trustees repaired the 100 yards at each end of Gelligoch bridge in the same way as the other part of the road. He remembers taking a job to cut a portion of rock within 50 yards of the bridge at the end next Machynlleth. The rock cut away was taken over the bridge to raise the road at the other end a yard and a half as also on the bridge. He had £3 per rood and the distance cut was less than 20 yards and he was paid by the treasurer of the turnpike road. Mr Hugh Davies and Mr David Williams as trustees set him the job. He remembers Rees and John Watkin building a wall on the end of the bridge next to Machynlleth. He assisted as a labourer to get out and fill the materials. He was paid by the treasurer of the turnpike road. He was never employed either by the township or the parish to do any work on this bridge. He has never seen the bridge repaired but he has known it to require repair some of the stones of the parapets were thrown down. The mark of Evan Oliver.

Robert Peters says he is 70 years old and upwards. He is a stone mason remembers being employed to widen Gelligoch bridge about forty years ago. David Williams of Gelligoch employed him; he believes he was a commissioner of the turnpike road. Mr Hughes of Penegoes overlooked the work occasionally. He used to pay for work done on the turnpike road. David Williams paid him for widening the bridge. He does not know of any repair being done to the bridge except then nor does he think there was any overseer for it. Robert Peters.

John Watkin of Machynlleth, stone mason, says that he is 60 years of age. He recollects making a wall to support the road at the end of Gelligoch bridge within about ten yards of the bridge. He was employed by Mr Humphreys the surveyor of the turnpike road and paid by Mr Hughes the treasurer. This was from 30 to 35 years ago. John Watkin.

Order. Read, filed and confirmed. [1834H/SO/6/78]

Certificate of conviction-assault. [1834H7]

1 November 1833. John Jones is convicted before us, Sir Baldwin Leighton and John Turner, J.P.s, for that he n 25 October last violently assault and beat by throwing stones at William Jones of Rhandregynwen at Domgae. We adjudge he forfeits 10s and also 9s 6d costs to be paid immediately. Both the sums to be paid to Edward Edwards of pa. Llandysilio.

Order. Read and filed. [1834H/SO/6/70]

Examination-theft. [1834H8]

18 February 1834. The deposition of Thomas Edwards. Says that he is constable of Manafon-Ilan. That on Sunday night last about seven o'clock he was sent for by William Titley and John Evans to go to Betws to take into his custody a person detained there on suspicion of breaking Jane Davies's house. He accordingly went and on the road joined Jane Davies, John Parry and Mr Cowdal's servant maid and they proceeded to Betws. When they arrived there the person so detained sat by the constable of Betws at the home of Evan Jones and as soon as the said Mr Cowdal's servant came into the house and saw the man he immediately said that he was the person she had seen upon the road near Jane Davies's house. The said constable of Betws and the said John Parry, Jane Davis and Mr Cowdal's servant went upstairs and remained there sometime, and afterwards called this deponent up and he went into the room where they were and the said John Parry told him to count the money then lying on the table saying that it was given up to him by the prisoner, being part of the money stolen and told him to take charge of the prisoner, the money amounted to £4 19s viz. four sovereigns, 18 shillings and six pence in silver, and six pence in copper. Deponent took charge of the man and went downstairs, and remained with him until yesterday morning, and soon after the said John Parry and Jane Davies had left the house of the said Evan Jones, the prisoner asked deponent to come out of doors. Deponent refused and he then said that having given up the money to that man (John Parry) he would give

the deponent 24 sovereigns by Tuesday night if he would leave him go. Deponent said that if he would give him 150 sovereigns he would not do so and would rather lose his life than leave him go, and in the course of the night and yesterday he told deponent several times how he committed the act of robbing Jane Davies's house, saying that he passed the house on his way from Llanfair to Newtown, about half a mile and something tempted him to return, and he went in through a small window, took five sovereigns out of the box which was unlocked, and opened the back door to come out, which he confessed to deponent voluntarily. Thomas Edwards*. Witness Richard Wothen*.

Examination-theft. [1834H9]

17 February 1834. The examination of Jane Davies taken before J.B. Williames. Says that she is a widow and resides at Dolyrhin and cottage in pa. Manafon. She went to Beulah Chapel in that neighbourhood yesterday and fastened one door of the house with a bolt inside, and went through the other door, and lock the same and took the key in her pocket. She went to chapel at about 2.30 o'clock in the afternoon and returned at about four. When she arrived she immediately saw that the door at the back side of the house which she had left bolted had been reopened. She saw that the window had been broken and the door she supposed had been opened from the inside, the person who entered having done so she suspected through the window. She went to search box kept in the chamber by her bedside which contained five sovereigns secured in a till of the said box and she immediately discovered that they had been taken away. The box was not forced open as she had forgot to take the key out of the lock. She searched further and could not find out that she had missed anything besides. She went out and told her neighbours and enquired if anyone had been seen him about there, and was informed by Ann Evans that she had seen a man in blue or black coat, light waistcoat and drab trousers and light hair come out to the wicket gate at the back of the house into the turnpike road. Several of her neighbours went in pursuit of the person who had been seen about there and followed him as far as Betws where they overtook a person answering the description given at the public house there drinking and gave the prisoner now brought here into custody where he was kept till this morning. When her neighbours returned to her house they told her that they had found a person answering the description given and she immediately sent for John Parry to the chapel to assist them in securing him, and deponent, Mr Parry and Ann Jones (Mr Cowdal's servant) and Thomas Edwards the constable went to Betws to the house of Evan Jones and when the said Ann Jones saw the prisoner she immediately said to them that he was the person she had seen on the turnpike road near Jane Davies's house. The mark of Jane Davies.

Examination-theft. [1834H10]

17 February 1834. The examination of John Parry taken before J.B. Williames. Says that about eight o'clock in the afternoon of vesterday while he was at Beulah Chapel, William Titley came to him and asked him to come out as Jane Davies wanted to see him. Deponent went to her house and she asked him to go along with her to Betws, to assist in apprehending a man detained there on suspicion of breaking her house open on that evening. He accordingly went with the said Jane Davies and others to the house of Evan Jones of Betws aforesaid. When he went in he waited until Mr Cowdal's servant maid arrived when she came immediately went to the prisoner and said that he was the person she had seen near Jane Davies's house upon the road, and the prisoner denied that he had been anywhere there on that day. Deponent asked the constable (who then had the prisoner in custody) whose name is John Swain to bring the prisoner with deponent into a private room. He did so and deponent asked the prisoner from whence he was. He said from Llanfair. He also asked him where he lodged on Saturday night, and was answered with his mother at Llanfair. He asked him were his parents alive. Prisoner said that he had never seen his father but that his mother was alive. Deponent asked him at what time he left Llanfair that day and was told that he left at 1.30 o'clock in the evening. Deponent asked prisoner if he saw any person by Beulah Chapel as passing; he said he did not but that he saw a number of children playing by the sawpit in that neighbourhood. Asked him which road he came and was answered the old road. Deponent said to prisoner that he had better not be stupid; that he had been seen going into the garden of Jane Davies and also coming out from thence into the road and standing opposite the door of the house, and it is plain that he was guilty of breaking her house and that he was sorry for him as deponent was nursing children himself and he would advise him to confess and deliver the money. Prisoner then asked deponent if he knew him. Deponent said he did not. He afterwards told him that his name was Richard Jones. Prisoner then said that he did not know what tempted him to commit such an act and deponent, without asking any further question the way in which he committed the act, that he went along the old road above the quarry and he then turned back and got into a Jane Davies's house and stole and took away £5 in money and said that he had changed one sovereign part thereof to pay for the ale he had drank. He then handed over to deponent four sovereigns, 18 shillings and six pence in silver and six pence in copper

and admitted that that was the remainder of the money stolen. Deponent laid the money down on the table and called Jane Davies and Thomas Edwards, the constable of Manafon and told him to take charge of the prisoner and the money. The said Thomas Edwards wished deponent to take the money which he did and still has possession thereof. Deponent left him in the custody of the said Thomas Edwards. John Parry*.

Examination-theft. [1834H11]

18 February 1834. The examination of Anne Jones taken before J.B. Williames. Says that she is a servant to Mr Cowdal of Dolyrhin in pa, Manafon. That on Sunday last about three o'clock in the afternoon she was taking a walk along the old road from Llanfair to Newtown and about a quarter of a mile from the residence of Jane Davies she met a man whom she particularly noticed. She went a little further on and crossed into the new road and went over the brook. On her way back to her master's house which nearly adjoins that of Jane Davies she met the same man again at about the distance of 100 yards from Jane Davies's house and as she passed by Jane Davies's house she was aware of the window thereof being broken, it was not a glass window. Deponent states that from the first time she met him to the next time she met him in the new road nearly an hour had elapsed. She went home and told Miss Cowdal that Jane Davies's window was broken. About five o'clock on the same evening Jane Davies came in and asked deponent if she had seen anybody at her house as her house had been broken open and deponent said that she met a man on the road about 100 yards distant therefrom. About seven o'clock on the same evening Jane Davies came to deponent again and asked her to go along with her to Betws to see if the person detained at Betws was the same person which she had seen upon the road near her house. Deponent went accordingly with the said Jane Davies to the house of Evan Jones, the sign of the Holly Bush in Betws, and immediately on her entering therein the constable asked her if she could point the person out whom she had so seen on the road and she immediately pointed to the prisoner that he was the person which she was quite positive of, and he denied saying that she had not seen him there that day at all, and deponent further states that the person whom she met on the old road and afterwards on the new road was the same person whom she saw at Betws, and the prisoner in custody. The mark of Anne Jones.

Report-bridge. [1834H12]

3 November 1833. Jane Jones says she is in the 57 year and has resided at Cemaes in the same house during the whole of her life. Remembers the bridge being built at Aberhirierth about 36 or 38 years ago. Is sure it is not less than 36 years since. Before the present bridge was built there was not any bridge there, the passage was through the brook. Believes that Evan James of Mallwyd build the bridge and was one of the men who took the work by contract. She has heard that the work was set at Machynlleth by bidding. Remembers the bridge being also built at Cwmllinau, the present bridge has been built upwards of 40 years. Her brother with Griffith Griffiths was the contractor. They took the work by bidding at Machynlleth. The late Mr Humphrey Jones paid her brother for the work. Before the present bridge was built there there was not any bridge. Her brother and Griffith Griffiths were bound to maintain the bridge for seven years after it was finished and her brother made some repairs before the bond was to be given up. She remembers her brother going to Mr Jones at Machynlleth for the bond after the period was expired. When Mr Jones told him he need not require the bond as the time had gone by and the bridge was in repair and he need not trouble himself further. Jane Jones.

David Humphreys says he is in his 82nd year and has lived the whole of his life in pa. Cemaes, and for the last 79 years at Trepoeth close to Aberhirierth. Remembers the present bridge about 40 years ago, he is sure it must be there about before the present bridge was built and he is sure that there was not any bridge at Aberhirierth. Remembers the turnpike road being first made about 50 years ago. The road at Aberhirierth previous of this time used to pass the brook lower down. There was a pont-pren for foot passengers only. There never was any other description of bridge and has no recollection of that being repaired. The present bridge was built by men from Mallwyd. James Davies, his son, and Evan James worked there. The road was first made by embanking across the nant and this embankment was in a few years carried away by the floods. This bridge was then built and has remained ever since. He never remembers its being injured by any floods but he has himself repaired the parapets in lieu of doing statute labour upon the road and was permitted to do so by the commissioners of the turnpike road. Never has heard of the parish repairing the bridge. Has been overseer of the poor and has served the office of churchwarden for 16 years. I attended the parish vestries generally but all times during the period he was in office he never heard of any charge for the repair of the bridge being paid out of the parish rates, and if it had been so the subject must have come within his knowledge. Remembers the bridge built at Cwmllinau about 45 years ago and is sure it is more than 40. Before the present bridge was built there was not any bridge except a pont-pren for foot passengers near

where the present bridge is built. Remembers the present bridge being repaired about 18 or 20 years ago by Morris Jones of Pengwern but he does not know who paid. Does not believe the parish paid. The sons were employed last year in repairing the bridge. Evan Edwards who works on the turnpike road engage them to work but they have not yet been paid. The mark of David Humphreys.

Having examined the surveys prepared by the county surveyor and having examined the situations of the several roads and approaches to the properties adjacent to the afon Garno bridge and having heard the objections urged by Charles Hanbury Tracey, esq., on account of the serious inconvenience which his tenant at Carnedd would sustain by the removal of Afon Garno bridge to the contemplated site are of opinion that under existing circumstances it will not be practicable to make such a new line of road as will enable the county to substitute one bridge equally convenient to the public in lieu of the two bridges above mentioned and do report accordingly.


Examination-theft. [1834H18]

20 December 1833. Examination of David Davies of Gwerneirin in pa. Llandinam, farmer taken before Richard John Davies. Says that on 20 December last he saw three wether sheep in the slaughter house of Edward Williams of Caersws, butcher. That the said sheep were in the custody of the constable and the same are the property of his mother Ann Davies of Gwerneirin. That he knows the said three sheep by the ear mark being the same as described by Thomas Jones the shepherd and by the raddle mark on the neck. That the pitchmark D has been plucked from the side of each sheep with the exception of one which was slightly visible. That he more particularly knows one of the said sheep on account of the tail having been cut nearly off. The mark of David Davies.

Examinations-theft. [1834H19]

1 February 1834. Examination and complaint of David Pryse of the Packhorse Inn in the town of Welshpool, taken before Thomas Beck and Thomas Davies. Says that he keeps a considerable quantity of fowls and duck and that they roost in a hovel erected at the end of one of his stables which is locked every night and that yesterday morning examinant was informed that his hen roost had been broken open and some of the fowls stolen. That examinant immediately got up and proceeded into the yard to inspect the premises when he discovered that the lock had been forced off the hen roost. That examinant proceeded to number his fowls and found that two ducks and upwards of a dozen fowls had been stolen but he cannot state the precise number. That examinant believes the fowls and ducks now produced by Samuel Davies (or a part of them) to be his property and those which were stolen from his premises as aforesaid but his ostler Richard Lloyd examinant believes to be better enabled to identify them. David Pryse*.

Samuel Davies says that having received information yesterday from Mr Pryse the last witness that some fowls had been stolen from his premises the previous night he last night about nine o'clock went to the house of the prisoner, John Griffiths, in the town of Welshpool. Examinant asked Griffiths' wife if her husband was at home who after some hesitation said that he was upstairs and upon saying so she ran upstairs and examinant heard her say to the prisoner "Here is Sam Davies coming". That examinant followed Griffiths' wife upstairs and discovered the prisoner John Griffiths and Evan Owen in a small closet engaged in feathering fowls but they (upon hearing from Griffiths' wife that examinant was coming up) had let the fowls drop down and appeared to be much confused. That examinant then secured the prisoners and sent for Mr Pryse. Pryse who together with her son came there and identified some of the fowls which had not been



feathered and the two ducks. That examinant with his assistants conveyed the prisoners to the cribs and removed the fowls being 17 fowls and two ducks which he now produces except one fowl which the prisoner had put into a pot to boil. That examinant afterwards proceeded to the house of the prisoner Evan Owen situate in Powell's Row in the town of Welshpool which he searched and found the spade and the four bags now produced one of which bears the name "J Newell, Berriew" and which Mr Newell of the Wheatsheaf identifies as his property. Samuel Davies*.

Ellis Jones of the town of Welshpool, labourer, says that she lived ostler at the Packhorse in Welshpool till sometime in or about October last when he left and that three of the fowls and one of the ducks now produced by Samuel Davies he swears to be the property of the said David Pryse and that although examinant has left Mr Pryse's service he still resides in the neighbourhood of the Packhorse and had frequent opportunities of seeing Mr Pryse's fowls. Examinant believes that most of the other fowls now produced which are unfeathered are the property of the said Mr Pryse although he does not like to swear positively to them. The mark of Ellis Jones.

Richard Lloyd of the town Welshpool, ostler to Mr Pryse of the Packhorse Inn says that the hovel or building in which the fowls roosted was broken open on Thursday night last and that two ducks and several fowls were stolen and that an entrance was effected into the building which was locked by forcing out the staple and that two of the fowls now produced and not identified by Ellis Jones the last witness examinant swears to be the property of his master the prosecutor and that he recollects seeing one of them, a black hen, in Packhorse yard on Thursday evening last. The mark of Richard Lloyd.

Order-sentence. [1834H20]

At the adjourned Q.S. on 20 February 1833. King on the prosecution of David Pryse against John Griffiths and Evan Owen of pa. Welshpool, labourers, for larceny. King on the prosecution of John Sparrow against the said Evan Owen. Order that the prisoner Evan Owen for the first offence has been found guilty and is to be transported for seven years. And for the second offence of which he has been found guilty he is to transported for a further term of seven years to commence at the expiration of the first sentence. Further that he be kept to hard labour until he be removed for transportation.

Examination-assault. [1834H21]

4 February 1834. Examination of Margaret wife of William Foulkes of Llanfyllin, shoemaker, and Elizabeth wife of Edward Ellis of Llanfyllin, shoemaker, taken before Hugh Bibby and Edward Foulkes, J.P.s for the borough of Llanfyllin. Margaret Foulkes says that in the evening of Monday 20 January last about how past six o'clock as near as she can mention she wanted to go out in the street and being afraid of the little children burning she asked Ellis Jones to go and sit with them till she returned. He did so and on her return he got up from the chair where she used to sit on and went and sat in the corner and immediately slept. Deponent was not out of the house 10 minutes before she returned. After deponent returned to the house she undressed the two children and the clock struck seven. When she first saw Ellis Jones he was coming from the door of the house of John Oliver. Ellis Jones slept from the time above-mentioned until about 11 o'clock when she asked him to go and fetch her a halfpennyworth of small beer. He did not return but she received the jgg and halfpenny from Rosetta Oliver. The mark of Margaret Foulkes.

Elizabeth Ellis says that she went to the house of William Foulkes on the night of Monday 20 January last at eight o'clock and saw Ellis Jones sleeping in the corner and there left him. The mark of Elizabeth Ellis.

Examination-assault. [1834H22]

4 February 1834. The voluntary statement of Ellis Jones of Llanfyllin, labourer, taken before Hugh Bibby and Edward Foulkes, J.P.s for the borough of Llanfyllin. Being brought before us in the custody of Edward Ellis, sergeant-at-mace of the said borough, and charged before us on the oath of Mary wife of John Jones of Penymynydd in pa. Meifod with having on the night of Monday 20 January last at pa. Llanfyllin assaulted her the said Mary Jones with intent to rob her says "Margaret Foulkes of Llanfyllin called me out of the house that night and asked me if I would stay with the little children in the house afraid of the little children being burnt as she wanted to go to the street on an errand, so I stayed there till she came back. I then went and sat in the corner and slept, something about 10 o'clock she asked me if I would go and fetch a halfpennyworth of small beer. I met a young woman on the street and Thomas from Mr Bibby's asked me if I would come with him to help him with the horses. I had a jug in my hand and I asked this young woman is she would take the jug home and the half penny as I might go with him to the horses. I washed two saddles and two bridles then I went away. I have nothing else to say. Ellis Jones*.

Motion-removal. [1834H23]

1 January 1834. Pa. Llanwddyn, appellants, and pa. Llanfyllin, respondents, touching the removal of Elizabeth Jones, widow. As attorney for the appellants I hereby consent that this appeal be abandoned and that the order of removal be confirmed, the respondents undertaking to bear and pay the costs incurred by them. J. Examinations-theft. [1834H24]

1 February 1834. Examination and complaint of John Sparrow of Welshpool, carpenter, taken before Thomas Beck and Thomas Davies. Says that about a fortnight ago Edward Jones of Welshpool, wheelwright, informed examinant that he had purchased some spokes of the prisoner Evan Owen and he thought them very like some spokes which examinant had and that Jones desired examinant to take care of his spokes. That examinant had a great quantity of spokes and felloes in his yard hewed up, and consequently he is unable to state whether any of them have been stolen or not, and that from comparing the spokes now produced by William Davies with those he has now in the yard and from the great similarity in the grain of the wood and dryness as well as the length he has no doubt but that they were stolen from his yard. And after about a week before the time that Edward Jones informed examinant of his having purchased the spokes from the prisoner Evan Owen, John Griffiths of Welshpool, who stands charged together with the prisoner Owen of having stolen some fowls was employed by examinant in his yard to move some timber. John Sparrow*.

Examinations-theft. [1834H25]

1 February 1834. Examination of Edward Jones of the town of Welshpool, taken before Thomas Beck and Thomas Davies. Says that about a fortnight ago the prisoner Evan Owen brought about a dozen spokes to examinant and asked him if he would buy them. That examinant accordingly bought them of him and gave him three pence each for the shortest and five pence apiece for the largest of them. That upon examinant questioning the said Evan Owen as to how or from where he had got them he said that he had bought them from a man that owed him some money. That the said Evan Owen asked examinant if he would buy some felloes of him saying that he had got some. That examinant said that he gave different prices and that the price depended upon the quality. That the said Evan Owen then went away but he did not afterwards bring any felloes to him. That about a week or nine days previous to this transaction examinant bought some spokes from Mr Sparrow and that upon looking at those he had purchased from the prisoner Owen sometime after he suspected from the appearance and quality of the wood and also from Mr Sparrow's yard. That examinant informed Mr Sparrow of his suspicions. Edward Jones*.

Examination-theft. [1834H26]

26 November 1833. Examination of Samuel Davies, sergeant-at-mace of the borough of Welshpool, taken before Thomas Beck and Thomas Davies. Says that having been informed by the said Sarah Oliver that she had lost seven shillings out of her cupboard in the kitchen and that she suspected Sarah Archer (a servant girl of hers) with having stolen it he went and took her to examinant's house and charged her with having stolen it but she denied having done so, for a short time. Examinant then said he must take her to prison. She afterwards told examinant she did take two half clowns and two shillings out of her mistress's cupboard on the Sunday, that she took the seven shillings up home (she called it meaning David Williams' where examinant understood Sarah Archer had been waged and lived there many years) and gave it to David Williams at the same time telling him where she had it from. Examinant then sent for David Williams at the same time desiring the messenger to say he was charged with receiving money from Sarah Archer which she had stolen from Sarah Oliver. That David Williams came immediately and brought a person of the name of Edward Smout with him. Examinant then informed Williams what the girl had said (in his presence) but he denied having received it and went and asked the girl how she came to say she gave the money to him or something to that purpose. She then said I give the money to you, two half crowns and two shillings and told you where I had it from. Williams then said I have got a witness and then called Smout in. Smout asked how she came to say she gave the money to David Williams. "I was in the house all the while you were there and you gave David Williams no money". Sarah Archer then replied "I was in the house half an hour before you came in and I give the money to him as soon as I went there". Examinant said that under that charge he thought it his duty to put him in the crib and taking him there, Williams, a short distance from examinant's house wished examinant to release him saying he had the money from the girl but would pay it back and all

expenses. Examinant said he could not release them and took him to the crib. The following morning the seven shillings was brought to examinant by Elizabeth Maddocks, sister to Williams. Samuel Davies*.

Examinations-theft. [1834H28]

1 February 1834. Examination of William Davies of the town of Welshpool, sawyer, taken before Thomas Beck and Thomas Davies. Says that two of the spokes which he now produces he received this morning from Edward Jones of Welshpool, wheelwright, and that about 20 months ago examinant hewed up a considerable quantity of spokes for Mr Sparrow some of which were of the length and size of those now produced and that examinant has compared those which he received from Edward Jones with those in Mr Sparrow's yard and that they exactly correspond in all respect and he believes them to be the property of the said John Sparrow. And that from the state of the dryness of the spokes now produced and which he received from the said Edward Jones he believes that they have not been hewed up more than a year and a half to two years. William Davies*.

Examination-theft. [1834H29]

4 February 1834. Examination of Mary wife of John Jones of Penymynydd, pa. Meifod, mason, taken before Hugh Bibby and Edward Foulkes, J.P.s for the borough of Llanfyllin. Says that on Monday night 20 January last about seven o'clock of that night she was returning home from Llanfyllin (where she had purchased two shillings worth of bread from Thomas Harris's wife, and a quarter of sugar and a half penny candle at Thomas Jones's shop) up the Garth Road with the bread in a bag on her arm. When she came opposite a field adjoining the said road belonging to Mr Edward Jones of Bachie a man came suddenly over the hedge and immediately asked deponent what she had under her cloak. Deponent denied having anything about her. The man swore she had and that he would have it, he then took hold of her and a struggle took place. During the struggle her cloak and bonnet were torn. Deponent cried out "murder" but the man put his hand over her mouth to prevent her crying out, and endeavoured to take the bread and other articles from her, but as she continued to cry out, the man gave her a blow in the face, and walked off towards Llanfyllin. The man then had on a round jacket and light-coloured trousers and wore a cap. That it was a moonlight night. Deponent is perfectly sure that the prisoner who is now brought forward was the person who attacked her, as she knows him not only from his dress but also from his features. The mark of Mary Jones.

Examinations-theft. [1834H30]

26 November 1833. Complaint and examination of Sarah Oliver of the town of Welshpool, spinster, taken before Thomas Beck and Thomas Davies. Says that on the morning of Sunday 20 October last she had some silver in a small cupboard in her kitchen which she took out and counted and found that she had £2 3s 6d. That she then put it into a basin in the cupboard and shut the door, but she left the key in the lock. That she then went into the house adjoining where she remained in a few minutes and returned and that when she came into her house she saw the door upon a jar. That she closed the cupboard door and locked it and put the key into a pocket. That on the next morning Monday she again counted the silver and found that seven shillings part of a silver (that is to say two half crowns and two shillings) had been stolen out of the basin in the cupboard. That examinant immediately suspected that the prisoner Sarah Archer (who then lived with examinant as a servant) had stolen the silver as she thereupon charged her with the robbery, but she strongly denied it. That on the Sunday evening the prisoner Sarah Archer asked examinant if she should go to chapel (at six o'clock) to which she consented and that after her return which was a little before eight examinant asked the prisoner if she had been at chapel who said "Where do you think I have been but in chapel". That's suspecting she had not been there examinant in the beginning of the following week sent a person into the neighbourhood of the residence of the prisoner David Williams who lives at the top of the town, and who

examinant believes brought up the said Sarah Archer from her infancy to ascertain whether she had been with him on that evening instead of at chapel as suspected by examinant, which the messenger informed examinant she had found to be the case. That examinant's suspicions having been strengthened by the circumstance she mentioned the matter to Samuel Davies one of the sergeants-at-mace who in the course of a day or two came to examinant's house and questioned the girl as to the robbery and after a little conversation with her Davies took the prisoner Archer away with him. The mark of Sarah Oliver.

Examinations-theft. [1834H31]

20 December 1833. Examination of Edward Williams the younger of Caersws, butcher, taken before Richard John Davies. That before the constable arrived deponent asked the prisoner to tell him how he came by the whole of the sheep which he had brought for sale to him to which the prisoner upon condition that deponent would say nothing about it. That the prisoner then said that "his wife persuaded him to steal the sheep which deponent purchased on Monday from her father David Tibbott of Llandinam. That he caught the three other sheep on the Hill by either Llannerch but did not know whose property they were. That he thought there was a D on the side of the sheep. Edward Williams*.

Thomas Jones of pa. Llandinam, shepherd, says that he has been shepherd to Mrs Ann Davies of Gwerneirin for the space of two years during the summertime. That on this present day deponent saw the three last sheep mentioned in the examination of Edward Williams in the slaughterhouse in Caersws. That about six weeks since deponent brought the said three sheep together with several others off the Hill into the Davies's ground for the winter. That the said three sheep have Mrs Davies's earmark, viz a swallow fork in the near ear and one half of the furthest ear cut off with a slit in the stub of that ear. That when the sheep were brought off the hill they had a D pitch mark on each side but there are now no pitch marks to be seen on the three sheep mentioned. The mark of Thomas Jones.

Thomas Edwards, constable in Caersws, says that on Thursday last he received the prisoner into custody from Edward Williams together with the three wether sheep stated by Williams to have been stolen by the prisoner. The mark of Thomas Edwards.

Report-gaol. [1834E13]

The visiting justices of the gaol and house of correction having received an application by Mary Davies, widow, the late matron of the house of correction to be allowed an annuity reported that she is 59 years of age and that her health is impaired by coup, is weak in attending to the duties of the keeper and matron of the house correction from the year 1811 when her late husband was the keeper, till 1832 when the prisoners were removed to the new gaol; and we understand that about 17 years ago Colonel Davies, one of the visiting justices, requested her to become matron at the annual salary of 20 shillings to which she agreed and acted accordingly till the prisoners were removed and the salary was regularly paid by the treasurer but that no other appointment was made in consideration of her age, her length of service, impaired health and poverty we recommend her application to the consideration of the court and we think her deserving of a small annuity for life.

We also suggest for the consideration of the court the propriety of providing a proper covered carriage for conveying the prisoners to and from Welshpool at the Assizes, and to this court for trial.

And we recommend that a bell be placed up in a proper place in the gaol and a lamp in the lobby and that proper scales and weights be provided and kept in the gaol to weigh all provisions bought by the prisoners for their satisfaction and to prevent impositions.

We have also to observe that the criminal and debtors courts are insecure one prisoner having succeeded in getting up an angle of the walls in the criminal court and over the front wall; and it appears that some alteration is requisite to prevent the male and female misdemeanour prisoners having communication with each other through and over the iron partitions as a female lately scaled the palisades and got into the male court.

Order. Report adopted. Joseph Hayes Lyon be solicited to enquire the cost of such a vehicle. Also that a bell and proper scales and weights be provided. County surveyor to prepare alterations suggested. [1834E/SO/6/116]

Examinations-assault. [1834E16]

7 April 1834. The complaint and examination of John Payne of tp. Trefnant in that part of pa. Alberbury which lies in co. Salop, taken before Panton Corbett, Thomas Beck, Thomas Davies the. Says he sometimes plays upon the fiddle and that on Monday last he was employed to fiddle at the Plough and Harrow Inn in tp.Trewern and that being engaged there most part of the night he remained there till the following day Tuesday, and that on the Tuesday morning soon after breakfast time examinant was drinking some ale in the kitchen and was just about to return home when William Davies of Welshpool (the prisoner) came in and sat up on the screen by the side of examinant and called for some ale which was brought him. That examinant and the prisoner entered into an agreeable joking conversation and the prisoner said that he knew examinant's father. That soon after this the prisoner went out of the house and examinant also went out for a certain purpose and that as examinant was returning into the house the prisoner was talking with Mr Allen of Welshpool, solicitor, near the kitchen door. That examinant asked the prisoner if he knew Mr Downes of the Argoed (examinant having heard that Mr Downes had or has a mortgage on the prisoners property). The prisoner said that he did but examinant did not ask the prisoner this question with the view of irritating or putting him into a passion but merely asked him the question for the sake of information. That examinant returned into the house and in a short time the prisoner also came in and said to examinant that he knew Mr Downes very well and that he had a deal of money of Mr Downes and he mentioned the sum but examinant does not now recollect the amount. That examinant then said that he supposed Mr Downes was the prisoner's master. But upon this the conversation dropped and the prisoner got up and walked to and fro in the kitchen in the kitchen smoking a pipe. That in a few minutes the prisoner said to examinant "Damn you I'll cut your throat, I'll kill you, there is no law for me". That the prisoner then went into the parlour and examinant remained in the kitchen and that in about the course of an hour the prisoner returned into the kitchen and was making for examinant having his right-hand behind his back. That the prisoner said to examinant "damn you I will cut your throat", and was about to make a spring at examinant. That examinant took up a chair and held it between him and the prisoner to prevent his striking him. That the prisoner caught hold of the chair and wrested it from examinant. That examinant being then very much alarmed he endeavoured to defend himself or to escape but not being able to get from him examinant put his left arm around the prisoner's neck and they had a scuffle; that during the scuffle the prisoner made several motions with his right-hand which before he held behind his back as if he was cutting examinant but in consequence of the prisoner's concealing his hand examinant did not see any knife or instrument in the prisoner's hand. That in the scuffle the prisoner and examinant both went down together and some persons interfered and got examinant up and prevented the prisoner from committing further violence. That just as they fell in the scuffle or before examinant was got up he felt something sharp hurt him about the neck and that after examinant was taken out from the prisoner he found that he had received a severe wound in the throat which bled profusely and also that he had received cuts in each hand and also several cuts in this clothes. The mark of John Payne. Thomas Evans of the Plough and Harrow Inn in tp. Trewern. Says that on Thursday last between 12 and one o'clock examinant and the prisoner wre sitting in examinant's parlour and were drinking a pint of ale between them, and Davies had put his spectacles on and was going to write a receipt for examinant no other person being then in the room. That Payne came into the parlour and asked Davies if he knew Mr Downes. But Davies looked that Payne and said that he did know him and that he had had a good deal of his money. That Payne began to joke and talk some nonsense to Davies which examinant does not now remember upon which Davies desired him to go out and to let him alone and that he Davies wanted to have nothing to do with him and said that he wanted to write something. That examinant also desired Payne to go into the kitchen saying that he wanted Davies to write something for him. That Payne then went out and examinant and Davies remained in the parlour. That in the short time after Payne had guitted the parlour Mr Allen of Welshpool came to examinant's house and examinant went out of the door to speak to him and after he had done with Mr Allen he went into the parlour to tell Davies that Mr Allen was come upon which Davies also went out to talk to him and examinant went into the kitchen. That examinant is not sure whether Payne was in the kitchen then not but he came in soon. That in a few minutes Davies came in and he went into the parlour and examinant followed him. That examinant received from Mr Allen a receipt for the payment of some money and Mr Allen requested examinant to get Davies to sign it but Davies after he returned into the parlour

seemed to be in a rather bad humour and he refused to sign the receipt and went away into the kitchen and examinant stayed in the parlour. That examinant heard Davies talk rather loud in the kitchen and examinant heard the screen rattling as if some persons were fighting or jolting against it. That examinant ran into the kitchen where he saw Payne and Davies scuffling but Davies had fallen against the screen and examinant saw Payne strike Davies in the face with his fist which caused blood to flow from his nose upon which examinant rushed between them and separated them. That examinant desired Payne not to abuse the old man for shame but to let him alone. That as soon as examinant had separated them Davies ran into the parlour and examinant's servant girl held the door for a short time to prevent Davies and Pavne getting together again. But when the girl had loosed the door Davies opened it and stood upon the door having a butcher's knife in his and said to Payne "now come on" or used words to that effect upon which Payne took up one of the kitchen chairs and held it before him. That Payne ran with the chair to Davies with which he pushed Davies up against the clock. That Payne then laid hold of Davies and loosed the chair and a scuffle ensued in which both of them fell and examinant believes Davies was the undermost. That examinant did not see Davies cut or stab the complainant nor did Payne cry out or make any particular noise. That examinant got Payne up from off Davies and Payne immediately run out of house and examinant saw some blood on the ground. That upon seeing the blood examinant ran out to Payne to see if he had been hurt and found him in the fold who said to examinant "I shall be a dead man soon". That examinant examined Payne and found that he had received a wound upon the jaw on the left side of his face extending downwards towards the throat from which a considerable quantity of blood was flowing, and he also found that Payne had received a cut upon one of his fingers. Thomas Evans*.

Examination-theft. [18304E17]

18 March 1834. The examination of Richard Downes Rider of Welshpool, apprentice to David Evans of Welshpool, mercer, taken before Thomas Beck and Thomas Davies. That about four o'clock yesterday evening examinant was engaged in his master's shop and that he was showing a box of ribbons to some customers and that the prisoner came up to examinant and asked him the price of ribbon now produced which she had laid hold of. That examinant informed her of the price and the prisoner, after looking at the ribbon a short time put it slyly under her shawl whilst examinant was attending to other customers. That the prisoner then asked examinant to show her some checks which he did but the prisoner did not buy any. That the prisoner then walked out of the shop and immediately upon her leaving examinant informed his master that the prisoner had taken the piece of ribbon. That examinant by his master's direction ran after the prisoner who had only proceeded a few yards from the shop and he desired her to come back to the shop saying that Mr Evans wanted her. That the prisoner without any hesitation returned to the shop with examinant and having conducted her into the parlour he desired her to wait there as Mr Evans wanted to see her and that he would be there immediately. That when Mr Evans came into the parlour he said to the prisoner that he had been given to understand that she had taken some ribbon but the prisoner strongly denied it. That the piece of green ribbon now produced is his master's property and was stolen from this shop by the prisoner as above stated and also that the piece of calico now also produced he is able from its bearing his masters private mark to say that it is the property of his said master, and that examinant swears that he did not sell the piece of calico now produced to any person. Richard D Rider*.

David Evans of Welshpool, mercer, says that the witness Rider having yesterday evening informed him that the prisoner who had just gone out on his shop had stolen a piece of ribbon examinant cautioned him to be particular and to take care he was sure he was correct. That examinant sent him after the prisoner and desired him to say that examinant wanted to see her and in a short time the prisoner with Rider came back and examinant's shop being very full of customers examinant desired Rider to take her into the parlour. That examinant immediately followed them into the parlour and examinant told her that he had been given to understand by the last witness that she had stolen a piece of ribbon but the prisoner most positively denied it. That whilst examinant was charging her with the theft the prisoner threw a bundle upon the table which was tied up in a handkerchief. That examinant opened the bundle and found in it the piece of calico now produced. That he asked the prisoner from where she had had it and she answered from Mr Morris's. That examinant said it was his and the prisoner made no reply. That examinant then sent for Samuel Davies, one of the sergeants-at-mace, who immediately came and took charge of the prisoner and after searching her he soon found the piece of ribbon which the prisoner acknowledged she had stolen, but that is was the first theft she had committed and that if examinant would forgive her she would never do so again. That examinant is able to swear to the ribbon and calico now produced and that they bear his private mark. David Evans*. Samuel Davies, one of the sergeants-at-mace for the borough of Welshpool says that yesterday evening he went to the shop of Mr Evans of Welshpool, mercer, (having been sent for) and having proceeded to the

parlour Mr Evans gave the prisoner in charge to examinant saying that she had stolen a piece of ribbon and some calico. That examinant searched the prisoner but he did not find anything upon her person but he found under the table in the parlour just by where the prisoner stood the piece of ribbon now produced which Mr Evans identified as his property. That the piece of calico now produced was given to examinant by Mr Evans and the ribbon now also produced is also the same as he found in Mr Evans's parlour. But the prisoner dropped upon her knees and begged Mr Evans and examinant to forgive her saying that she had never done so before and if they would let her go she would never do so again. Samuel Davies*.

Specifications-bridge, and agreement. [1834E19]

Aberhirierth bridge. The materials of the present bridge will be the property of the contractor are to be taken down at his expense; he is to maintain a safe road through the ford below the bridge during the execution of his contract and as convenient for the passage as circumstances will admit of. The new bridge is to be built nearly on the site of the present one - in such line as the county surveyor shall set out; of the form and dimensions expressed upon the plan elevation and section.

The depth of the foundations and the relative several heights of the work can be ascertained from the lines upon the elevation. The level of the roadway upon the present bridge being defined upon the elevation and from which all measurements are to be ascertained.

The foundations and the abutments are to be excavated to the full depth expressed, which is calculated at 10 feet below the water level under the present bridge and the foundation of the wing walls to the depth shown on the elevation and the whole must be kept dry nor is the water to be allowed to rise in the foundations until the work is blocked above low water level.

The front of the abutments and the return quoins up to the level of the expected low water for 5 feet on each side are to be built with durable stone of the best quality well hammerfaced set in the regular courses in good mortar, no stone being less than 20 inches in bed with headers not more than 7 feet asunder in each course and not less than 3 feet 6 inches in bed. The external work of the wing walls of the same level to be built with a large durable stone well and truly hammerfaced set close in mortar, no stone being less than 18 inches in bed with headers to bind 3 feet into the solid of the work and more than 7 feet asunder at the height of every course which must be levelled regularly with every second course in the front of the abutments. The internal work of the whole of the abutments and wing walls must be built the full size shown upon the plan with large flat bedded storm laid in mortar and grouted at every 12 inches.

The remainder of the external work of the front of the abutments up to the impost as well as that portion of the wing walls which will be seen above the slope of the embankments to be built with the best description of stone, well hammerfaced laid in the regular courses in good mortar and close beds and joints, no stone being less than 18 inches in bed with the joints carrying square at least 12 inches throughout the whole of the external work and headers not less than 3 feet in bed in each course and not more than 7 feet asunder the remainder of the external work of the wing walls to be built with strong large durable stone the same size in bed as before specified and regularly levelled at the height of every second course.

The internal work of the abutments to be built the full-size expressed upon the drawings and the wing walls reduced by regular sets on so as to be 4 feet thick at the level of the string course and solid in mortar and grouted at the height of every course.

The impost and other spring of the arch to be 1 foot high very neatly hammerfaced and set to project 3 inches before the face of the abutments and wing walls.

The arch which is to be a semicircle is to be built of the best stone which can be procured in the neighbourhood very well hammerfaced to templets to the regular radius; the full depth in bed figured upon the elevation, the quoins set to project two inches before the face of the spandrels, and worked through the whole width in regular courses laid close and solid in mortar with the backs and cross joints well pinned and grouted, to be turned upon proper centres which are to be approved of by the county surveyor.

The whole of the external work of the spandrels and wing walls above the impost to be built with good stone well hammerfaced set close in a mortar in regular courses, no stone being less than 15 inches in bed with a headers not more than 6 feet as under in each course and 2 feet and a half in bed.

The internal work of the abutments to be carried up solid with large bedded stone the full-size to the height of the dotted line A upon the elevation with a horizontal arch turned at the back: the whole laid in mortar and grouted every 12 inches in height.

The internal work of the wings to be reduced by a regular sets on so as to be 2 feet thick when level with the underside of the string course set solid in mortar and grouted as before specified.

The string course to be neatly hammerfaced set to project 3 inches before the face of the work and the inside to form a part of the parapet. The parapets to be of good stone neatly hammerfaced on both sides set on the regular courses in good mortar.

The coping to be the width of the wall not in shorter lengths than 5 feet very well hammerfaced set in mortar with a dowell of half inch iron equally let into each joint and leaded.

The contract is to fill the bridge as also the embankments with 10 feet at each end to the level of the intended road, the material for which is to be taken from such point on the present road near the bridge as the county surveyor shall direct.

The whole of the work to be done in the most firm substantial and workmanlike manner under the direction and fully to the satisfaction of the county surveyor, the materials being of the best description and such as may be approved of by the surveyor. Thomas Penson. 20 January 1834.

I, Hugh Morris of LlaInfair Talhaearn, co. Denbigh, stonemason, do humbly contract and agree with the clerk of the peace to build in a firm substantial and workmanlike manner according to the plan signed by me and of the foregoing specification a new bridge at Aberhirierth for the sum of £370 to be paid to me at such

times and by such instalments as the surveyor may from time to time certify to be due to me. Examination-assault. [1834E20]

7 April 1834. The examination of Sarah wife of Thomas Evans of the plough and Harrow, taken before Panton Corbett, Thomas Beck, Thomas Davies. Says that on Monday 31 March being Easter Monday John Payne the complaiant was engaged to play on the violin at the Plough and Harrow there being a party of young people dancing there who did not leave till late on the morning of Tuesday. That complainant remained there after the last had left. That sometime in the morning of Tuesday Benjamin Pritchard, a labourer living in the neighbourhood came in and had some beer with the complainant but she believes they had not much. That about noon on Tuesday William Davies of Welshpool (late ironmonger) came to the house and went into the parlour where her husband then was or went afterwards to Davies. That complainant and Pritchard were in the kitchen. But after Davies had been in the parlour half an hour or more complainant went there alone. But they were in the parlour some time she believes before any quarrel took place. What did happen there she does not know but they all left the parlour and came into the kitchen. When examinant went into the parlour to clean it and make it tidy during which time there was a scuffle in the kitchen but there was no bawling out or particular noise. Examinant went to see what was the matter when she saw complainant had Davies against the corner of the screen having apparently the mastery of him. Soon after examinant came into the kitchen Davies fell down but immediately got up and went directly into the parlour. When Mary Henley, examinant's servant, shut the parlour door to keep complainant and Davies separate from each other and was holding it till a boy came to the kitchen saying Davies had a knife in his hand, the girl then becoming alarmed loosed the door when Davies came into the kitchen with a knife in his hand moving it about saying at the same time "now for it" or "come at it" or something of the kind. Complainant then took up a chair to defend himself. Davies was still moving the knife as if intending to strike. Complainant however kept him off with a chair and got Davies up against the clock when he threw the chair down and laid hold of Davies where they scuffled till at last they both fell, Davies having the knife in his hand all the time but did not see Davies strike complainant with the knife nor did she hear complainant say he was cut till after they both got up when he ran out of the house into the fold saving he should not be alive long or something to that effect but returned into the house in about five or 10 minutes. She does not know what wounds complainant received. They both had got some drink in the house but neither of them was drunk. Complainant was however not quite sober. Davies was sober. The mark of Sarah Evans.

Edward Edwards of Tynyrwttra says in the latter end of August last a deal balk was brought to my house for the purpose of building a barn. In about three weeks afterwards it was sawed into planks or boards. After they were sawed they were put out to dry, in about a week after they were sawed the joiners came to put them in their places in the building. When the joiners were carrying the planks into the barn they told me to go and fetch the other plank. I told them that there was no other. John Jones, one of the joiners, said there was one and came with me to see for it, but we could not find it. I counted the planks immediately after they were sawed: they were six of the same sort as the one now produced and when I and the joiners were carrying them in there were only five. In a few days afterwards I ordered the parish clerk of Cemaes to cry it, which he did at a funeral at Cemaes in my hearing. I made often enquiries at Cemaes and different places for it but could get no information, until Monday 10 March when my wife told me that David Jones, a boy living at Gwalie who had been living with prisoner as I believe most part of his time since May last knew something about it. Upon this information I went to this boy and made enquiries; when he told me that he had seen a plank and answering the description of the one lost at prisoners house. He told me that the plank was in three pieces are that one of the pieces was used as a shelf in the dairy. I then returned home and on the following day I applied to the Rev Mr Hughes for a search warrant which was granted, when I, Lewis Lewis, constable, Edward Stephens and John Jones, the joiners went to Tynllwyn where the prisoner resides and made a search, when we found, first a piece of a plank used in the dairy as a hanging shelf, afterwards we found another piece nailed to the stall in the stable. We then went to the hayloft and found another piece partly under the hay. We then left and Lewis Lewis, the constable, brought with him the planks which were left in his possession. The mark of Edward Edwards.

David Jones of Gwalie says I am now about 14 years of age. In the hay harvest last year I went to live at Tynllwyn where James Edwards and David Edwards, prisoners reside. I was there continually during the daytime but I sometimes slept at home. In the month of November last I saw three pieces of deal plank and examined them because I had not seen any of the kind there before, they were in the hayloft. I said nothing about them to anyone nor did I hear anyone else see anything except one night when David Edwards, prisoner, had one of the pieces in the kitchen planing it for the purpose of making a shelf in the dairy, when he said "this has been here for the last 20 years only the rain came upon it in the hayloft" and after I returned home which was also about a fortnight ago to my father, who asked me if I had seen any planks anywhere. When I told him that I'd seen three pieces of planks at the Tynllwyn but I could not tell him where they came from. I did not see them there until after the wheat was sown. It was by feeding the horses one morning that first observed them. I think that the planks now produced are the same. I'm certain that the one planed is the one which was put in the dairy as a shelf, and that that piece was one of those which were in the hayloft. David Jones.

Edward Stephens of Nantywrisgen, joiner, says in the course of last summer I was employed with one John Jones in building a barn at Tynywttra. When the building was nearly finished I recollect sawing a deal balk for the purpose of finishing the woodwork. I recollect sawing six planks of the same dimensions as those now produced. After they were sawed we put them to dry on the hedge close to the sawpit. We sawed them on a Friday and Saturday, either in the latter end of October or begin November. On leaving our work on Saturday evening I counted the planks; they were then all there and on coming to our work on the Monday morning following they were then all there. I did not count them afterwards until we were carrying them in which was on the following Tuesday, when I found that there was one missing. I searched for it but could not find it and we were obliged to leave the work unfinished in consequence of losing it, in which state it still remains. About a week ago Edward Edwards of Tynyrwttra called upon me at Abercegir and asked me if I would go with him to look for the plank, as he had been informed and suspected where it was. On Wednesday the 12th instant myself, John Jones my partner, Lewis Lewis constable and Edward Edwards went together toTynllwyn, when Lewis Lewis and Edward Edwards went into the dwelling house and brought out a piece of a plank. Afterwards Lewis Lewis, Edward Edwards and John Jones went to the stable and brought from there two pieces of plank. I then examined them and I am certain that these now produced are the same, and am also certain that these are part of the balk which I and John Jones sawed at Tynywttra. The mark of Edward Stephens.

John Jones of Abercegir says that in the corn harvest last year I was employed in building a barn at Tynywttra in Cemaes with one Edward Stephens. But before the building was completed which was about All Saints. I recollect sawing a deal balk for the purpose of making the threshing floor and other parts of the building in company with Edward Stephens. We sawed the balk into different sizes planks and sawed six planks of the same dimensions as these pieces. When we went to see the planks there was one lost and we were obliged to leave the building unfinished in consequence. On 12 March I went in company with Edward Edwards, Lewis Lewis constable and Edward Stephens to Tynllwyn where the prisoners resided, whom I saw there. Edward Edwards and Lewis Lewis went to the house and brought out one piece of a plank, then myself, Edward Edwards and Lewis Lewis went into the stable. I took one piece of a plank from the stable stall with an axe and another was brought by Lewis Lewis and Edward Edwards from the hayloft. I then examined the planks and I'm certain that these now produced are the same and I believe to the best of my knowledge that the piece of planks now produced are part of the balk which I assisted in sawing. John Jones*.

Lewis Lewis of Cemaes says I was on Wednesday 12 instant sworn as a special constable to execute once under the hand and seal of John Hughes, clerk, by searching the dwelling house and other premises of James Edwards at Tynllwyn for a deal plank. I went to Tynllwyn and found in the dairy a piece of a deal plank. Edward Edwards was then with me. Afterwards we went to the stable when I found another piece of a plank nailed to the stall. Then we went to the hayloft and found there a third piece. I then brought them to Rev Mr Hughes's house and I was ordered by him to take them to my own house and keep the until I was further ordered. I this morning was ordered by Mr Hughes to apprehend the prisoners, which I did. The planks were not out of my possession since I first had them. Lewis Lewis*.

17 March 1834. James Edwards, farmer, being charged on the oath of Edward Edwards of Tynyrwttra, Farmer for that he, the said James Edwards and David Edwards, on 18 October last past at Tynywttra, did steal take and carry away one deal plank, property of Evan Owen, gentlemen. James Edwards says he knows nothing at all of the planks. He saw them at his house; that his son David, prisoner asked him if there was any harm in bringing them down from the mountain. That his son told him that someone had told him that there were some planks there. That he replied and told him that he might as well leave them there.

Report-bridge. [1834E33]

Pontsuccoed - report of meeting of the committee held there on 2 April 1834. Present Viscount Clive, J.B.Williames, John Lloyd, Matthew Lewis, Having examined the site upon which it has been propose to build the new bridge and having ascertained from the county surveyor that on the trials made below the present bridge there is not any appearance of a sound foundation within the depth of eighteen feet do report that it would not be expedient to adopt either of the lines pointed out below the present bridge. It appears that the situations most advantageous with regards to the foundation are either above the present bridge or immediately upon the site of it and that there is a rock above the surface for the easternmost abutment and upon the trials made under the directions of the county surveyor there is rock within ten feet of the surface of the west abutment. In selecting the site it is apparent that if a bridge of two arches is determined upon the upper site will be preferable as the rock for the centre pier is nearly level with the water whereas upon the site of the present bridge the rock is seven feet at the least below the surface of the river. The county surveyor has submitted a plan for a bridge of one arch as also a plan for a bridge with two arches. According to the report of the county surveyor the estimate of the expense of the bridge of one arch if built upon the upper site exceeds by the sum of £550 the expense of the bridge of two arches, and if the two-arched bridge is built on the site of the present bridge the difference would not exceed £150 as far as regards the bridges but the additional expenses of ± 120 at the least will be incurred upon the approaches to the bridge upon the upper site.

Report-coroner. [1834E36]

The report of the committee of magistrates received by the coroner has led to such important results that he deems himself called upon to address a few words to their worships on the subject of it. It appears by the report "but at the Hilary sessions the court ordered (amongst other things) that in case medical examination of a body be deemed necessary at an inquest, the coroner (excepting in the case of immediate emergency) should call in another medical man to make such examination". The object of this order is as obscure as its legality is questionable; the authority by which J.P.s assume the right of ordering coroners does not appear. However so long as their worships granted remuneration the medical men for examining bodies their order did not much signify, as it formed no impediment to the discharge of the coroner's functions; but as this remuneration is now withheld, medical men refused to perform the duty, and the consequences of the ends of justice may be totally defeated by deficiency of evidence. The accompanying inquest and depositions are an example of what might occur, even in the case of murder. In anticipation of such results the coroner some time ago requested the magistrates to inform him "how he could compel a surgeon to examinant a dead body without tender of the remuneration". The report states "that the coroner as an incident to his office has authority and it is his duty to issue a summons to compel the appearance of witnesses, and to commit them for their contempt should they refuse to appear, or, having appeared to give evidence on the enquiry". This part of the report, if intended as an answer to the accordance question, is by no means a satisfactory one. The coroner is fully aware of his powers to compel the attendance of witnesses but he has no power to compel a medical man to undertake that examination of the body, which alone renders his evidence or peculiar importance, nor can Baron Bolland, to whose consideration the subjoined inquest and depositions were submitted, point out any mode of removing the difficulty. Should the magistrates being possession of better information than his Lordship, the coroner thinks he has a right to call upon them for the benefit of it; as this present difficulties have been occasioned by their elaborate learned and courteous report. Elizabeth Jones deposes that she was coming along the highway from Penaran towards her house in Kerry yesterday evening about six o'clock. She found the deceased Elizabeth Rufe upon her hands and knees on the ground as she spoke to her but found she would not answer. She then went to the house of her daughter Mrs Venables who lives near the spot and procured assistance to convey her to the house. Deponent remained with deceased to about eight o'clock the same evening when she died. She afterwards laid out the body on which she says there were no marks of violence. Deceased was far advanced in life but does not know that she was subject to any particular disorder. The mark of Elizabeth Jones.

Evan Williams surgeon does not know anything respecting the deceased Elizabeth Ruffe but has attended her in obedience to the summons of the coroner. He thinks it is probable that he might by opening the body ascertain the cause of death but the decline is doing so unless the coroner will guarantee him payment for his trouble. Says that yesterday (being Welshpool fair day) a little after eight o'clock in the evening examinant was walking up Pool Street in company with the young woman who had hold of examinant's right arm and that nearly opposite the Cross Keys in Welshpool there were a considerable number of persons standing upon the middle of the street and that as examinant and the young woman were passing through them he saw the prisoner take hold of the chain of his watch and that he gave it a sharp pluck and upon looking at the fob he found the chain had broken off and his watch with a small portion of the chain remained in the top of his watch pocket, and examinant is quite sure that this watch was removed from the bottom of watch pocket to the fob by the pluck. That examinant seized the prisoner (who was standing immediately before him) by the collar upon which the prisoner struck him a severe blow upon the eye which has given him a black eye. That the prisoner having got out of examinant's hold he went at a quick pace around a cart which was standing there upon the street and examinant went around the other side of the cart and met him and again caught hold of him upon which the prisoner struck examinant another blow, upon which examinant's brother John Griffiths came up and laid hold of the prisoner and shortly after some of the constables came to their assistance and conveyed the prisoner to the crib. That examinant was quite sober at the time and that the part of the watch chain together with the seal and key now produced by Samuel Davies are his property and were stolen from his person as aforesaid. Thomas Griffiths*.

Mary Davies of Welshpool, single woman, says that about eight o'clock last night or a little after she was going up High Street in Welshpool in company with Thomas Roderick and that in the middle of the street

near the Three Tuns she saw some persons going up street and that to the best of her belief she saw the prisoner passing down and that they met upon the middle of the street within a short distance of the lamp which is opposite the Three Tuns. That the person answering the description of the prisoner went up to one of the persons who was going up street and as passing she saw as she believes the prisoner lay hold of something attached to that person and that he made a pluck and she immediately heard that person say "my chain, my chain" and they both went down street afterwards. That nearly as soon as the person made the catch or pluck she also saw him (that is as she believes the prisoner) make a motion with his hand and having heard the other person say my chain, my chain, she thought that the person then threw the chain away, and by this time a crowd having assembled examinant saw nothing more of the affair. The mark of Mary Davies. John Booth of Welshpool, blacksmith, says that somewhere between eight and nine o'clock last night examinant was standing upon the street near the Bear Inn and having heard that the chain of a watch had been lost examinant proceeded to the spot where he had heard the transaction took place and after searching upon the street for it he found a part of the chain of a watch attached to which there was a seal and key which he handed over to Samuel Davies, one of the sergeants-at -mace. The mark of John Booth. Samuel Davies, one of the sergeants-at-mace for the borough of Welshpool says that last night he was informed of the robbery and that he went to the spot where he found the prisoner in the custody of John Griffiths, brother to the prosecutor, who delivered the prisoner over to examinant. That examinant conveyed the prisoner to the crib and after he had secured him John Booth the last witness handed over to examinant the part of the watch chain seal and key now produced. Samuel Davies*.

Specification for building a stone bridge of two arches over the river Einion at Pontsuccoed.

The present bridge to be taken down at the expense of the contractor and the materials to be his property and such as are serviceable may be used in the new work.

The new bridge is to be built on the line now marked out and nearly adjoining the present ruinous bridge or on such situation above this point as the county surveyor may mark out within 50 yards of the old line above the bridge.

Upon the site near the present bridge the rock upon the east side which is above the level of the low water must be cut in the regular steps for the whole space of the abutment and wing walls as delineated on the elevation. The face of the abutment not being less than 5 feet in thickness at the commencement.

The exterior work of the abutment and wing walls to the level of the spring of the arch must be built with stone from Coedgarthllwyd or Welshpool quarries, no stone being less than 20 inches in bed well hammerfaced set in a regular courses in good mortar with headers to bind 3 feet into the solid of the work not more than 7 feet asunder in each course.

The internal part of the abutment and walls is to be built with the best of the large stone in the old bridge such stone as can be raised in large beds near the bridge laid solid in mortar backed regularly to the level of the courses in the outside of the work and grouted at the height of each course with hot lime sharp gravel.

The foundation of the centre pier must be laid upon the rock in order to effect which the space must be framed out with a cofferdam so that the work shall be kept perfectly dry. The rock is to be levelled the full size of the pier at the external work built with stone from Coedygarthllwyd or Welshpool quarries in the same manner as before specified for the external work of the abutment, the circular end and salient angle being worked to templates. The interior work of the pier is to be built with a large square bedded stone laid on mortar perfectly close and levelled with each outside course and grouted as before specified. The water is not to be allowed to rise in the cofferdam till the work is brought above low water level.

The cofferdam is to be formed by drilling into the rock and fixing iron piles so as to support a double row of planks between which the puddle dam is to be formed.

The foundation of the west abutment and wing wall must be laid upon the rock, the earth excavated being laid in the line of the road.

The rock appears on the trials made to be 10 feet deep below low water level which will be taken at 4'6" below the spring of the arch of the old bridge and any greater depth will be allowed for at the valuation of the county surveyor whose estimate is to be final between the county and the contractor.

The whole of the external and internal work of the abutment and wing walls up to the spring of the arch is to be built in the manner before specified of the full size shown upon the plan the space being framed out and kept perfectly dry while the foundation are being brought above low water level.

The arches are to be of stone from Welshpool quarries or Coedgarthllwyd of the depth in bed specified upon the elevation well worked to templates, the quoins to project 2 inches below the face of the spandrel set in courses through the whole width with a rustic joint laid solid in mortar with the backs and cross joints well pinned and grouted.

The caps of the pier are to be of stone from Welshpool orCpoedgarthllwyd very well worked to proper templates and dipped? as shown in the elevation.

The external work of this spandrels and wing walls to the level of the underside of the shincourse is to be built with stone from Coedgarthhlwyd or Welshpool quarries well hammerfaced set in the regular courses in mortar no stone being less than 15 inches in bed with headers not less than 2 feet and a half in bed not more than 7 feet asunder in this course.

The internal work of the abutments and pier to be carried up solid to the height of the dotted line on the elevation at which level the wing walls are to be 3'3" thick, the whole built solid in mortar with large stone and well grouted at the level of each external course the wing walls are then to be reduced by regular sets on so as to be 2 feet thick at the level of the underside of the shincourse.

The shincourse which is to be very well hammerfaced and the inside whereof is to form a part of the battlements is to be of stone from Coedgarthllwyd or Welshpool quarries.

The parapets are to be of stone from Coedgarthllwyd or Welshpool quarries, two courses in height of the forms and dimensions shown on the section very well worked, the lower bed of the first course which will be 20 inches high being one foot and the lower bed of the upper course which is to be 19 inches high being 10 inches in bed with a batter of 2 inches on the inside in the height of the two courses. No stone in the upper course being shorter than 3 feet with a dowel of half inch iron not less than 6 inches long let into each of joint and leaded, the whole carefully set in good mortar and the work done equally as well as the parapets of the bridge lately built at Millbrook.

The timber centres for turning the arches upon are to be approved of by the county surveyor and there must be two sets so that both arches can be turned without removing either of the centres.

The contractor is to fill up the bridge as the work advances to form the east end to unite with the present road and the embank the west end for 10 feet from the wing pillars of the bridge the full width between the pillars with the slopes forming an angle of two base to one perpendicular.

The whole of the work is to be done in the most firm substantial and workmanlike manner under the directions and fully to the satisfaction of the county surveyor, the materials being of the best description. Separate tenders are also to be delivered for building the bridge upon the lower line now pegged out as also upon a site within 50 yards above the present bridge on either of which situations the foundation of the abutments, wing walls and pier are to be laid full 14 feet below the level of low watermark built in every respect in the same manner as before specified, proper frame and cofferdams being formed and the whole of the foundations kept perfectly dry until the work is brought above low water level.

Any additional work which may be considered necessary when the foundations are opened to be done by the contractor under the directions of the county surveyor whose valuation of such extra work is to be final between the county on the contractor. Thomas Penson, 24 January 1834.

Report-bridge. [1834T5]

Penstrowed bridge. Richard Cleaton says that he is now 79 years of age and has lived at Penstrowed Hall for 51 years since last May. Remembers the bridge near Penstrowed Hall being built about 54 years ago before which time there was not any bridge there about the time the turnpike road was first made. The bridge was built by some masons from Dolgellau and was paid for without any demand being made upon the parish. He has seen the bridge repaired but it was at all times done by the surveyor of the turnpike road. Has frequently served the office of overseer of the poor and as surveyor of the highways but never knew of any charges being made upon the parish on account of this bridge. Richard Cleaton.

John Mason says that he is 65 years of age and has lived in the parishes of Llandinam and Llanwnnog on his life. Remembers the bridge near Penstrowed Hall for 50 years back. Has been employed upon the turnpike road for 30 years and has repaired the bridge once at the expense of the trustees of the turnpike road. He does not remember the bridge being repaired at any other time. John Mason.

Report of the committee held at Caersws on 23 June 1834. Present: G.A. Evors, George Meares, R.J. Davies, J.A. Herbert. The committee having examinant the evidence above by which it appears that the bridge was originally built about 54 years ago and has since been repaired at the expense of the trustees of the turnpike road, are of opinion that the bridge is chargeable to the county.

Report-bridge. [1834T6]

Clyfynne bridge. David Davies says he is nearly 56 years of age and remembers the present bridge being built upwards of 40 years ago. He then lived with John Price at Tynycoed in pa. Llandinam. Was assisting in putting up the beams of the bridge on the day his sister was born. There was a bridge their previous to the present bridge being built as he remembers the old timber being about the place when the present bridge was built but cannot tell whether it was a foot bridge or not. The mark of David Davies.

Hannah Edwards says she is sister to David Davies and is the person alluded to in his evidence. She is 40 years of age since August last to the best of her belief. Hannah Edwards.

John Mason says he has been employed as working surveyor of the road from Maesmawr to Llanidloes about 30 years back. Never remembers the bridge at Clyfynne being repaired excepting once during that period and he then repaired it at the expense and by the directions of the trustees of the turnpike road from Newtown to Llanidloes.

Report of the committee held at Caersws on 23 June 1834. The committee having examined into the evidence above by which it appears that the bridge has been built upwards of 40 years and has since been repaired at the expense of the trustees of the turnpike roads are of opinion that the county is liable.

Report-bridge. [1834T7]

Pont Tynewydd on the road from Llanfair to Llanerfyl.

Thomas Edwards, blacksmith, says he is 60 years of age and has lived in the smith's shop near Tynewydd bridge all his life. Remembers the bridge being built about 50 years since. There was not any bridge before the present bridge was built but there was a pontpren for foot people to pass the brook lower down the river where the road then went. Remembers the bridge been repaired several times. Thomas Roberts.

Humphrey Tudor, farmer, remembers the bridge being built full 50 years ago and he is now 64 years of age and has lived all his life at Tynewydd. There was not any bridge before the present bridge was built except a pontpren a little lower down for foot passengers. Remembers the bridge being repaired and he carried lime and stone for the work and the late William Owen paid him from the turnpike road fund. The mark of Humphrey Tudor.

Thomas Davies, labourer, says he is now 62 years of age and has lived in pa. Llanfair all his life. Remembers the bridge being built before which there was not any bridge but a pontpren. It is now from 45 to 50 years ago. The mark of Thomas Davies.

Order. Confirmed. County surveyor authorised to expend £300 in repairing this bridge. [1834T/SO/6/144]

Report-bridge. [1834T8]

Penryllon bridge. Thomas Jones of Llandinam Hall states that he is 52 years of age and has lived at Llandinam for the last 27 years. He has heard John, son of William Payne, who built the bridge state that his father undertook to build a bridge for £10 in or about the year 1780 and he has heard Mr Payne say that previous to the building of the bridge there was not any bridge at or near Penryllon. The conversation occurred with Mr Payne in consequence of Mr Payne pointing out to Mr Jones the direction of the old road. Thomas Jones.

John Mason says that he remembers this bridge 40 years ago. The bridge has never been repaired but once since he was concerned with the road which is 30 years ago. At that time it was repaired by David Powell and was paid for by the trustees of the road from Newtown to Llanidloes. This repair took place about 14 years ago. John Mason.

The committee having examinant into the evidence above are of opinion that the county is liable to the future maintenance and repair of this bridge it appearing that the bridge has been erected upwards of 40 years and has been repaired hitherto at the expense of the trustees of the turnpike road. **Order.** Confirmed [1834T/SO/6/144]

Examination-theft. [1834T10]

31 May 1834. Examination of Thomas Duppa Lloyd of Cheney Longueville in co. Salop, farmer, taken before David Jones. Says that on looking at the prisoner James Ratcliff he knows him, and on inspecting the five sheepskins suspected to be stolen by him he identifies them as his property. That he knows the pitch mark, the raddle mark and the earmark on each, and on each of three of them there is a peculiar mark they having been stuck in the neck of which the marks remain. That examinant had placed the above five skins with others in the Cider Millhouse at Cheney Longueville aforesaid and sometime ago suspected he had lost some skins, but which suspicions were not confirmed until yesterday when he received information of the prisoner's apprehension. That examinant charges the said James Ratcliff with felonious taking the said five skins and that he never employed the said James Ratcliff as his agent for the sale of skins. Thomas Duppa Lloyd*.

29 May 1834. John Jones of Llandysul, shopkeeper, says that about 11 o'clock this morning this informant saw a person, who is now present, at the Wynnstay Arms Inn in Montgomery who said that he had sheepskins to sell. That they were five in number and enquired if there was any skinner in town and added that he supposed Mr Powell was not in town which this informant understood to mean Mr Powell, a skinner living in Welshpool. Informant was shown the skins by that same person and said he was to sell them at half a crown each. Informant upon that said that the skins were not worth the money and then offered him 18d each for them upon which they closed the bargain at that price and delivered up the skins to this informant who then paid 7s 6d for them. Some further conversation passed between informant and the person who sold the skins as to the price he first put on them and informant was told by him that he was to sell them for Mr Lloyd of the Grove near Craven Arms at that price. Informant enquired if there was any person in town who knew him and informant was referred to a female higler then in the market. That person afterwards told informant that his name was James Ratcliff and that he lived at Hordley near Craven Arms Inn. John Jones*. George Davies, one of the sergeants-at-mace of the borough of Montgomery, says that on the last market day, Thursday 29 May, he was informed in the said market by John Jones of Llandysul, shopkeeper, that he had purchased five sheepskins of a man whom this examinant now recognises as James Ratcliff the prisoner. That in pursuance of this information this examinant took possession of the said skins which are those now produced and has ever since retained the same. George Davies*.

Cemaes bridge, 25 January 1834. Jane Jones says that she is upwards of 56 years of age and has lived in Cemaes during the whole of her life. Remembers the small bridge in the village being built about 45 years

ago before which time there was not anything more than a foot bridge and that lower down the stream. Examination-theft. [1834T13]

1 May 1834. The examination of Elizabeth, wife of Richard Harris of Cil, pa. Berriew, sawyer, taken before Thomas Beck. Says that about three o'clock yesterday evening examinant went to a neighbour's house and that she locked the door and put the key into her pocket, and that she returned about five o'clock and did not discover any wrong in the house. That's about eight o'clock last night her husband returned from his work and asked examinant for some soap to wash his hands. That's examinant lighted a candle and went into the milkhouse to fetch the soap which she did not find and upon looking at the window she found that the laths or lattice had been broken. That examinant informed her husband of the circumstance and they then inspected the house and found that examinant's best cotton gown had been stolen from the chest upstairs, a silk handkerchief from the drawer of a dressing table in the same room and also that some roast veal and what remained of two puddings had been stolen from a cupboard. That examinant was informed by a little girl (who said she had been at examinant's house in her absence) that she had seen a woman going from examinant's husband's house of whom she gave examinant a description and which she communicated to her husband. That the articles now produced by William Morris, the cotton gown, silk handkerchief, ribbon and cap edging, and part of a shaving box are the property of examinant and her said husband and were stolen from her husband's house as aforesaid. The mark of Elizabeth Harris.

Richard Harris of Cil in pa. Berriew says that examinant's wife having informed him that a woman had been seen at the house yesterday during her absence and that she had gone from the house in the direction of Welshpool, he this morning came to Welshpool and gave information of the robbery to William Morris, one of the constables of Welshpool who went with examinant to several lodging houses in Welshpool. That they found her in bed at house kept by one the Jane Hughes as he has been informed and upon the constable inspecting a bundle which he found in the room where she lay in her pocket the articles now produced and which have been identified by examinant's wife were found and that examinant swears that the gown, handkerchief and lid of a shaving box part of the articles now produced are is property. The mark of Richard Harris.

William Morris, constable of Welshpool, says that the prosecutor came to examnant this morning and informed him of the robbery and also gave him a description of the prisoner who he said that from

information which he had received he suspected of having committed it. That examinant went immediately to several lodging rooms in Welshpool accompanied by the prosecutor in search of the prisoner and between 7 and 8 o'clock this morning he found the prisoner in bed at the house of Jane Hughes. That upon entering the room in which the prisoner lay examinant saw a bundle upon a table which he laid hold of and asked the prisoner if it belonged to her. That the prisoner answered examinant in Welsh which he could not understand and findng that the prisoner was a Welsh woman he called the said Jane Hughes up stairs to inform the prisoner that he would have tosee what was in the bundle. That examinant then proceeded to open the bundle upon which the prisoner jumped out od bed and laid hold of it and resolutely endeavoured to wrest it from the examinant but she failed. That having opened the bundle examinant it did contain among other things the gown, the lid of a shaving box with a glass in it and the piece of soap now produced which the prosecutor indentified as his property and that examinant also found in the bundle the caps now produced and that in the pocket which he found under the bolster of the bed on which the prisoner lay he found wrapped up in a rag the silk handkerchief now produced. William Morris*.

Examination-damage. [1834T15]

6 May 1834.The examination of Mary, wife of Arthur Evans of New house in pa. Tregynon, weaver, taken before G.A. Evors. Says that yesterday between four and five o'clock in the evening she was in her own house with her infant child. That she saw the prisoners approaching the house and went down stairs and fastened the door. That the prisoners knocked at the door, shook it and tried the catch. They then left the house and went to a neighbour's house about 300 or 400 yards distant. That the prisoners then returned and tried the door as before. That she then heard the glass of the window break and deponent then came down and saw some pieces of glass in one of the prisoner's hands. That she asked the prisoner what he would do with the glass upon which he brought it her. That she again asked him why he broke the window to which he replied that she did not answer them. That the prisoners did not call or demand admission from deponent. That the prisoners then went away and deponent as they were going off told them they might be caught sooner than expected. The mark of Mary Evans.

One of the prisoners James Davidson being called for his defence. Says that he was born in the town of Berwick-on-Tweed. That he was bound to the sea service when twelve years of age. That he served about five years and was then pressed into a man-of-war. That he continued in the sea service untl six months when he left his ship at Swansea. That since that time he has subsisted by begging. James Davidson*. John Christian , prisoner, being called upon for his defence. Says that he was born in the town of Douglas in the Isle of Man. That he served an apprenticeship to a saddler for seven years. That he served last at his trade with his old master in the Isle of Man whom he left two months since. That he has snce subsisted by begging. John Christian*.

And the following rule having been laid before the justices viz., "No depositor after 20 November 1833 will be allowed to invest in this bank more than £30 in the year whether such money shall have been previously withdrawn or not, reckoning from 28 November to 28 November". Examinations-theft. [1834T24]

21 June 1834. The examination of William Tilsley of the town of Welshpool, currier, taken before Thomas Beck and Thomas Davies. Says that on Tuesday last examinant went into his store room to fetch some leather to supply a customer who was then in the shop; the way to which storeroom is through Mr Morris the

mercer's stable. That examinant closed the door upon leaving the storeroom but he did not lock it till about seven or eight o'clock that evening. That examinant upon going into the storeroom on Thursday discovered that a quantity of sole leather had been cut from a part of a hide and stolen. That the prisoner who as examinant has been informed is a shoemaker by trade and has for some time been employed by Mr Morris the mercer to look after his horses and he was engaged in the stable and the yard on Tuesday. Examinant therefore suspected the prisoner to have committed a felony. That he vesterday obtained a warrant to search the prisoner's premises and about three o'clock in the evening the constables brought the prisoner together with some pieces of leather which the constable said he had found in the prisoner's house to examinant's shop. That upon comparing them with the part of the hide some of the pieces exactly fitted the part from whence they have been cut and the pieces also correspond with the part of the hide in colour. That the prisoner upon hearing examinant say that he would swear that the pieces of leather found in the prisoner's house were his property voluntarily confessed that he had stolen them and said that he was very drunk when he did it and begged of examinant to forgive him and he would pay for the leather. That the leather now produced by John Roberts the constable examinant swears to be his property and to have been stolen from his storeroom as aforesaid, and that he believes the quantity stolen to be about a pound or a pound and a half and to be of the value of 2s to 3s. William Tilsley*.

John Roberts of Welshpool, one of the constables of the borough, says that yesterday evening a warrant was delivered to him to search the prisoner's house. That examinant having procured assistance went to the prisoner's house in Welshpool and found the prisoner at home. That examinant informed the prisoner of the object of their visit who said that they were welcome to search his house. That examinant proceeded to search the room (used as a kitchen and bedroom) but he did not find any leather. That examinant asked the prisoner if he had any leather in the house who said that he had. That examinant desired the prisoner to let him see it upon which the prisoner went into a small dark room adjoining the one which examinant had searched and brought the pieces of leather now produced which examinant seized together with the prisoner's person. That examinant question the prisoner as to how he had possessed himself with the leather who said that he had purchased a part of it from the old Mr Jones the currier and the remainder he had bought off the young Mr Jones. That examinant conveyed the prisoner and the pieces of leather to the prosecutor's shop where he compared the pieces which he had taken from the prisoner with the piece which the prosecutor said that the leather had been stolen from, three of which pieces exactly fitted the part from whence they had been taken. That the leather which had been stolen and cut-off in a very slovenly awkward manner the edges being much snaggled and from the circumstance of the pieces of leather which he had taken from the prisoner filling up and matching the part in the prosecutor's shop and exactly corresponding colour examinant is able to swear that the pieces of leather taken from the prisoner as aforesaid were a part of the leather which he saw in the prosecutor's shop. That the prisoner without any threat being made or any promise held out to him voluntarily confessed to the prosecutor in examinant's presence and hearing that he had stolen the leather alleging that he was drunk at the time he did it and hope that the prosecutor would forgive him and that he would paid him for it. And that the pieces of leather now produced are those which he received from the prisoner as aforesaid. John Roberts*.

They also recommend the addition of the four sleeping rooms over the female ward and which are now occupied by the male debtors for the use of the women prisoners. The county surveyor reports that this arrangement can be effected by making a staircase from the women's day room and the present passage from the debtors ward can be built up so as to cut off all communication. The expense of these alterations are estimated by the county surveyor at $\pounds 150$, and the visiting justices strongly urge to the court that directions should be given to the surveyor to cause these additions to be immediately completed. In consequence of the appropriation of the women's court to a different purpose to that for which it had been originally intended it becomes necessary that hood blinds should be placed before the windows of such of the debtor's rooms and passages as now communicate with the court for females in order to prevent any intercourse taking place between them and we request that the county surveyor may be directed to put up blinds of this description over all the windows opening into the court for females as also make a partition of planks in a line with the division wall so as to prevent that communication which is not now sufficiently done.

I went after him to Liverpool and begged for a settling with him as much as possible, but he never did from that day to this. I went to an attorney there and my answer from him was that he was such a man that he would have nothing to do with him. I went after him again from thence to Hereford and begged again for a settling but all in vain. I employed there an attorney but he like the former gave me the same denial that he would not have nothing to do with such a character, so I am robbed from $\pounds 16$ to $\pounds 18$ by him and can have no redress except your honour and the rest of the magistrates may be pleased to take compassion upon me and I humbly beg that the penalty due to my crime may be mitigated in consideration of myself being so injured by him that I have been often reduced to hunger and starvation on account of him. I humbly beg for Gods sake that your honour may be pleased to look upon me in the midst of judgement and that eternity will be long enough to reward you when time shall be no more is the earnest prayers of your humble servant, Edward Dodd*, Montgomery.

Examination-theft. [1834M36]

13 October 1834. Examination of Richard Evans of Gwestyn, pa. Llangurig, labourer, taken before Thomas Price. Says I am the servant and shepherd of John Jones of Nantyrhebog. In October last I lost a lamb then

six months old belonging to my master from amongst his flock while depasturing on his sheep walk. Though the flock consisted of about 12 score of sheep and lambs together yet I discovered the loss of the above lamb without counting the flock because it was a lamb that I had always taken particular notice of by reason of its dam being the last of a lot of sheep that my master had from Caermeirch in Cardiganshire, and it was so different in its general appearance from the rest as to be readily distinguishable by me. About a fortnight after I missed it, I saw it again early one morning amongst my master's sheep but not with its dam. I brought it to its dam we immediately took it. When lost it had my master's earmark but on finding it (that is after it had been missed for a fortnight) I perceived that its earmark was altered so as to resemble the earmark of the sheep of the prisoner Edward Hugh who lives near my master's sheep walk, and the lamb was also pitchmarked like the prisoner's with the prisoner's initial letters. I left the lamb with its dam and went to my breakfast and on my returning in about an hour found both missing. The dam had returned by the following morning but not the lamb which I did not see again till sometime in May last when I founded it again amongst my master's flock on his sheep walk bearing the pitch mark and earmark of the prisoner as before and the lamb being produced and shown to me by Jarman the constable I perceive the same marks yet remain and the prisoners sheep earmarks are precisely alike ... in the near ear, the off year of my master's having a hole and a swallow a mark in it called a carre (in carre is a common mark but I never knew of a hole being cut in the same ear as is the case in the lamb produced) difference between my master's and the prisoners earmark will be better understood by the imitation of each which I now produce. Part of my master's earmark ... very discernible in that ear of the lamb in which the carre is cut and I'm confident the lamb in question is my master's. From the time of the return of the lamb in May she remained on the sheep walk till about two or three months ago, the time of shearing. I then collected my master's sheep form the walk in order to their being shorn and finding a deficiency in their number and that the lamb was not amongst those I had gathered in I went on the following day or in a day or two to the sheepwalk and then and there saw the lamb and several other sheep of my master's. In two of three days time I gathered them all in except the lamb which was then shorn and took them to my master's to shear. After my master's sheep were shorn they were turned again on their walk and the lamb and several sheep of the prisoner were there all newly pitch marked with the prisoner's mark amongst my master's sheep on his walk. I informed my master of this fact. The prisoner's sheep often trespassed on my master's sheep walk. The lamb was not shorn by my master. About a fortnight after the shearing I, at the request of Mr Rowlands, my master's son-in-law, gathered some sheep in from my master's sheep walk and among them the lamb in question and some sheep of the prisoner's, and I went to the prisoner and desired him to come to the building and select and take his sheep away. He came accordingly and with me and Mr Rowlands went into the building where the sheep were. Rowlands asked the prisoner to pick out his sheep but he being lame I, at his request, did it for him, and immediately afterwards asked Mr Rowlands to look amongst my master's sheep to see if there were any more belonging to the prisoner. Rowlands said there is one more with Edwards' pitch mark and Rowlands desired me to catch it and I did so and turned her down with others when Rowlands stopped it and said to Edward Hugh is it yours, and he replied that it was. And on Mr Rowlands saying to him that it was his my master's, the prisoner said "if you will have anybody to swear it is yours take her. The lamb was given into the custody of Jarman the constable. The prisoner admitted to me that the pitch mark on the lamb was the same as his own pitch mark but I do not recollect what he said about the earmark. Rowlands asked the prisoner if it was he that had shorn the lamb and the prisoner answered that he did not know whether he had or not. The mark of Richard Evans. William Rowlands of Nantyrhebog says that about the end of July last I desired Richard Evans, the shepherd of my father-in-law, John Jones of Nantyrhebog to gather in certain sheep that were then my father in law's sheep walk at Gwestyn, and amongst them some belonging to the prisoner Edward Hugh that were then on the walk. Next morning I met the prisoner and Richard Evans at a building at Gwestyn where the sheep were, when Richard Evans picked out the sheep that belonged to the prisoner and asked me to look if there were any more. I pointed out the lamb that Richard Evans has spoken of in his examination and said to the prisoner "Oh,Edward here is one more marked HE, is it yours", and the prisoner repeatedly said it was. I asked him if he used to punch both ears and he said no. I then pointed out to him the mark, I mean the hole, in the ear, in which the carre was, and said to the prisoner "well, old boy what you think of this?". He made no answer. I said the lamb was my father-in-law's and prisoner said "if you have anybody to prove it you shall have it, what more do you want". I said to the prisoner HE is not your name, he answered "but it is the pitch mark that we used to have". Do you said I shear all those that are marked HE and he said yes we do. I asked the prisoner twice if he was sure the lamb was this and he said he was sure and that he used to depasture by the Gors on Penybank. I again requested him to be positive whether she was his or not and he repeated he was certain it was is for that he knew she was a little lamb. I asked him if he used to cut a hole in the ear before cutting the carre and he said no. I asked him with what did he cut the hole in the ear and he

answered it was with a knife or a punch. I then pointed out to him the head of the lamb and asked him what do you think of this piercing to both ears. Prisoner made no reply. William Rowlands*. Richard Jarman of Cefnpenarth in pa. Llanidloes. Says that about two months ago I heard that Mr Jones of Nantyrhebog made a charge against the prisoner for sheep stealing and meeting the prisoner soon afterwards I said to him (and alluding to what I had heard) "now old chap you have been brought in at last". He replied "think so". I rejoined "how could you do that, you made a great fool of yourself". "Well" said he "I think I did, Rowlands was there holding the sheep", holding one ear in his hand. That the ear he had not held of did the agree with his (prisoner's) mark. The prisoner confessed that it was his lamb. Richard Jarman*.

Show by an act passed in 3, 4 William IV reciting that there was not a sufficient number of commissioners for the relief of insolvent debtors to enable them to extend their circuits to the Principality of Wales of which grievance among others complaints had been made it was enacted that it should be lawful for your Majesty by commission under the great Seal to authorise and their next the judges of the court of bankruptcy to act as commissioners for the relief of insolvent debtors and that it should be lawful for the relief of insolvent debtors to order and direct that the petition of any prisoners for debts in any gaol should be heard by any commissioners of the said last mentioned court or judge of the court bankruptcy, who showed for that purpose have and exercise all the power, authority and privileges what ever by law rested in such commissioners severally in circuit in England.

That no such commission has hitherto issued by reason whereof the petitions of insolvent debtors within the principality of Wales continue to be heard by the magistrates of the several counties of the said principality

at their respective quarter sessions. That it is highly desirable that the cases of such insolvent debtors in Wales should be decided by the same judges and on the same principles as in England.

That your Majesty's petitioners acting as magistrates are wholly unacquainted with the rules and practice of the insolvent court and are in consequence obliged to determine such cases according to their on discretion and ideas of equity and that they have no seal by which they can apportion the additional imprisonment to be awarded in the event of any misconduct being proved against such debtors by your opposing creditors. That your petitioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased in pursuance of the powers vested in you by the said act to issue a commission to the end that the court for relief of insolvent debtors may be enabled to extend their circuit into Wales and not thereby the inhabitants of Wales may be relieved from the grievances complained of.

Jane Whittaker says that she knows the hen now produced and believes her to be deponent's father in law's property. That on Monday night last James Evans came into William Reynolds's house and said that the first time he saw the hen was on a bag of malt upstairs and it scratched the malt about. That about three weeks last

Monday when he first saw the hen he said he would never screw her neck off. That Evans said the hen was taken away and brought back into a three days when she was put to roost in his back premises. That he said he had asked his son where he bought the hen who replied that he bought for 8d from a boy near the canal. The mark of Jane Whittaker.

Elizabeth Reynolds says that the hen now produced is her father Edward Whittaker's property. That the hen was lost about three weeks since. But on Monday last the hen was brought to her father's house by her brother. The mark of Elizabeth Rowlands.

Says that on 9 July the prisoner brought to examinant's shop the double-barrelled percussion gun now produced by Richard Ganderton. That examinant was then taking his tea having left his servant maid in care of the shop. That his servant brought the gun to examinant in the kitchen and informed him that a person wished to pledge it and that the person wanted 30 shillings upon it. That examinant had previously received a description of a gun and certain other articles which he had been desired to detain in case they should be offered to be pledged at his shop as well as the person offering the same. That finding the gun to correspond with the description that had been given him he went into the shop and asked the prisoner if the gun was his who said that it was. That examinant followed and seized the prisoner and conducted him into a small parlour where examinant detained him until a constable whom examinant had sent for had arrived, upon whose arrival examinant delivered the prisoner and gun over to him. Robert Lucas*.

11 September 1834. The examination of John Evans of the Borough of Montgomery, mason, taken before Maurice Lloyd. That he was yesterday assisting in the apprehension of James Corbett for breaking and entering the dwelling house of Thomas Matthews. But after the said James Corbett was apprehended and when on their way to Montgomery, he the said James Corbett told this examinant that he had been at the Gaer and was returning back again and that he had met with a strange man near the said Thomas Matthews's house who enquired of him (Corbett) who lived at the Redhouse above pointing to Matthews's, and offered him (Corbett) a shilling if he would go to that house and bring him some meat for he was very hungry, and that some strange man gave him a small pocket knife and sold the said James Corbett to go to the back window of the said Thomas Matthews's house and open that window and fetch him some victuals out. That Corbett took the knife and went to the window and took a pane of glass out of it. That he took a small bottle out of the place but on his hearing something he started off and took the bottle with him and left the knife on the ledge of the window, and that he after proceeding up the road some distance heard somebody call after him, and as soon as he got out of sight, he threw the bottle in a field. That the said James Corbett informed this examinant of the above circumstances voluntarily and without being asked to confess or making use of any threats or promises to induce him to do so. The mark of John Evans.

Examination-theft. [1834M70]

4 September 1834. The examination of Frederik Tye of Mochdre, shepherd, taken before William Pugh. Says that last Newtown cattle fair he was told by John Edwards of Geufron that he had a lamb belonging to Mr Brown of Bronllan with his sheep. That he went for the lamb to Edwards' and before he went to the house he saw the lamb. That he was assisted to catch the lamb by Edwards and this deponent positively swears that the ear mark and pitch mark on the lamb were those of Mr Brown. That Edwards carried the lamb part of the way and deponent brought the lamb to Mr Brown's that evening. That the lamb now produced is the lamb brought from Edwards. That 50 lands with the 50 ewes came up to the hill in May and four afterwards that deponent counted the 50 ewes and 54 lands that two were earmarked at the ... and four were ... upon the hill and not earmarked till sheep shearing ... is the lamb bought from Edwards. The mark of Frederik Tye. Thomas Brown the younger of Mochdre, farmer, says that the ear mark and pitch mark on the lamb now produced are those of Mr Brown of Bronllan. That he saw about Summer Fair two ... his father's ground. That he did not see the lamb now produced with Mr Brown's sheep but he did see a lamb unpitched and

unmarked with them about three weeks old but had no marks on ... like the lamb now produced. Thomas Brown.

David Davies of Mochdre says that he met John Edwards and told him that he saw on the hill two ewes having a lamb that when he first saw them the lamb was not marked, that this was before shearing time, but that when he saw them the second time the lamb was marked with two IIs to the best of this belief. That the earmark of the lamb was cropped one ear and split and a half spittle mark the other ear. That it was after sheep shearing time when he saw the lamb the second time. That he had then no horns. That this lamb was real white faced having no horns, and not grimed? with horns the same as the lamb now produced. That he had seen the white faced and no horned lamb the day before he talked with John Edwards which was after shearing time and after Mr Brown had shorn his sheep but not before he had shorn his lamb. That the day he talked with John Edwards he helped him to take the two ewes and lamb away. That the lamb was without horns and white faced. The mark of David Davies.

William Davies of Llanbadarn Fynydd says that on Wednesday last year heard a conversation between David Davies and John Edwards at Esgairgeiliog. That he believes David Davies said that he saw two ewes come down from a bank towards Mr Brown's sheep and that a lamb singled out from Mr Brown's flock and went to suck one of the ewes. That he will not positively swear such to be the words. William Davies*.

Examination-theft. [1834M71]

10 September 1834. The information of Thomas Matthews of Caerhowell, millwright, taken before Maurice Lloyd. Says that between the hours of 11 and 12 in the daytime of yesterday 9 September he was lying down on a bed in his dwelling house at Caerhowel being unwell, and in consequence of having heard some noise as if a person was removing some heavy articles in the room immediately underneath informant's bedroom where he was there on the bed, he was roused up, and on looking through his bedroom window informant saw a man passing along the back part of his house towards the highway there, and in is passing from his bedroom into his kitchen he saw from the kitchen window which fronts the highway that some person passing along in front of his house towards Caerhowell Inn up the same highway. Informant immediately opened his kitchen door and called out to that person and said to him "my man what have you been doing down below", meaning at the back part of informant's house but he made no answer and ran off. That person then wore a white straw hat with a blue ribbon round it, a smock frock open in front and a pair of trousers. Informant followed that person for some distance but soon lost sight of him in consequence of informant being unwell. Informant then returned to his house and on examining it he found that a pane of glass had been taken out of the back window of the pantry of his house and that when informant first saw the said man at the back of his house that same man was within about 2 yards from the said window and in the act of returning from it. Informant thinks he was on the bed about two hours and is quite certain that the window was whole when he went on the bed. The lead of the window appeared as if rose up with some instrument, and the glass was broken into pieces and placed on the sill of the same window. Informant on further examination found that a bottle of catsup had been taken out of his pantry from the seat of that window and also that a large jointure plane had been removed from a shelf in the pantry down on the floor by means of a hooked stick, they being both on the pantry floor. On enquiry from different persons as to the identity of that man he has good cause to suspect and do suspect that the said man is James Corbett (the son of John Corbett of Cefn-y-coed) of tp. Goetre in pa. Kerry. Informants further says that he this 10 September went to the said John Corbett's house in company with Simon Corfield of Cefn-y-coed, and this informant there saw the same man whom he saw yesterday at his house and that the said Simon Corfield well knows the said James Corbett and told this informant that the man whom this informant pointed out to him as the person who was at his house yesterday, was the said James Corbett. And this informant charges the said James Corbett with burglariously breaking and entering his dwelling house and stealing one jointure plane and one pint bottle of catsup. Thomas Matthews*.

house last night and called for ale and the prisoner threw down a quantity of sovereigns and silver on the kitchen floor and table which excited deponent's suspicion. But the prisoner was then in liquor. That deponent prevailed upon the prisoner to deliver him up the money for safe custody until morning amounting to $\pm 20 \ 2s \ 10 \ \frac{1}{2}$ d. That the watch now produced he received from Jacob Davies about seven o'clock this morning who informed deponent that he received it from the prisoner, Davies having been sent by deponent to the prisoner who was in another room for the watch and Davies accordingly brought it to deponent. That he has 19 sovereigns and a half. 3s 6d in his possession being the money so delivered to him by the prisoner. Andrew Breese*.

The voluntary confesson of John Holloway the prisoner who says that the watch now produced he bought from David Lewis for three half-crowns and half a sovereign. That he is living at Guilsfield with his father David Holloway who is a timber merchant. That his father sent him down to Shrewsbury to receive £2 from the widow of a Mr Morris and which money he received. That he is a coachmaker residing in Pride Hill. That he had no business to buy the watch but did so. That he received the money from Mr Morris on Friday morning last. The mark of John Holloway.

Report on the state of Llandrinio bridge.

The general state of this bridge and the foundations of the piers and abutments is satisfactory but the river has a tendency to accumulate a deposit on the eastern side in as much that the passage through the land arch in that side is completely filled and the opposite bank is cut away by the stream and the foundation of the

western abutment may thereby be endangered. In order to protect this abutment it will be requisite to build a returning water wing above the bridge for sixteen yards in length and thirteen feet and half high above the low water level the same to be returned in the bank and a loose stone water fence formed from the end of this work for twenty-four yards in length finished at the upper end with a breakwater projecting into the river as far as can be without impeding the navigation of the river. Should the breakwater be formed I am of opinion it will in the progress of time cut away the deposit in the eastern side of the river and as this is effected the projection of the breakwater may be extended by which the further opening of the land arch on the eastern side will be facilitated. I have further to report that having carefully observed the effect of on the river upon its banks near this bridge for several years I do not apprehend any immediate danger to the bridge still I am of opinion it would be inexpedient to allow another summer to pass by without taking measures to secure the bridge. 10 October 1834. It will also be necessary to embank the present roadway from the pump in the High street to the bridge and from the bridge to the level of the steps leading into the churchyard as is shown upon the plan accompanying this report. Such improvements if carried into effect will be of great advantage to this approach through the town of Welshpool into the country. The length of the archway to be made over the brook up the stream to Mr Maurice Jones's yard is about 61 feet and the length of the archway down the stream to the entrance into the Bull Inn yard is about 50 feet and will probably cost about £155. The brick culvert for conveying the channel water as proposed if on one side only will costs $\pounds 24$. To make the embankment on the west end of the bridge opposite the Bull Inn it seems to be necessary to have the consent of the owner of that property. The cost of the embankment on each side of the bridge and metalling the road will be about £48 making the whole expense amount to about $\pounds 227$, which with the contingencies in altering the doors and approaches to the properties adjoining will be probably increased to the sum of $\pounds 240$. It is represented to the committee that a subscription amounting to about £40 will be furnished by parties interested in this improvement in aid of it. The committee beg to suggest to the Court the expediency of giving to the committee the necessary powers enabling them to take such steps as may be requisite to carry into effect the improvement in the manner proposed and authorise them to draw upon the county treasurer for a sum not exceeding £200 for this purpose.

Report-bridges. [1835H26]

Bausley and Criggion bridges. At a meeting of the committee appointed to make further enquiries as to the reliability of the county to maintain these bridges, held on 17 December 1834. Present: S Baldwin Leighton, John Russell, John James Turner, James Proud Johnson.

Richard Pritchard of Llandrinio, freeholder, says he is 79 years of age and has lived in Llandrinio and and Llandysilio all his lifetime. Remembers the line of the road embanked between the bridge on the River Severn at Llandrinio through tp. Criggion to Bausley about 60 years ago or upwards previous to the road being ... there were not any bridges on the line of road. At the time the embankment was made the four

bridges between the Severn and Bausley were built and he believes they were built at the expense of the trustees of the turnpike road who has since repaired them. There is a stream running under the bridge which divides tp. Bausley and Criggion called the Newtown? brook and a stream running under the next bridge near Mr ...'s house called the Criggion brook. There is not any stream running under either of the two bridges as they are only ... to admit the backwater and drainage to the best of his belief. He ... remember any repairs being made to such as are done by the trustees of the turnpike road.

The committee having heard this evidence and having examined the bridges beg to report to the Q.S. their opinion that the two bridges called Bausley and Criggion should be repaired and maintained at the expense of the county. The committee also are opinion that the county is not liable to maintain the two bridges in the embankment between Llandrinio bridge and the last mentioned bridges as it appears to the committee that there is not any natural stream running under them but are land arches for carrying off the floods. It appears to the committee that the state of Bausley bridge requires immediate attention.

Examination-theft. [1835H28]

10 November 1834. The examination of Maria Richards, the wife of Samuel Richards of Welshpool, sadler, taken before John D. Corrie and John Robinson Jones. Proves that on Saturday evening last about six o'clock the prisoner Cooper came to witnesses' house with a piece of cloth now produced and asked witness to make it into shirts for him. Examinant told him to call again when he was sober he being then drunk. About a quarter of an hour afterwards the prisoner came again to her house and asked her for the cloth as there was a row about it. Immediately afterwards Samuel Davies came in and examinant gave the cloth to him. The mark of Maria Richards.

Mary, wife of John Newell the prosecutor, innkeeper, says that in July last she deposited in the screen of her kitchen a piece of cloth for shirting called Suffolk hempen cloth from which she had previously cut as much as would make for shirts for her husband, and at the time she so placed it there it was dirtied at one end from having been blown off a hedge where it had been put to dry. Examinant has seen it in the same place many times since. Examinant has looked at the piece of cloth now produced in the possession of Samuel Davies and the marks thereon correspond with those on the piece of cloth so deposited by her on her screen as before mentioned and witness has not the least doubt that it is the same cloth and is the property of her husband John Newell. That she gave 2s a yard for it. Mary Newell*.

Evans laid hold of Kinsey and attempted to drag him away from the constables and attempted to collect a crowd of idle persons to assist him, but the constables succeeded in retaining Kinsey. Newtown, labourer, for attempting to rescue Evan Kinsey out of the custody of William Blenkhorn and Benjamin Baxter whilst the said constables were on the night of 18 November last in the act of conveying the said Evan Kinsey to the lock-up house for disorderly conduct in the streets of Newtown.

Examination-theft. [1835H30]

10 November 1834. Examination of Samuel Davies of Welshpool, sergeant-at-mace, taken before John D. Corrie and John Robinson Jones. Says that on Saturday evening last he was informed that part of a piece of shirting cloth had been taken from the screen in the Wheatsheaf kitchen in Welshpool, the property of John Newell and that the prisoner Thomas Cooper of Welshpool, labourer, was suspected of having stolen the same. That in consequence of this information examinant then went to the Wheatsheaf aforesaid where he found the prisoner in the kitchen asleep. That examinant awoke the prisoner and took him into the parlour and charged him with having stolen the cloth and he also asked the prisoner whether another person who is suspected had had anything to do with the felony, upon which the prisoner said that he had not and that if examinant would go with him he would give him the cloth. That examinant accordingly accompanied the prisoner to the house of Samuel Richards of Welshpool, saddler, and the prisoner went in and said to Richards's wife, "there is a row about that cloth, give it to me". That she said I expected there would and went upstairs and brought down the piece of cloth now produced which she gave to examinant. That as examinant and the prisoner were returning from Richards's house examinant said to the prisoner that he must put him in the crib. That the prisoner begged of examinant not to put him in the crib until Mr Newell should come home and added that he had taken the cloth out of the screen at the Wheatsheaf and as he had given it back he thought there would be nothing more said about it. That examinant conveyed the prisoner to the crib and yesterday morning he said to examinant that he had robbed the best friend he had got. That the piece of cloth now produced is the same which he received from the wife of Samuel Richards in the presence of the prisoner. Samuel Davies*.

About 5 minutes after Rogers passed them she heard a great noise amongst Mr Jones's geese at his house and one appeared by the noise to have been caught. That in less than 5 minutes after she saw the prisoner coming up the lane back when she stood behind a post and when he came up to her she saw that he had a goose under his left arm covered in part by his smock frock and with a mop stick under the same arm and he held the beak of the goose in his right hand. That she seized the goose and took her from the prisoner when he ran away. She is quite sure that the prisoner is the person as it was a frosty star-lit morning and she had seen him several times before. She sent her daughter to Mr Jones to inform him of the goose having been stolen and soon after Mr Jones's servant, John Twist, came to her and she delivered the goose to him and another of Mr Jones's servants. The mark of Mary Davies.

Thomas Davies of Burgedin, boatman, says he has been on the canal many years and that the prisoner Timothy Rogers has been boating on the canal for several years for different persons and examinant has known him well having often talked with him for the last five or six years. That one of his geese had been stolen early in the morning of Sunday 12 October and he and his wife and daughter went to the Dragon Bridge on the canal in search of the thief, and when they were on the bridge a person who they could not well see passed down towards Mr Jones's house, soon after they heard geese at Mr Jones's making a noise and in about 10 minutes examinant saw the same person returning up the lane to the bridge with the goose under his arm which examinant's wife and daughter took from him and he ran away. But by the dress and cap of the person examinant thought it was the prisoner and saw him the following Tuesday morning at Mr Pickering's wharf at Ruabon in his master's boat, and charged him with stealing his goose but which the prisoner denied and added I did not steal yours it was only old Jones's. When the examinant said Mr Jones would ... dry-footed for the winter for it on the prisoner replied he did not care for that. The mark of Thomas Davies.

Elizabeth Davies says she is the daughter of Mary Davies the last witness and says that she swears the same as her mother. That she was close to her mother when she took the goose from Timothy Rogers the prisoner and knew him well he having lived with Watkin Jones her neighbour for some time and was his boatman. That examinant and her father ran down the canal towing path after him but could not overtake him. That the stick the prisoner had under his arm when her mother took the goose from him was a mop stick with the large nail that had passed the mop head on the end of it. Elizabeth Davies*.

The prisoner, Timothy Rogers, says he had been drinking at Humphrey Roberts's beer shop in Burgedin from about five o'clock on Saturday evening till about one o'clock on Sunday morning and was very drunk and does not know what he did. The mark of Timothy Rogers.

Examinations-theft. [1835H75]

4 November 1834. The information and complaint of John Sparrow of Welshpool, taken before John D. Corrie, John Robinson Jones. Says that yesterday morning about 12 o'clock returning from his field when he got near home he heard someone calling to him and when he got into his timber yard he saw William Davies of Welshpool, wheelwright, there was also William Davies, sawyer, and William Jones, workmen of complainant. Davies the wheelwright told complainant he wanted some elm coffin boards. Examinant then sold him some boards and a slab but whilst Davies was looking out the slab Davies the sawyer called examinant into the cabin adjoining a sawpit in the yard and informed him that his wife had seen prisoner taking a board down complainant's yard. That prisoner paid complainant for what he himself had sold but said nothing about the board Davies had taken from yard in the morning. That to the best of his belief the board now produced is his property and that he never sold that to the prisoner. John Sparrow*. William Davies of Welshpool, sawyer, says that he is a workman of Mr Sparrow and has been so for 15 years. Was informed by witnesses' wife yesterday morning that she had seen William Davies the prisoner taking a board from the yard adjoining Mr Sparrow's yard that morning and walk off with it under his arm towards his own house. That's some time afterwards William Davies came to Mr Sparrow's yard and purchased some elm boards from Mr Sparrow. But whilst the bargain was going on deponent called his master aside and informed him of what his wife had before told witness, namely that Davies had carried off a piece of board from his premises that morning. That William went by his master's directions to Davies's house to see if he could find the piece of board so stated to have been carried from Mr Sparrow's premises. That he went accordingly and found the piece of board now produced. It was ... up in the workshop against the hall and behind a piece of timber that was there. That having told his master what he had seen he was directed by Mr Sparrow to go again to Davies's and fetch the piece of board away. He went there accordingly and brought it away and gave it to Evan Thomas, one of the sergeants-at-mace who met him in company with his master. About half an hour afterwards the prisoner Davies came to witnesses' house and asked witness why he took that board away. That he meant to pay for it and asked witness if he would come with him to Mr Sparrow to try to make it up. Witness declined to do so. To the best of witness's believe the piece of board now produced and which is the same that he found at the prisoner's is the property of his master Mr Sparrow. William Davies*.

Sarah, wife of William Davies, sawyer, says that yesterday morning about 11 o'clock she was going for a tin of water to the brook which runs by the bottom of Mr Sparrow's yard, the prisoner was going the same way some distance before her, not a public road only one from Mr Sparrow's tenants. She saw him stoop down and pick up a board and went towards his own house with it. That the road from which the board was taken adjoined Mr Sparrow's yard. The mark of Sarah Davies.

We inspected the gaol on Wednesday last and found that the alterations recommended and ordered in the females' apartments and in the debtors court had been completed and that the observations in the criminal prisoners court and the gaoler's privy will be completed in a few days. And we believe when these alterations are finished that the prison will be safe and complete.

Upon the representation and application of the chaplain we have ordered a fresh supply of English and Welsh Bibles, Testaments and prayer books for the chapel and the use of the prisoners.

We recommend that a small stable and a straw shed be built near the gaol for the use of the official persons and officers of the gaol and the gaoler. And we recommend that the road from the turnpike road to the jail be completed.

It was verbally reported to the last Q.S. by us that the Home Secretary would recommend Ann Roberts who was sentenced to 7 years transportation to confinement in the penitentiary instead of transportation if her illegitimate child which was born in the gaol was not sent with her. The prisoner is willing to part with the child but as the friends of the prisoner will not consent to take the child we request the opinion of the court whether we are empowered to send a child to its parish in Flintshire under the 5GeorgeIV c.85 s.22 and 23 and whether the expense of conveying the child will be paid by this county.

Order. Report confirmed. The visiting justices are empowered to remove the child accordingly and to appoint a proper person for carrying it to its said parish and the expenses incurred to be paid by the county treasurer. [1835H/SO/6/208-9]

John Johnson says that on Monday night 17 October he saw John Williams the younger take a watch from the person of Richard Turner at the New Inn in the village of Kerry whilst the said Richard Turner was asleep. John Johnson*.

Richard Turner says that a watch belonging to him was stolen from his person during the time he was asleep in the kitchen at the New Inn in the village of Kerry on the night of Monday 7 October. The mark of Richard Turner.

Margaret Williams says that Edward Jones's wife told her that Evy the sweep had bought a watch of Charles Morris at the Raven for 7s.

That on Wednesday last he, witness, found the watch case now produced on the wall in the stable at the Raven Inn which he gave to Mrs Jones of the lodging house to keep for his brother. That witness told his brother when he saw him at the Raven on the Tuesday morning that the before mentioned persons had a watch to sell and returned with Charles Morris to whom he paid the 7s for the watch. Jane, wife of Edward Jones, says that on Wednesday last Edward Jones, the last witness, delivered examinant the watch case now produced and desired her to keep it for his brother Evan. That she put it up

accordingly and her husband this day delivered the same case to Andrew Breese, the constable. The mark of Jane Jones.

That two of the cloths now produced have had a piece of about the width of three or 4 inches cut off each for the purpose as examinant believes of destroying the mark on name and which pieces have been cut off whilst the clothes were in a wet state, the other two cloths are whole upon one of which there is a letter "HNo 6" but hardly distinguishable and upon the other there is no mark. Evan Morris of Pwll-y-glo, yeoman, says that his wife Mary is employed as laundry woman by Mr Pugh of Llannerch Hudol, says that yesterday morning his daughter came up into his bedroom (examinant being then in bed) and informed him that an earthen crock containing about six pounds weight of grease had been stolen the previous night out of a wash house adjoining the end of examinant's house, but there is no door or communication between examinant's dwelling house and the washhouse the way to which being through a door which opens into examinant's yard. That examinant immediately got up and having searched the wash house he and his wife discovered that the stean of grease, four cloths, two pairs of pattens, one of which belonged to examinant wife, one patten belonging to his daughter and the other belonging to Jane Davies, a servant of examinant's, and several other articles had been stolen. That examinant's servant, the said Jane Davies, having informed examinant that she had seen the prisoners passing down the road near examinant's house on Tuesday evening he accordingly suspected the prisoners to be the persons who had committed the robbery and having ascertained that the prisoners had been at a neighbour's house that evening and that they had remained there until about nine o'clock that night his suspicions were strengthened. Examinant, accompanied by Thomas Parry of Welshpool, a bailiff, went vesterday morning to the prisoners' mother's house called the Goddor in pa. Castell Caereinion, between two and 3 miles distant from Pwll-y-glo where theyfound the prisoner Mary Evans and that upon questioning the prisoner and her mother as to where the other prisoner was he was informed that the other prisoner Elizabeth Evans was washing at a neighbour's house. That examinant then went to fetch the prisoner Elizabeth Evans and as he was proceeding from the house he observed a quantity of broom upon the ground in the corner of the garden near the house door, the soil under which appeared fresh as if it had been recently disturbed. That examinant removed the broom and having also removed a little of the mould he discovered the articles now produced wrapped up in a bundle, concealed in the ground, that is to say, for kitchen cloths guite wet, four pattens and that the said Thomas Parry informed examinant that he had found the three pieces of soap and three figs of blue now also produced in the prisoner's mother's house, and also that he had found the part of the stean now also produced behind the house. That having fetched the other prisoner examinant and the said Thomas Parry conveyed the prisoners to Welshpool and gave them together with the articles now produced in charge of the constables.

That the broken stean now produced is examinant's property and is a part of the stean stolen from his house as aforesaid. The mark of Evan Morris.

Jane Davies of Pwll-y-glo, spinster, says that she is a servant to the last witness Evan Morris and assists her mistress in washing and that on Tuesday last she was engaged with and her daughter in washing some linens belonging to the David Pugh of Llannerch Hudol and that when they had finished washing on that evening they put 24 cloths into the furnace to boil. That examinant was the last person of the family who was in the wash house on that night and when she left she latched the door but did not link it. That upon examinant going to the wash house yesterday morning she found the door open and she also found a spoon which had been in a stean of grease in the washhouse upon a bench by the door. That upon going into the washhouse she missed the stean of grease and also one pair of pattens and two odd pattens. That examinant then informed her mistress of the robbery. That one of the pattens now produced is the property of examinant and she is able to identify it from the circumstance of its having one new ear and that the pair of patterns belonging to examinant's mistress and the other odd one belongs to her master's daughter and that she is also able to identify the last mentioned patten from its having a piece of the side split off. That the four cloths now produced are the property of the said David Pugh and was stolen from the said master's premises during the night of Tuesday as before stated. Examinant saw the two prisoners passing her master's house that evening between five and six o'clock. The mark of Jane Davies.

Ann Bishop wife of Edward Bishop of Cloddiau, labourer, says that on Tuesday last evening a little before six o'clock the prisoners came to her husband's house and that they remained there conversing with examinant and her husband to near nine o'clock the same evening when they left. That examinant husband's house is about 400 yards distant from Evan Morris the prosecutor's house. The m ark of Ann Bishop. Evan Thomas of Welshpool, sergeant-at-mace, says that the several articles now produced at the same as were delivered to him by the prosecutor, Evan Morris, on Wednesday last. Evan Thomas*.

The convict Mary Roberts whom we reported to the last Q.S. has been since removed to the penitentiary and her illegitimate child has been removed to its parish as recommended by the last court at the county expense.

Report-auditing committee. [1835E53]

At a meeting of the auditing committee held at the Oak Inn in Welshpool on 8 April 1835.

Present: John Davies, George Meares, Joseph Hayes Lyon.

The committee have found the accounts of the treasurer correct, but they have disallowed a payment of one guinea to Mr Thomas a surgeon at Llanfair for attending as a witness on a coroner's inquest although summoned by the coroner and an order signed by two magistrates of the committee concerning that the former orders of the court precluded them allowing this charge.

The committee observe in the clerk of the peace's bill charge for rules for summoning parish officers for not returning their jury lists and attending upon the Revising Barristers – a considerable expense is thrown upon the county on these accounts and the committee therefore suggest that the Grand Jurors who do not attend should be fined in the first instance leaving it to the party fined to apply to the court for remission. Andin regard to the charges incurred by the neglect of the parish officer the committee suggest that the court should make some special order in this respect so as to exonerate the county from this expenditure.

The committee beg to submit to the consideration of the court the practicability of reducing the allowance (weekly) to prisoners in consequence of the low price of the necessities of life.

The committee have examined the clerk of the peace's bills and also the bill of the county surveyor. The committee have also passed and allowed by their signatures several bills but in regard to a demand of £1 1s for the attendance of a medical gentleman upon the summons of two magistrates the committee leave the subject to be settled by the court, the committee feeling a difficulty in allowing such charge.

The committee suggest that an abstract of the general annual statement of the treasurer's accounts be published in the Shrewsbury Newspapers and that the same accounts and abstracts be examined and signed by the auditing committee.

As soon as we got opposite Mr Thomas of Pentre house Thomas Williams told me to stay there and if any person came up to me to go to him and ask for a situation. Thomas Williams went to the cart house and in about ten minutes bought two couple of fowls from there in his smock frock. He then asked me to go with him to Llansanffraid and in a short time gave me a couple of the fowls to carry. I carried the couple to Llansanffraid and after offering them for sale at several places we went to the house of Richard Hughes the taylor and offered them on sale there when Thomas Thomas of Llansanffraid came there and took Thomas Williams into custody. I then threw the couple of fowls I had on the floor and ran off. He is now shown some fowls before me and says he believes them to be the same which Thomas Thomas brought in his smock frock out of the cart house of Thomas Thomas. The mark of Edward Roberts.

That within John Nathan Evans property there are two open windows and that Thomas Syers has encroached nearly two feet in width and for the distance of 21 feet or thereabouts and that he has also put up an urinal on the footpath.

The committee have examined the work on the north side of the bridge by which the water which heretofore caused any objectionable nuisance has been conveyed from the county road and the culvert and paving made complete.

Your committee have also to report their opinion of the necessity of building a breast wall to support and secure the road on the south end of the bridge as also of coping the wall built by the county between the bridge and the Elephant's stables.

Being the only member of the committee who attended at the meeting convened yesterday to reconsider the report made to a former Q.S. it has devolved upon me to state the results of my consideration of the subject and that of a magistrate Mr Meares, not a member but who kindly accompanied me to the bridge. It appeared to us that the measures recommended by the former report as regarded the south or lower side of the bridge could not be carried into effect without a degree of interference with the approaches to the stable yards of the Bull and Oak Inns which would be inconvenient to the occupiers of those premises, although the bridge could be greatly improved on the south side of it by the plan proposed by the committee yet it does not seem to be very essential to it and in consequence we recommend that plan of improvement be abandoned. On the north or upper side of the bridge it seems to us to be necessary in order to effect such an improvement of the bridge as appears to be required by the situation in so great and important a thoroughfare of the county and to prevent a recurrence of the serious accidents that have from time to time arisen at it in consequence of its present incommodiousness to form a culvert up the course of the brook as far as the premises of Maurice Jones, John Griffiths and the representatives of the late Richard

Griffiths extend. We think it unnecessary to call the attention of the court to any other points as regard to the bridge referred to in the former report of the committee there being no difficulty upon them. **Order.** That such improvements be carried out, the county surveyor to take measures to set the work. To the surveyor of the county of Montgomery.

I do hereby give you notice that the trustees named and appointed in and by an act of Parliament 4 William IV, "an act for making a turnpike road from Minsterley to the turnpike road leading from Bishops Castle to Churchstoke propose to erect and completing a bridge although this certainly brook at a place called the Runnis which brook divides tp. Mucklewick in that part of pa. Hyssington which lies in co. Salop from tp. Hyssington in that part of the same parish which lies in co. Montgomery, in consequence of which one end of the said bridge will be in co. Salop and the other end in co. Montgomery. And I do hereby request you to superintend and inspect the erection of the said bridge or so much of it as lies in co. Montgomery, in order that you may satisfy yourself that the same is erected in a substantial and commodious manner according to the provisions of now act 43 George III c. 59, s.5. W. Bright, surveyor of the said trustees.

25 April 1835. Shrewsbury. Dear Sir, You are I believe surveyor for co. Montgomery and I send you a notice of the bridge about to be built on the confines of the two counties. I have given a similar notice to Mr Edward Haycock our county surveyor offering to assure him a plan and specification if necessary. There are also other bridges in the same neighbourhood which he will have to inspect. I presume you will make some arrangement to save the trouble of a double inspection except so far as may be necessary to comply with the provisions of the act of Parliament. William Hybergh How. P.S. please to favour me with a line acknowledging the receipt of the notice.

Minsterley and Churchstoke Turnpike rad. Admaston, 27 May 1835. Dear Sir. You will probably receive a notice in a few days for Mr How respecting a bridge to be built on the line of old in pa. Hyssington which will be partly a Shropshire and partly Montgomeryshire. The following is the specification which I trust you will approve of. You will observe there were not any parapet walls, the arch is sufficiently extended to carry the side fences over it without contracting the weights of the roadway which is 24 feet. Should you suggest any alteration in the specification as shall be glad to hear from you that it may be adopted which is now ready to be proceeded with. H. Bright.

The bridge is to consist of one elliptical arch 9 feet span and 32 feet in length to be 5'6" high to the underside of the arch. The foundation is to be excavated 2 feet below the bed of the river, the piers to be built to that height with good sound stone well jointed, each wall to be not less than 3'6" thick. From the bed of the river to the spring of the arch the walls to be 3 feet in thickness and 3 feet high. The underside of the crown of the arch to be 5'6" high from the bed of the river. The arch is to be not less than 1 foot in thickness. Four wing walls to be ever erected (two at each end) to extend 9 feet from the end of the piers or side walls at the base and finish at the level of the work at the plus side of the arch. These wing walls and not to be less than 2 feet in thickness and covered with grass sods (these walls will batter with the slope of the embankment). The whole of the stonework above the bed of the river (except the wing walls) to be scabbled, close jointed and built in courses to be well backed with a rubble stone and well routed as high as the crown of the arch. The mortar to consist of three parts clean sand and one part quick or fresh lime.

We shall use Ponsent? lime for all the face of the work exposed to the winter and is we have not a good foundation at the depth specified we shall go deeper and probably pave the counterway with a concave pavement if the foundations are not perfectly satisfactory

That he this examinant went the back way into the barn and found that the malt was removed. That he then went into the fold and met David

Davies and told him that he this examinant thought he had been doing what was not right. That he this examinant went to the stable but the door was locked upon which he asked the prisoner for the key. That he then went into the stable and found some malt in the manger. That he took a little out of the manger and pointed it out to David Davis who answered he hoped this examinant would forgive him. That he this examinant is a maltster and in the habit of making malt upon the premises and he has no doubt whatever that the malt found was taken out of the malt house. That he this examinant never gave David Davies of any other person leave to take malt for the horses. Thomas Whitfield*.

Edward Griffiths says that he is a workman for Thomas Whitfield. That on Friday 1 May he was sent by his master for some straw out of the barn. That on putting the pikel into the straw he felt something and upon removing the straw he this examinant perceived some malt in a sieve. That he left it there and informed his master who told this examinant to leave it there. The mark of Edward Griffiths.

Mary Jeffreys says that she is a servant all Mr Whitfield on 1 May but now she resides with Mr Morgan in pa. Llandysilio, farmer. That on Friday 1 May she asked David Davies how did he get the malt when he replied that he got it the day before as the key was in the door. The mark of Mary Jeffreys. Whitfield to prosecute, in £25; Edward Griffiths and Mary Jeffreys, to give evidence, in £10.

The prisoner gave bail for his appearance, in £50.

Report-auditing committee. [1835T63]

At a meeting of the auditing committee held at the Oak Inn in Welshpool, 1 July 1835. Present: George Meares, Joseph Hayes Lyon.

The committee have found the accounts of the treasurer correct but they have disallowed a payment of one guinea to Mr Thomas, a surgeon at Llanfair, for attending as a witness on a coroner's inquest although summoned by the coroner and an order signed by two magistrates the committee conceiving that the former orders of the court precluded the and allowing this charge.

The committee observe in the clerk of the peace's bill charges for rules nisi against grand jurors for nonattendance pursuant to summons and charges for summoning parish officers for not returning their jury lists and attending upon the revising banisters. A considerable expense is thrown upon the county on these accounts and the committee therefore suggests that the grand jurors who do not attend should be fined in the first instance leaving it to the party fined to apply to the court for remission. And in regard to charges incurred by the neglect of the parish officers the committee suggest that the court should make some special order in this respect so asked to exonerate the county from this expenditure.

The committee beg to submit to the consideration of the court the practicability of reducing the allowance (weekly) to prisoners in consequence of the low price of the necessaries of life.

The committee recommended to the consideration of the court the expediency of referring to a committee of magistrates acting in the upper division of Newtown to investigate the circumstances and reasons why pa. Betws does not pay the quota charged upon it on account of Caerhowell bridge.

The committee do not feel justified in allowing the sum of $\pounds 6$ 10s cleared by the parish officers of Llangadfan as to Rose Donelly's Child but wish that some enquiries should be made as to the present state of that child and whether she is not able to support herself at this time without a demand being made on the county fund.

Mr Drew having presented two bills amounting to £89 15 5d for business done in the year 1827, 1828, 1829 in regard to the diversion of the roads at Newtown Long bridge and the committee feeling themselves incompetent to enter into an examination of these bills recommend to the court to the further bills to the examination of the committee of magistrates acting for the year erecting and completing of that bridge. The committee have investigated and passed the following bills to be paid by the treasurer: County Treasurer: £7 17s 6d for returns required by Parliament

Mrs Whitehall: £9 for the use of rooms from 1 January 1833 to 1 July 1835 for county business. Dr Johnes: £1 1s for examining a woman by order of the magistrates who had charged a man with a rape. Instructions for indictment.

King on the prosecution of Edward Hughes the elder against Thomas Jerman of the town of Llanidloes, yeoman. The prosecution is the tenant and occupier of a large factory building, storeroom and counting house in which wool and yarn are kept, and carding engines and other machinery for working and manufacturing the same, situate in the town of Llanidloes, and the prisoner stands committed for having on the night of 6 or the morning of 7 August last with force broke a window in such factory and entered therein with an intent of committing some felonious act but it cannot be proved that he stole any property nor damaged any of the machinery or goods in the factory, counting house or building, but it can be proved that he endeavoured with an iron bar (part of the weighing scales belonging to the factory) to wrench open the lock of the counting house door and failing to do so he endeavoured with the said bar to burst open the boarded partition which divides the counting house from the other part of the factory, in which he also failed, but by those endeavours he damaged the side of the counting house door and one of the partition boards and also bent and damaged the said iron bar of the scales. The factory is a large building standing by itself in which is the counting house and storeroom etc and it is believed that the prisoner's object was to break open the counting house and then to get out the prosecutor's money desk. To enable you to draw the indictment on the subside you have copy deposition of Mr Pryce the prosecutor taken at Llanerfyl before Mr Lloyd, 20 August 1835.

Deposition. [document damaged]

William Pryce the prosecutor, a labourer residing at Pen-y-cae near Llanfair states that he lost a shovel on or during the night of Wednesday 15 April last. That the shovel was in his possession between six and seven on Wednesday evening, missed it between that time and six the following morning which was Welshpool fair day. That the shovel cost him 3s 6d and that he did not consider it any the worst but agreed with the magistrate Mr Llovd to put it as low as 2s. That on Tuesday 14 April last Robert Jones the prisoner was travelling on the road leading from Cefncoch to Llanfair and dropped into conversation with deponent just at the time he was going to leave off his work which was about or a little after six o'clock. At the time the conversation occurred between witness and the prisoner the latter was putting his stockings on and told deponent that he was going to Oswestry and should return the following day. That he deposited his tools, which consisted of the shovel in question and three hammer stones, for the night in a drain on the turnpike of road near the Ystrad in which drain he generally hid them every night when he worked there. Deponent believes that prisoner saw him depositing the shovel in the drain as he was near enough and in conversation just at the time. Deponent found his tools on the following morning (Wednesday) in the same place as he deposited them on the previous night and worked with them all day on Wednesday. On Wednesday evening between six and seven witness deposited the shovel and the hammers in the same spot as he did on Tuesday evening and as searching for them in the morning he missed the shovel. This was Thursday morning 16 April last. At the time deponent lost his shovel he did not know what to think of it then but afterwards his suspicions fell on the prisoner and on 18 May (Llanfair fair) he requested a neighbour or prisoners to take notice and make enquiry whether anything of the kind was seen in prisoners possession to whom he gave a description of the shovel and 5 June, being Welshpool fair day deponent heard that prisoner had a shovel answering that description in his possession. On 13 June he applied to Mr Lloyd at Llanerfyl for a warrant to apprehend prisoner ... his premises. On Tuesday 14 July deponent delivered the warrant to Thomas Arthur, constable of tp. Trawscoed and he, Thomas Arthur and two others searched prisoner's house and barn. Afterwards deponent heard that the shovel had been found in prisoners turbary or pit on Trannon Common and on the following Thursday 16 July saw the shovel it Thomas Arthur's house and instantly knew it when he saw it and identified it by a mark which he had made with his knife on the part which fastens the handle on its cross together as well as a mark at the top which passes through the cross. On Wednesday 15 July a woman came and offered deponent two half crowns for making it up and not owning the shovel in fear as she said that some ill or well wishers of prisoner should put it in his premises and accuse him of the theft. This woman deponent afterwards saw in Newtown where he was informed that she was prisoner's sister. That on 21 July being the Tuesday before Welshpool assizes a man came to the deponent's house (whom he believed to be the prisoner from his voice and the description given by the witnesses, Humphreys and Jones) offered him a sovereign and a stean of butter to make it up which stean of butter the prisoner's wife was then preparing and further added that he had brought the sovereign from the same woman as offered him the two half crowns which she should have if he would not swear to the shovel. The man did not say Robert Jones's wife but his wife which deponent construed to be Robert Jones's wife.

Prosecutor and witness: Margaret Jones. Witnesses: Morgan Jones, Margaret Jones, Edward Marpole, James Morgan. Sworn in court. *On the reverse*: A true bill.

Order. Jury say guilty. To be imprisoned in the common gaol and kept to hard labour for two months. Pay prosecutor's costs. [1835M/SO/6/294]

Examinations-theft. [1835M16, 20]

7 September 1835. Examination of Morgan Jones of Pen-y-glog, pa. Penegoes, farmer, Margaret Jones of the same, single woman and Edward Marpole of Croeslynbach in pa. Penegoes, shoemaker, taken before John Edwards.

Morgan Jones says, in the presence and hearing of John Evans and David Davies, labourers, charged this day before me that they in the night of Saturday, 5 September 1835 a certain quantity of wheat in the straw of the property Margaret Jones, widow, feloniously did steal take carry away from the premises at Pen-y-glog. Morgan Jones says that owing to our having lost a quantity of barley out of one of our fields and having suspicion upon the prisoners I went on Saturday night last about 12 o'clock to watch the fields and went to the one fronting the prisoners' houses, in a short time after I went there I heard the prisoners converse with each other in the high road which runs between our field and their houses. I saw them both in the road and heard the prisoner John Evans says to the other prisoner David Davies "where shall we go tonight". David Davies replied "I am inclined to go to the garden for some cabbage and carrots", meaning as I supposed our garden. The other prisoner then said "suppose we have a little of this wheat", referring as I supposed to our wheat. David Davies then said "there is some grain at Caehilan, Croesllyn, Maesteran, Cefngwirgrug. They then went along the road in the direction of our wheat field and I went for Edward Marpole living at Croesllynbach to come with me to the field as I was afraid of going there myself and I had no one at home but my sisters who could give me any assistance. Edward Marpole then came with me and we went to my sister Margaret who was left in the field opposite the prisoners' houses to ask her where they had gone to and having been informed by the that they went towards the wheat field we then followed them, but sent my sister to the gate first to see whether they were in the field. She returned and told us that the prisoners were in heart of wheat. We then consulted together for a short time and my sister and Marpole went to the gate to wait the prisoners out by that way and I went to the lane leading along the side of the field to the house and I saw the prisoners take some of the wheat from the stacks. When I went over the hedge into the field to the prisoners who immediately threw down what they had in their hands and ran away and I called Marpole and my sister who went along the high road by the side of the field. I followed the prisoners and caught John Evans in the adjoining field but the prisoner David Davies escaped. I am sure that the prisoners are the same persons whom I saw in the wheat field and that I saw them taking some of the wheat from the stacks in the field. The mark of Morgan Jones.

Margaret Jones says that she went with her brother Morgan to the field opposite the prisoners' houses about 12 o'clock on Saturday night last. I saw them in the high road which runs between our field and the prisoners' houses and I heard John Evans say "I thought of having some of that wheat". The prisoner David Davies then said "there is some grain at Caehilan and some grain at Croesllyn, and at Maesteran and Cefngwirgrug. They then went along the road towards our wheat field, my brother then went for Edward Marpole and I stayed in the field until they returned. After they returned I went over the stile into the road and went to the gate leading to the wheat field. I then saw John Evans and David Davies, the prisoners, in the wheat and plucking it out of the stacks one at each stack. I am positive they were the persons as there was sufficient moonlight for me to see them distinctly. I then returned to my brother and Edward Marpole who were staying in the other field opposite the prisoners' houses and informed them of what I had seen. We all then went into the road and my brother went into the lane leading to the house and I and Marpole went to the gates leading to the field. We (Marpole and myself) waited by the gate and looked at the prisoners plucking the wheat from the stacks. My brother then went into the field when the prisoners made off. Marpole and

myself then ran along the road by the side of the wheat field in order to meet the prisoners and went over into the potato field which adjoins it, where my brother had caught the prisoner John Evans but the prisoner David Davies made his escape. We then went into the wheat field and found the wheat now produced which had been plucked out of the stacks by the prisoners and which we then took home. The mark of Margaret Jones.

Edward Marpole says about midnight on Saturday night last Morgan Jones of Pen-y-glog came to my house and called him me up and told me that the prisoners were gone towards their wheat field and asked me to go with him to see where they had gone to. I then went with him to the field opposite the prisoners' houses where Margaret Jones, the sister of Morgan Jones, was watching. When she told those that the prisoners were gone up along the road, we then sent her to see if she could see or hear anything of them, as she could walk lighter than we could. She soon returned and told us that they were in the middle of their wheat. I then went with Margaret Jones to the gate and Morgan Jones went along the lane. We then stayed at the gate about a quarter of an hour looking at the prisoners plucking the wheat from the stacks. We were about 15 yards from the prisoners and could see them well it being a bright moonlight. Margaret Jones then desired in the to go to her brother to fetch him to the gate that we may be altogether by the time the prisoners had made up their bundles, but Morgan Jones had gone over the hedge into the field and I returned to Margaret Jones by the gate, by which time Morgan Jones had called out and the prisoners started off. Morgan Jones then followed along the field and over the hedge into a potato field and I and Margaret Jones ran along the road in the same direction and went over into the potato field where Morgan Jones had caught the prisoner John Evans. David Davies made his escape. Morgan Jones, myself and Margaret Jones then went into the wheat field to look for the wheat which the prisoners had plucked out of the stacks and found several bundles tied up which we collected together and tied up into one bundle, which was taken home by Morgan Jones. Edward Marpole*.

Examination-assault. [1835M17]

7 August 1835. The examination of Sarah Owen of the town of Llanidloes, single woman, taken before George Mears. Says "I was near the Castle Inn last night about 11 o'clock. I had not any quarrel with the prisoner. I was standing on the street and Edward Owen came on and struck me three times. Edward Owen called to Jarman to assist him. He tried to kick me but failed to do so. I did nothing to Jarman and went away immediately. The mark of Sarah Owen.

Writ-summons. [1835M18]

2 July 1835. To Hugh Jones and Jane Jones. We command you to appear at the Q.S. on Thursday 22 October 1835 at 10 a.m. to give evidence touching a bill of indictment to be preferred by Humphrey Williams against George Oliver and David Davies for felony. Witness: Viscount Clive.

Examination-assault. [1835M25]

7 August 1835. The examination of Evan Evans of Llanidloes, spinner, taken before George Meares. Says that he and Thomas Jerman were drinking last night at the Castle Inn till Blenkhorn the policeman came and turned them out. He then went over the short bridge and slept near the weir. Did not go home till three o'clock in the morning and in going to bed he found a person on his bed and said in the name of God what is here. A person answered it is me and by his voice he knew him to be Thomas Jerman. Examinant asked him how he found the way in. Jerman and said he knew where the examinant lived and how to come in.

Examinant then went to bed to him. They both slept until about eight o'clock when George Ashton came into the house and called hello and came upstairs and said "Evy thou has done a fine job last night, how didst thee come to break the hall and a new factory and let me see thy hands. He showed his hands for him when George Ashton said "that thee hast not done it and somebody has been then breaking into the factory and said he never saw such a sight of blood in there and whoever has done it he broke his hands much". As examinant was going downstairs he saw blood on it. He then turned back and looked at Thomas Jarman's hands and saw one of them all over in blood and also one arm of his jacket was all over blood and likewise observed some blood on the bed clothes. He then went out of the house and after some conversation with Richard Owen respecting the factory being broken and that it was likely to be imputed to his charge, he returned to his house, went upstairs and all Jarman to get up and said to him "by God thee art in for it". Jarman ask for what. Examinant said "they do know who has broke the factory and they do say thee hast done it". Jarman then said no he did not. Examinant said look at thy hands then for they are all over blood. Jarman said nothing in answer. Examinant afterwards said you broke the hall too, as John Edwards saw you do it. Jarman answered that John Edwards had said that he saw him break it to have Wobters? out. In about an hour after he went to bed and soon afterwards some persons came to the house and called out "Evy hast thou got some wool in the house. He said no indeed have I and go from there devils". They further said "thee hast and let us see it. Examinant then sold them that the door was open and that they might come in and see. That after he got up this morning he had some conversation with Richard Owen's wife respecting wool. That Edward Owen, engineer, Thomas Brick and a tinker were also drinking at the Castle with him and Thomas Jerman and does not know whether Jarman's hands were blooded or not as they did not take any notice of them. The mark of Evan Evans.

Examination-assault. [1835M32]

7 August 1835. The examination of Charles Blenkhorn of Llanidloes, police officer, taken before George Meares. Says that in discharge of his duty I was on the Longbridge Street last night about a 12:15 I then saw Thomas Jarman the prisoner walking along the street with a large stick in his hand. I went up to him and walked by his side a little way and asked what he was doing there with a large stick of that kind at that time of night. He made answer and asked him if he was doing any harm I told him I thought it would be better if he was in bed. He said that Jarman of the Eagles had gone to bed and there he lodged. I told him he might get somewhere and I then watched him, and he went under Mr Edmund Marsh's archway on the south side of the street. I went to the Church Lane and came down a small aisle to the old Mr Marsh's. I then saw the prisoner coming from under young Mr Marsh's archway. He came down to Severn port and then I lost all sight of him. He was not then at all drunk. Charles Blenkhorn*.

Examinations-theft. [1835M33]

25 September 1835. The complaint and examination of Humphrey Williams of Rhydarwydd Mill in pa. Llanfair, taken before M.E. Lewis. Says the ducks now produced by his wife are his ducks which had been stolen from before his door on 14 July last. He is positive they are his. The mark of Humphrey Williams. Recognizance in £20 to appear and prosecute and give evidence. The like recognizance for his wife's appearance.

Jane, wife of Humphrey Williams says that on Saturday 14 July last about one o'clock in the afternoon she fed her husband's ducks, eleven in number by the door and afterwards went to a hay field adjoining the house. But almost immediately after her going she saw three men passing by the house with fishing tackle and after passing going to fish with nets in the mill pond near the house. In a short time afterwards examinant returned to the house when she found only eight of the ducks three being missing which excited other suspicion that they were taken by the men who had been fishing in the mill pond had taken them. In about a

fortnight afterwards examinant's mother came to Llanfair and on her return told examinant that she had found out where the ducks were. That they were in the possession of the men who had been fishing in the mill pond, who were David Davies of the Watergates and George Oliver of the same place. On the Monday next succeeding the Saturday on which examinant's mother had been at Llanfair examinant went to the Watergates to enquire for the ducks and behind the house where David Davies and George Oliver lived examinant saw her husband's three ducks which she had lost as above stated in a small pool and after seeing the ducks to be certain that they were her husband's she went to Oliver Davies's house where she saw Davies's wife and asked her if there had come any strange ducks upon which Davies's wife called in Oliver. Examinant then charged him with having stolen the ducks who denied having taken them but said he had bought them at Cann Office. Examinant then went to Llanfair and with her father went and procured a warrant against Oliver and Davies which was given to the constable. In a few days afterwards examinant came to Llanfair and David Owen the constable begged her to take the ducks to keep them and she took them from him and they have been in her possession ever since, and are these she now produces. She positively swears that they are the ducks she lost. The mark of Jane Williams.

Recognizance in £20 from her husband for her appearance.

Humphrey Roberts of Llanfair, joiner says that on Saturday 20 July last George Oliver and David Davies came to him and asked him to come with them to fish with a net. Examinant went with them to the Einion above Rhydarwydd Mill and fished until they came down a little below the mill when they saw a lot of ducks a little below them on the river. Oliver Davies told examinant they would take some of the ducks and went towards the ducks leaving the ... with examinant in the river and drove the ducks behind a projection of the rocks out of examinant's sight. Examinant shortly followed them and when he came to them they told him that David Davis had taken two of the ducks and had them in his coat pocket and Oliver showed him one he had taken in his pocket. Examinant persuaded them to leave them and let them go all that there would be noise about them but they refused and Davies said they would never find out who taken them that they would think they were killed by a fox. They persuaded him not to say but examinant told them he would not tell a story to keep them and when the owners of the ducks came to enquire further examinant directed them to the prisoner's residence. Humphrey Roberts*.

Re-cognizance in £20 to appear and give evidence.

David Owen of Llanfair, constable says that on Tuesday 21 July Mr Lewis the magistrates gave him two warrants, one against George Oliver and one against David Davie to apprehend them. When examinant went to Davies's and Oliver's residence he was told by their wives that they were not at home and that they did not know where they had gone to. Examinant seeing three ducks in the garden before the door asked if they were the ducks about which the noise was, and was answered in the affirmative. Examinant asked them to let him take them away but they begged he would let them remain until night, to prevent exposure which examinant complied. Examinant on returning at night to fetch the ducks was informed they were lost and could not be found. The following morning examinant returned very early to seek the ducks and after some trouble found three ducks which he was informed by the neighbours were those that had been stolen. Examinant brought them to Llanfair and kept them for a few days and marked them. They were afterwards given up on to Jane Williams. Is positive that those now produced are those which he found at the residence of Oliver and Davies. In about a month after taking the ducks examinant apprehending Oliver and conveyed him before Mr Lewis the magistrate. Oliver on being taken confessed to examinant that he was one of them who had taken the ducks without being at all persuaded so to do by examinant or anyone else. Oliver also said that David Davis was the other and on being brought before Mr Lewis he confessed in the same manner. After being cautioned by Mr Lewis not to say anything to criminate himself or whatever he would say would be made use of at the trial. The mark of David Owen.

That woman who worked offered the two half crown pieces is the sister of the said Robert Jones the prisoner. William Pryce*.

Richard Humphreys the younger says that about eight o'clock in the forenoon of Tuesday 14 July last he saw Edward Jones, the father of the constable of tp. Llysyn in pa. Carno, going from near Hendre towards Warren, the house of the prisoner, and heard the former call to the latter twice who then went down to him,

each standing within his own field (both which fields being separated from each other by a road which passes between them) and in conversation with each other. Saw the said Robert Jones the prisoner going up to his barn, and his wife taking a scythe into their field, mowing grass and taking it to putting it into their cart which stood near their barn, when he the said Robert Jones and one of his sons went with a horse and cart up to Trannon Hill as he the deponent supposes, for that the cart was loaded with peat on his return home which was about noon. That in the afternoon of the same day he the said deponent saw the prisoner Robert Jones upon Trannon Hill with his horse and cart coming to one of his peat pits and was, as it were, searching for something lost, turning over loose clods or surface of the turbary. Having seen Mr Morris of Plasnewydd returning from the Hill and having heard from his own father Richard Humphreys that a road shovel had been found by the said Mr Morris in one of the prisoner's pits. He the said deponent with one Richard Morgan went up to see whether the said prisoner would go and search the place or pit, in which the said shovel was found as aforesaid and found him searching as before stated. Richard Humphreys*. Evan Morris says that on the forenoon of 14 July last he went with two of his servants to Trannon Hill for a wagon load of peat and after having loaded the wagon raised a few of his peat that were lying scattered on the ground, took their evening's lunch, and set out for the turbary on their way home and having heard that search had been made for a road shovel which had been suspected to have been in the possession of the prisoner and that he might possibly have taken it up with him to the hill and concealed it in one of his peat pits, he this deponent searched one of them and upon turning up some peat surface clods which were placed lengthways in one of the pits discovered first the handle and then the whole of the shovel which he removed to one of his own peat pits at some distance from that in which it was found and their left it for about four hours when he took with him Thomas Arthur, constable, who took it home. This deponent also says to the best of his knowledge the said shovel must have been placed where he found it within a few hours before. Evan Morris*.

Ann George says in the beginning of the last hay harvest she went to enquire of the prisoner Robert Jones whether he had any potatoes to sell. He was then in a ploughed field of his digging with a shovel which she declares to be the same with the one which the said Evan Morris swore to be that which he found in the turbary, and which was now shown to her. The mark of Ann George.

Richard Humphreys the elder says that John Thomas of Rhoshaidd having informed him that William Pryce had said that he had lost a road shovel and had at the same time asked him the said John Thomas to take notice if he should happen to see one like that which he had lost. The said John Thomas also begged of this deponent to take notice of any shovel like the one he had been describing. He this deponent accordingly did so and sometime after having seen John Jones the son of the prisoner mattocking about a gatepost for the purpose of taking it up, saw a shovel lying on the earth then thrown up near to it, examined it but had it not in his hands. About a week afterwards saw the same shovel lying in the prisoner's field near the footpath, took it up and examined it and positively declares that it is the one and the same shovel with that he before saw by the gatepost and is the one now shown to him. Richard Jones*.

Thomas Humphreys of the town of Llanfair, gatekeeper, says that on the night of Tuesday 21 July last about the hour of 11 a man riding a horse having on it in no saddle and with a mask bridle called at the Llanfair lower gate which he this deponent having arisen out of bed and received his toll was by the man asked for the house of William Pryce later of Nantcae. He this deponent directed him how to call thither and then returned to bed. In the space from an hour to an hour and a half the same person returned to the gate again. This deponent then rose out of his bed and opened the gate for him, who said he had been rather long and being asked whether he had seen or found William Pryce, he answered that he had and paid his toll on his return through the gate it being then after midnight, between the hours of 12 and one. Deponent having gone about a day or two afterwards to the said William Pryce asked him who that man was who called at his house at that late hour that night (meaning Tuesday night). Price answered that he supposed that he was the man who stole his shovel for his sister had been within offering him money if he would not proceed against him. Thomas Humphreys*.

We are unable to make any satisfactory report, pursuant to the requisition of the last court, respecting the materials of the old gaol by reason of the county surveyor not being able at present to state what further part of the materials will be required for completing the stable and other outbuildings ordered to be erected at and for the use of the gaol, but as those erections are in a forward state we believe that a full report may be ready for the consideration of the next Q.S.

The old house of correction, the freehold of which as well as of the garden and yard adjoining we understand is vested in trustees for the county, has been unoccupied for some time and will soon become in a more dilapidated state than it now is and therefore we have to call the attention and consideration of the court to it. And we have also to call the attention of the court to the reports of the select committee of the Lords for enquiring into the present state of gaols and houses of correction particularly to the 10th resolution in the Second Report which declares that the practice of paying money to prisoners in lieu of supplying them with food which practice was introduced into the Montgomery prison some time ago by way of experiment is illegal. And it appears requisite that the court should take into its consideration the act of 5 & 6 William IV, c.28 for effecting greater uniformity of practice in the government of prisons and particularly the 5th and 6th sections of it and to determine what alterations and additions ought to be proposed to be made to the present prison rules and regulations before they are transmitted to the secretary of state. Report-bridge. [1835M98]

To the Q.S. 2 July 1835. The committee appointed at the adjourned Q.S. held on 15 July to enquire into the reasons why the inhabitants of tps. Pentyrch and Rhosaflo do not pay the instalments ordered by the court to be paid by them towards Pentyrch bridge on the river Banw on the turnpike road leading from Llanfair to Llanerfyl pursuant to the Local Bridge Act beg to report. That the reason assigned by the said inhabitants for their not paying such instalment is that they considered that at the time the notices to make the bridge a county bridge under the provisions of the said act were given they (the said inhabitants) were not liable to its repairs and in consequence that such notices as well as the orders made thereupon were inoperative. That is appears to the committee from the evidence which they have been able to obtain upon that point, that up to 1782 the road passed a short distance below the line of the present turnpike road. That on the old line there was no carriage bridge over the river but there was a timber bridge for horse and foot passengers which as well as the portions of the adjoining road situate within their respective townships was kept in repair by the said inhabitants. But the trustees of the turnpike road at the time they made the new line of road (about the said year 1782) and previous to the passing of the act of 43 George III built a stone bridge over the river on the said new line and a part of the expense was levied on the inhabitants and paid to the treasurer of the road. That from thence to the time the said notices were given the stone bridge was kept in repair by the trustees, the inhabitants doing their statute duty on the roads. That from the time the turnpike road and the stone bridge were opened to the public the old bridge and road were allowed to go to decay but there are small portions of it yet made use of by the farmers living in the neighbourhood to go from one farm to another. The committee have subjoined to this report a copy of the evidence taken by them in order that the court may be better able to decide whether the inhabitants of the said townships are liable to contribute any and what portion towards the repairing and maintaining of the said bridge. John Lloyd, M.E. Lewis. Ellis Ellis of pa. Llanerfyl, labourer, says that he is 77 years old, was born and lived in pa. Llanfihangel until he was nine years old when he came to reside at Melinygrug and from thence to the present time has resided in the neighbourhood of Pentyrch is well acquainted with the road from Llanfair to Llanerfyl. When he first came to reside at Melinygrug the road went below the present turnpike road. There was a timber bridge over the river Banw on the upper side of the old road on stone abutments about a yard wide and about 5 yards long for horse and foot passengers. Carriages went through the river. About the year 1780 or 1785 witness remembers taking a stag from Llwydiarth Park to Montgomery when the new turnpike road was making and the new bridge was in the building he travelled in some places on the new road and in other places on the old one. He went all over the old bridge as the part of the new turnpike road adjoining the new bridge was not then completed. The old road was in a very bad condition and it appeared as if no repairs have been done to it for some time. From the time the turnpike road was completed the old bridge was allowed to decay but the old road was not stopped up and some parts of it are yet made use of by the farmers to go from one farm to another. 38 years ago witness became a superintendent on the turnpike road from Llanfair to Nantydugoed and continued in that occupation for about 20 years and from thence to the present time has been deployed upon the road as a labourer. When he first came to be employed upon the road Mr Hassall of Llanfair was treasurer and witness understood he had been treasurer from the time of making of the turnpike road. The bridge on the turnpike road was several times repaired by witness and he was allowed for it by the treasurer of the turnpike road in his account with the trust. When the bridge was repaired the inhabitants of the townships used to carry the stones to the bridge and did their statute labour upon the hundred yards of the road adjoining it in the same manner as they did upon the rest of the turnpike road within their respective townships.

David Davies of Gwernfydd in pa. Llanllugan says he is 75 years old. Lived at Pentre in tp. Pentyrch within about 200 or 300 yards of the old wooden bridge over the river Banw between Llanfair and Llanerfyl from his childhood to the time he was 20 years old his father held Pentre farm. The old bridge was always repaired one end by tp. Pentyrch and the other end by tp. Rhosaflo. Remembers working for his father upon the Pentyrch end of the bridge and the turnpike road adjoining with the other farmers in the township. Remembers seeing the inhabitants of Rhosaflo also repairing their end of the bridge. The old bridge was a wooden bridge for horses and foot passengers. Carriages went through the river. It was about a yard wide and from 5 to 6 yards long. It was built upon to abutments of stone and the middle was supported by a

wooden frame which was from 3 yards to 3 ¹/₂ yards in height from the water. Witness left Pentre and went to reside at Llanwyddelan 55 years ago. The turnpike road had been commenced when he left the place but the new bridge had not been built.

On searching the records of this court in the possession of the clerk of the peace the following orders appear upon the minutes.

Easter Q.S. 1782. Ordered that the sum of 6d in the \pounds be forthwith assessed on tp. Rhosaflo and at the same be paid over into the hands of Mr John Hassall of the town of Llanfair, grocer, to be by him laid out and applied for erecting that part of a bridge over the river Banw on the road leading from Llanfair towards Machynlleth in tp. Rhosaflo and the causeways and pavements thereto belonging, he the said John Hassall being appointed treasurer of the said money and overseer of the said work.

Ordered that the sum of 6d in the £ be forthwith assessed on tp. Pentyrch and at the same be paid over into the hands of Mr John Hassall of the town of Llanfair, grocer, to be by him laid out and applied for erecting that part of a bridge over the river Banw on the road leading from Llanfair towards Machynlleth in tp. Pentyrch and the causeways and pavements thereto belonging, he the said John Hassall being appointed treasurer of the said money and overseer of the said work, and the rest and residue of the money into the hands of the present surveyor of tp.
